New Basketball District Alignment Is Announced

Officials of the schools affected were notified last week that the alignments for next year's basketball, track and field and other events has been finalized.

Valley, Silverton, Happy and Nazareth will comprise District 5-B for basketball, track and field, tennis and literary events. All of the four schools in the new district compete in football as well as the other events. In District 4-B where Valley has been competing, Valley was the only school that fielded a football team, one other team, Estelline, fielded a track team and Lakeview was the only other school playing tennis.

The new district should be a well balanced district with no team being an overwhelming favorite at this time, unless it might be the Nazareth girls basketball team, which returns most of this season's team that won regional. Otherwise, they appear to be competitive. And, the Valley girls will be tough again, especially by the time district play rolls around. District play in the new district will not begin until January 18, which will give the teams plenty of time to get ready for the run for the money.

The football alignments announced several months ago will be the same as last year except that Amherst transfers to the South Zone and Silverton comes into the district to fill that spot.

Valley officials report that they are well pleased with the new lineup.

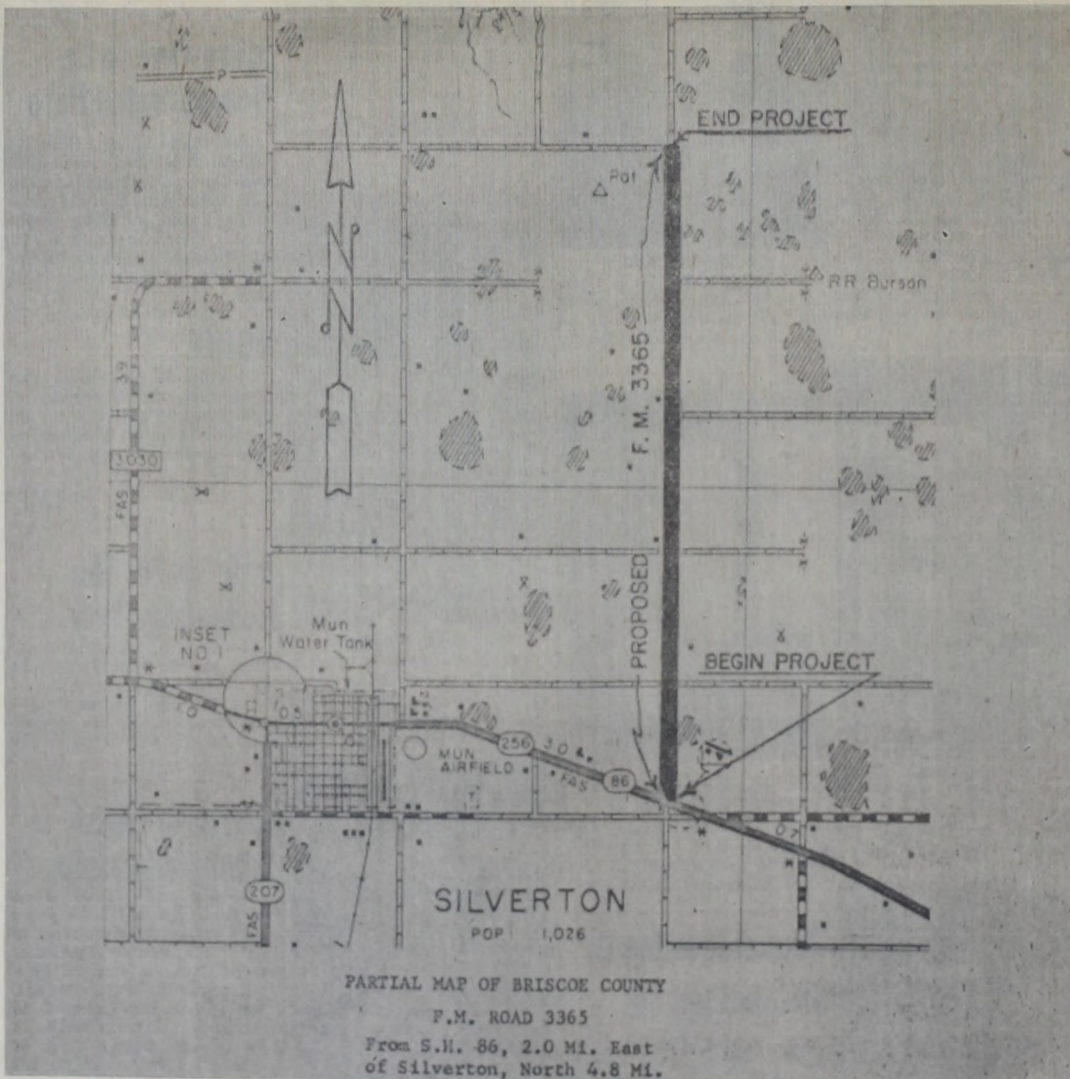

For MH Assn.**

DELAYED FROM LAST WEEK

"There is a real bell, at our National office, which was cast from the shackles and handcuffs that once bound mentally and emotionally disturbed people," said Carroll B. Bryant, president of the Texas Association for Mental Health.

"This bell is now a symbol for the Mental Health Association, ringing out hope for the mentally ill and victory over mental illness," he added.

During May, Mental Health Month, Bellringers will be collecting to help the association continue their work.

Mrs. Arlowene Williams of Turkey will be coordinating the Bell-ringer campaign in her community.

The association's logo, used in conjunction with the slogan "Citizens Who Do Make A Difference" stresses strength through unity, while making full allowance for individual differences.

The logo depicts a group of people standing with hands joined, forming an unbroken circle. In the center is the Mental Health Bell.

The changing shades of people, overlaid on the changing shades of the world in which they live, suggests the power of different individuals united to change conditions. The unbroken circle of people suggests togetherness and unity of organization.

The circle of people with heads toward the bell suggests the many heads concentrating together through an organization trying to find solutions to problems.

That mental health is a full-time, year-round activity is suggested by the fact that there are 12 people forming the circle.

During May citizens here can "make a difference" by contributing to the Mental Health Association.

Area Towns To Share In Funds From HUD

Five Panhandle towns have learned they will share in more than \$11.1 million in Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds, but 17 other cities had their applications for funds rejected by HUD.

The towns of Perryton, Turkey, Memphis, Gruver and Wellington received letters from the HUD area office in Dallas stating they may make final application for community improvement funds.

The funds will come from Community Development Block Grant Non-Metropolitan Discretionary money.

Benny Lawrence, director of Regional Planning for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, said yesterday all 23 towns submitted preapplications for HUD money in January.

He said of 230 Texas communities which submitted preapplications to the Dallas office, only 97 were advised to submit final applications.

Panhandle towns turned down by HUD were Happy, Tulia, Cactus, Kress, Silverton, Wheeler, Panhandle, Stratford, Vega, Miami, Shamrock, White Deer, Spearman, Dumas, Texline, Adrian and Sunray.

Poverty stricken areas, the availability of substantial housing, threats to citizen health and safety, low or moderate income areas and how funds will help implement area wide plans are included in the HUD rating system to determine which towns receive funds.

Lawrence said representatives of several Panhandle towns turned down by HUD have expressed disappointment. He said HUD advised the 17 towns in a letter to re-submit their applications later this year.

The five towns approved by HUD should receive the money applied for if no changes are made in the final applications,

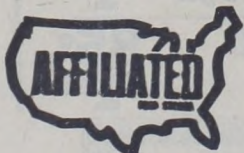
