### Two Receive Highest F. F. A. Degree

Steve Eudy and Kim Coker, both of Turkey, Texas, received the American Farmer Degree November 13 at special ceremonies held during the 48th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America, in Kansas City, Missouri. They were among 703 FFA members selected to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree of membership in the FFA. As holders of the American Farmer Degree, they join a select group representing about one percent of all FFA members. Steve is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Eudy. Kim is the son of Mr. and Mrs. U. F. Coker. The American Farmer Degree is presented only by the National Organization of the Future Farmers of America to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership ability. State FFA Associations are permitted to submit candidates for the American Farmer Degree based on total FFA membership in the state. The 703 members awarded the American Farmer Degree represent the highest achievement of more than 485,000 FFA members now enrolled in the nation's 7,838 high school vocational agriculture departments. FFA members begin as "Greenhands" and after one year of membership may be advanced by the

local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer." The third degree, that of "State Farmer," is presented by the State FFA Association and is limited to no more than two percent of the State's FFA membership in any one year. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree. In addition to having earned the State Farmer Degree, candidates for the American Farmer Degree must have been active members of the FFA continuously for at least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities and they must have completed all of the vocational agriculture instruction offered in their high school. American Farmer applicants must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts through their occupational experience program and must have their earnings productively invested or deposited in a bank. Finally, the American Farmer candidates must have demonstrated outstanding ability through their leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities. Each American Farmer Degree recipient is presented a gold key and certificate by the Future Farmers of America. Recipients who attend the Convention are pre-

sented a check from the Future Farmers of America Foundation to help pay their travel expenses. The National FFA Convention is an annual event of the Future Farmers of America and is carried out in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education, of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. This year over 17,000 FFA members, vocational agriculture teachers, parents and guests are taking part in the 48th National FFA Convention. The Convention is conducted entirely by student members all between the ages of 14 and 21. The six National Officers take charge of all business sessions and 119 official delegates represent the membership in voting on all issues of business. In addition to the American Farmer Degree many other FFA awards are presented during the Convention. Contests are held in dairy, livestock, poultry, meats, horticulture, milk quality and dairy foods, public speaking and agricultural mechanics. Several guest speakers of national prominence address the Convention audience and entertainment is interspersed with the business. The Convention is the largest annual youth convention in the nation. It closes on Friday evening with the installation of six new National FFA Officers.

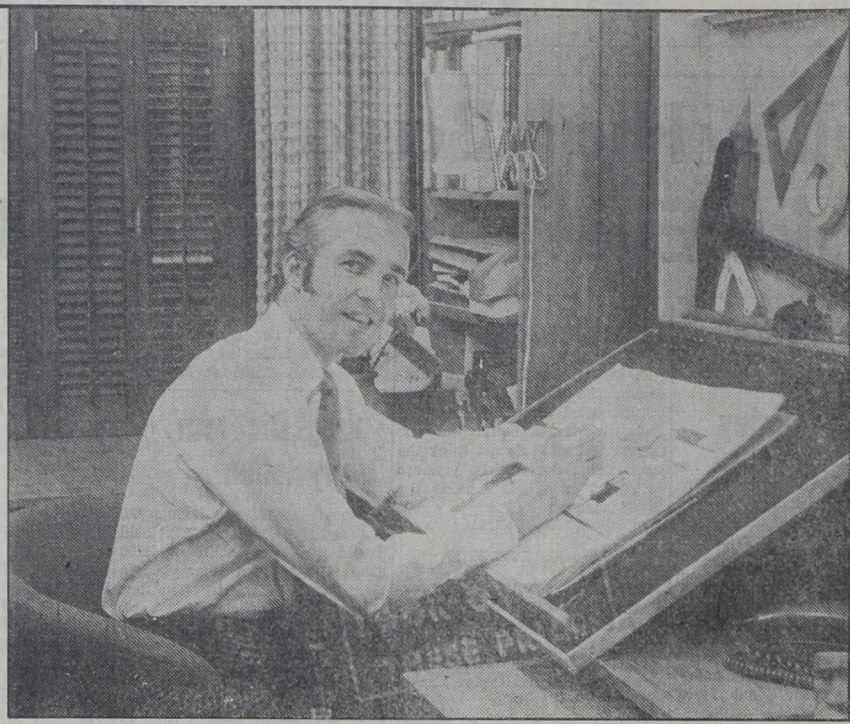

## BI-MONTHLY TESTS BEING MADE ON LAKE MACKENZIE WATER

How will Lake Mackenzie's water taste once the lake has filled enough for municipal use? "We're not sure yet, but we don't think it will be as bad as Lake Meredith water," says West Texas State University Biology Professor William A. Cooper. Cooper closed down his ten-year water quality study of Lake Meredith to begin his work on the slowly-filling Lake Mackenzie, which will eventually supply the water needs of Silverton, Floydada, Tullia and Lockney. Cooper and his WTSU graduate assistant, Britt Canada of Sunray, are making bi-monthly checks on the lake's dissolved mineral content and oxygen level. "We are trying to establish trends in water quality of man-made lakes," says Canada. Any correlations they can establish could be used by water treatment plants to produce the best-tasting water possible for their cities and by the scientific community as well in a field which has been little studied. If Lake Meredith is any example, Lake Mackenzie's dissolved mineral content will slowly rise with the lake level. Currently, about 30 feet deep, Mackenzie is far from its 150 foot capacity. High levels of sulfates and sodium account for the strong taste in water. Mackenzie's total dissolved mineral content is 450 milligrams per liter of water at present, while Lake Meredith's is 1200 parts per liter and stabilized. The minerals enter the reservoir through the inflowing streams and the leaching of the lake bed. Cooper and Canada have been taking water samples from the streams since 1974, when the lake began filling, and have added another sampling station at the dam. Canada has already noted a high fluoride content in the streams that are feeding the lake, which is one of 15 minerals he tests for in the lab. Canada will compile his data into a master's thesis in the spring. The son of Rev. Roy Canada of Sunray, he will graduate from West Texas State in biology with an emphasis in ecology and limnology.

