Junior High Patriots Take Loss From Spur

Valley Junior High School football team fell short in its attempt at two straight victories as Spur defeated them 6-2 there Saturday.

The young Patriots played sloppy the first half but came back and played good enough to trail only 6-0 at halftime.

The second period was a different story as Valley proved capable of moving the ball. A march to the goal line, however, ended when Warren Wayne Merrell attempted a pass and had it intercepted at the one-yard line.

On the following play, Jason Little hammered a Spur back in the end zone and secured a two-point safety.

Valley was driving for the winning touchdown late in the game, but a fumble stopped the drive.

Defensive standouts were Jason Little, Bubba Clardy and Clay Edwards.

Offensively, Warren Merrell performed well in his first outing as quarterback and Bubba Clardy did an excellent job of running the ball.

EMTs To Have Certification Training Monday

The Quitaque and Turkey Emergency Medical Technicians will have a training and certification meeting on MAST Monday, October 21, at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the First National Bank in Quitaque.

MAST stands for Medical Anti-Shock Trousers. The EMTs must attend yearly classes to maintain their certification to apply this lifesaving device.

The MAST works in a similar manner to an air splint, but covers most of the lower body.

Here are some of the ways the MAST can help in life threatening situations:

(a) When the patient is effectively stabilized with MAST, diagnosis and preparation for surgery may be delayed for an hour or even longer, while an unstable patient often must be diagnosed and prepared for surgery in a few minutes.

(b) Slows or stops venous and arterial bleeding in the areas of the body enclosed by the pressurized garment.

(c) Forces available blood from the lower body to the heart, brain, and other vital upper body organs.

In some situations, the application of the MAST could give the victim additional time during the long trip to the hospital.

State financial aid is the backbone of the operating fund for Valley School. Although local taxes and federal funds are an extremely important part of the school budget, about 80% of the budget is made up from funds which come in the form of financial aid.

Just how much money does a school district get from the State of Texas each year? The amount of entitlement is calculated upon a complicated formula which basically a numbers game. Figured into the calculation are numbers such as: What is the total property wealth of the school district, how many students are enrolled in vocational education, or how many miles are students transported on school buses. Other important numbers taken into consideration are: What is the average daily attendance by students, how many students are served in the special education program, and how many students are served in lunches in the school cafeteria. And finally, how many teachers have earned an advancement in the career ladder.

All the numbers figured in the calculation are, by their own right, important. At the base of all this, however, is the fact that a school cannot be a school if it does not receive state funds without serving students. And students must be in attendance during specified periods of time during the year in order for the attendance to generate funds for school operation. The state has designated two separate periods of time for student accounting. The first accounting period is four weeks in October and another period is four weeks during March. The school must use either period to calculate student attendance. The choice is ours. Normally, October is Valley's highest enrollment period and probably will be counted for attendance purposes.

Each student who is counted for attendance during the month of October or March will earn the school a minimum of \$105 per day for each of the 20 days. The amount will increase depending upon whether the student is enrolled in a special education class, is enrolled in a vocational course, or is transported on school bus. A student with perfect attendance will generate \$2,100 or more. If a student is absent from school, however, the money is transferred from the potential gain to a loss but the student must be educated and bills must be paid for the remainder of the year.

Student attendance throughout the school year is important for academic purposes. During the month of October, however, the student's attendance becomes important for financial as well as academic purposes. Many school districts are offering special incentives for good attendance which cost a few dollars more expensive inducements. Valley, the school is offering T-shirts to every student who has perfect attendance and a Co-party to classes that have the best percent attendance.


GAME NIGHT AT TURKEY WAS SUCCESS


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
