Patriots Do Well in District Track

The Patriots competed in the District Track Meet at Lefors recently.

The 440 meter relay team composed of Brandon Smith, Eric Scoggins, Thomas Rodriguez and Matt Barrett took first place in district competition with a time of 44.81. They went on to Regional Competition and placed third there.

The 880 meter runner was Joe Silva and he took fourth place in district with a time of 2:17.94.

Matt Barrett won the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.20 and took first place. He went on to Regional competition and took second place, qualifying him for competition in the State Meet.

In the 440 dash, Eric Scoggins took second place with 54.33 time, and Brandon Smith took third with 54.95.

Thomas Rodriguez took second place in the 330 yard dash with a time of 41.52.

Matt Barrett took another first place in the 220 dash with a time of 23.38, and won fifth in this event at the Regional meet.

Joe Silva took fourth place in the 1600 meter run and his time was 5:16.81.

Kirk Saul took sixth place in the 1600 meter run and his time was 5:29.41.

In the mile relay, composed of Brandon Smith, Eric Scoggins, Freddie Ruiz and Thomas Rodriguez, the team took fourth place with a time of 3:39.24.

Thomas Rodriguez took first place in the pole vault going over the 10 foot mark.

Chuck Martin took fifth place in the high jump with 5'8".

Will Williams won second

place in the shot with a put of 46'6" and Rosendo Silva took third place in the shot with a put of 44'10".

Chuck Martin took third place in the long jump with 17'8 3/4", followed closely by Thomas Rodriguez in fifth place with 17'5 3/5".

Rosendo Silva threw the discus 116' to take fourth place in that event.

Kirk Saul threw for sixth place with 111'10".

Phillips School took first place with 145 points, Groom was second with 120 and Valley took third with 119 points. Lefors was next with 68, McLean got 39 points, and Claude finished with 28 points.

Good Turnout of Voters In Quitaque, Turkey

There was a good turnout of voters Saturday, with 279 casting ballots in the Democratic Primary at Quitaque and 270 Turkey residents going to the polls.

Several incumbents were defeated, assuring that new people will be serving in both the Hall County and Briscoe County governments after the first of the year.

Since there are no Republican nominees for the county offices, nomination in the Democratic Primary amounts to election even though it isn't official until the General Election in the fall.

In the race for Commissioner of Hall County Precinct 4, U. F. Coker received 105 Turkey votes, Doyle Proctor captured 93 and the incumbent, Dale Garner, polled 32 votes. In the rest of Precinct 4, Coker polled 32; Proctor, 21; and Garner, 13. Totals in the Precinct were Coker, 142; Proctor, 121, and Garner, 111. This will result in a run-off on June 7 between Coker and Proctor.

Arville Setliff received 670 votes for Hall County Chairman; Lorene Setliff received 293 votes for Precinct 4 Chairperson, and B. J. Robison received 262 votes for Justice of the Peace.

At Quitaque, the Briscoe County Precinct 2 voters went to the

polls and chose former county commissioner J. L. (Jack) Chandler to return to the commissioners' court. Chandler outpolled incumbent Paul A. (Al) Ramsey, 153-146. Four years ago, Ramsey defeated Chandler for the position.

David Brunson garnered 232 votes to gain election as Justice of the Peace of Briscoe County Precinct 2. Incumbent R. E. (Dick) Taylor polled 69 votes.

B. K. Blankenship was re-elected as Precinct Chairman, and Jackie Mercer was re-elected as Briscoe County Democratic Chairperson.

Briscoe County Precinct 2 voters gave the nod, 124-123, to challenger David Cave of Spur as he unseated incumbent District Judge George W. Miller of Floydada. Cave won the District Judgeship by a total of 165 votes in the counties he will serve, which are Briscoe, Floyd, Motley and Dickens.

In other contested county races, Quitaque voters cast 144 votes for challenger Jimmy Brunson as compared with 121 for incumbent County Judge Fred Mercer, who held off the challenge county-wide to return to the office by a 469-434 margin; incumbent County and District Clerk Bess McWilliams won re-election over challenger Mar-

sha Brunson, 626-338, with Quitaque giving Mrs. McWilliams 186 votes as compared to 81 for Mrs. Brunson; Janice Hill won election to the County Treasurer's office over Sandi Tomlin, 765-167, with Quitaque voters giving her a 196-49 majority. There was no incumbent in the race for Treasurer due to the retirement of Mildred Reid.

At Silverton, incumbent County Commissioner Bryant Eddleman was re-elected over challenger Doyle Stephens, 138-71, and incumbent Justice of the Peace James Edwards won re-election over J. L. Self, 402-258.

Approximately 75% of the eligible voters in Briscoe County went to the polls last Saturday.

STATEWIDE RUNOFFS

There will be several runoffs in June to determine both Democratic and Republican nominees for office.

On the Republican side of the slate, there will be runoffs between David Davidson and Aaron L. Bullock, Lieutenant Governor; Ed Walsh and Roy R. Barrera, Attorney General; M. D. Anderson, jr. and Grady T. Yarbrough, Commissioner of the General Land Office, and a probable runoff for Railroad Commissioner between John Thomas Henderson and one of the other candidates. Without this grounding in the love of God, no government or society or way of life will long persevere and the freedoms which we hold so dear will inevitably perish. Therefore, even from a selfish point of view, one should support the Church for the sake of the welfare of himself and his family. Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.

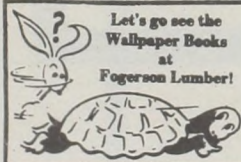

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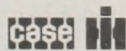