PLANT CLOVER, SET OUT A FEW EVERGREENS OR SIMPLY BUILD A BRUSHPILE ON AN UNUSED CORNER OF A FARM... AND THE COTTONTAILS SHOULD BECOME ABUNDANT.

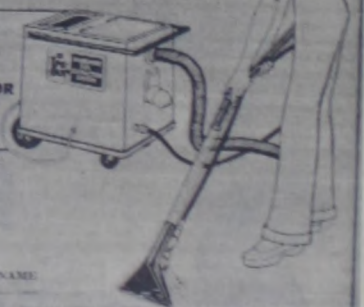

Save Wildlife Habitat Now

Landowners and sportsmen are finding an abundance of cover as the 1975 hunting seasons open in Texas but this collection of grasses, weeds and grain stalks will disappear by next spring.

November is the time to save some of that cover for the game and song birds as the most critical time of the year for these species is from February through March.

Winter rains, winds, snow and indiscriminate burning and heavy winter grazing destroy most of the necessary protective benefits of these plants by spring of each year.

Texas has plenty of food, water and protection for its game birds but protective habitat in the spring determines the success of the following years' bird populations according to Richard DeArment, extension biologist at Wheeler.

Landowners are asked to leave a patch of grass or weeds in the corner of their field or a few rows of corn or grain stalks along a weeded fencerow or pasture.

Even though quail, pheasant and prairie chicken are adept at eluding enemies such as the hawk, owl, skunk and coyote, a certain amount of cover is required.

The 1975 hunting seasons are in full swing and there will be a good surplus of game birds going into next spring's nesting season if the winter is not too severe.

Wildlife management is not only the responsibility of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department but also involves landowners and sportsmen. A landowner can have a successful farming year and wildlife too if care is used in the burning of grain fields and fencerows.

Wildlife on your property is beneficial from the standpoint of economics. Sportsmen spend money to hunt and game birds eat many of the insects that are detrimental to crops.

Let's give the wildlife a hand and provide a little cover and protection from the cold winds of winter and early spring and insure a good crop for 1976.

### New X-Ray Technique In Operation in Lubbock

An EMI Brain Scanner, a new X-ray technique for producing pictures of the brain, is now in operation in Methodist Hospital, George M. Brewer, president, announced today.

"This new diagnostic device provides detailed information on brain tissue abnormalities in a new perspective. It is more comfortable and less costly for the patient, as hospitalization is avoided. It is safer than previous procedures used to diagnose conditions within the brain," Mr. Brewer states.

The EMI Scanner system, located in the Nuclear Medicine area of the hospital, uses small amounts of X-ray in conjunction with a computer to produce clear pictures, which are cross-section views from the top of the head, looking down.

Methodist Hospital staff physicians in neurology and neurosurgical services are scheduling patients to be evaluated for tumors, blood clots or strokes, brain hemorrhages, hydrocephalus, acute head injuries, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis and degenerative brain disease.

There is no pain during the examination. The patient wears normal clothing and reclines on an adjustable couch with the head positioned in a water-filled, rubber

head-cap. The examination does not cause headaches or nausea, and hospitalization is not required for a recovery period.

During the scan, a portion of the machine rotates around the patient's head, taking readings of X-ray transmission. These readings are converted to electronic form and fed into the computer. Within seconds, the results are shown on a viewing screen, similar to television. The pictures are recorded on permanent discs. Additionally, the X-ray results are reproduced as a numerical printout, giving another permanent record of conditions within the brain.

The EMI Scanner system includes a Diagnostic Display Console and a Viewing Unit, where the pictures are shown on monitoring screens and are recorded as Pol-

aroid prints for examination by radiologists and physicians.

Prior to development of the EMI Scanner, normal and abnormal conditions within the brain could be displayed only by injecting substances which created contrasts between tissue structures. Radiological methods most commonly used include injections of radioisotopes or dyes into the arteries or the introduction of air into the

ventricles of the brain. These procedures normally can be done only when the patient is in the hospital, and they involve various degrees of discomfort.

The new EMI Scanner does not make these methods obsolete, but it does offer the radiologist and surgeon a method of mapping out the contents within the skull to make an early, definite and painless diagnosis.

**NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT**

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement of a 9.1-mile section of State Highway 86, extending from the Swisher County Line to the West City Limit of Silverton, in Briscoe County. This project will be developed in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration, therefore FHWA's approval has been requested.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 12-foot travel lanes, with 10-foot paved shoulders.

Proposed improvements will follow the same alignment as the existing highway, except that the centerline of the pavement will be moved 12 feet north. A minimum of 100 feet of right of way will be required from the West City Limit of Silverton, West 1,174 feet; and a minimum of 137 feet will be required for the remainder of the project. The additional right of way will not involve any displacements, or relocations.

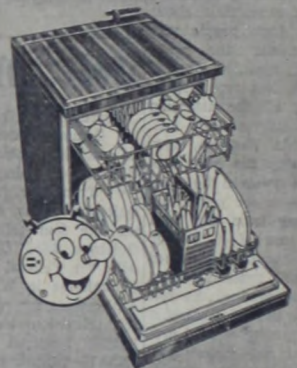
