\$31,459.50 Netted For Youth At County Show

The 1990 Briscoe County Junior Livestock Show was proclaimed as successful and exciting as ever this year as 4-H and FFA members from Valley and Silverton competed with their projects in six divisions.

With 137 animals sold the Premium Sale totalled \$31,459.50.

The Market Lamb show started the day as Warren Wayne Merrell's 114 pound Medium Wool Lamb was named Grand Champion of Show. Christa Tucker had the Reserve Grand Champion of the Show and Warren Merrell won the Showmanship honors in the Lamb Division.

The Steer Show Grand Champion award went to Penny Mars, her 1180 pound crossbred steer was followed by Langdon Reagan's Shorthorn Steer who gained the Reserve Grand Champion honors. Penny Mars was the winner of the Showmanship award in the Steer Division.

The Beef Heifer Show Grand Champion honor went to Jeremiah Brooks. Jeremiah's Hereford Heifer was followed by Cal Farley's heifer which was named Reserve Grand. Jeremiah Brooks won the Showmanship honors in this division.

The Dairy Heifer Show Grand Champion Honors went to Bradley Price, Bradley's Bred heifer was followed by Donnie Calvert's Holstein open heifer who gained the Reserve Grand honors of this Division Brandi Price was the winner of the Dairy Heifer Showmanship award.

The Prospect hog show, participated in by 90 head was won by Will Bomar. Will's Heavy-

weight and Breed champion Hampshire barrow gained Grand Champion honor. Will Bomar also won Reserve Grand of the Show with his Champion crossbred.

The Market hog show saw Julie Graham's Middleweight crossbred named Grand Champion and Bradley Price's Champion Duroc as Reserve Grand Champion. Kirk Garner was named the winner of the Swine Showmanship honor in the Swine Division.

Maupin Finalist For \$3,000 Scholarship

Pasture Land Destroyed By Large Grassfire

Area firefighters battled a raging grassfire Friday afternoon as winds gusting more than 35 miles per hour whipped flames from pasture to pasture engulfing everything in its path.

The blaze, which is believed to have started near the Quitaque river about 15 miles southeast of Quitaque, blackened about a section of pasture and CRP land belonging to Joe Ike Clay of Flomot and Billy Meyer of Turkey. Volunteer firemen from Quitaque, Turkey, Silverton, Matador, Flomot, Floydada and Lockney, as well as friends and neighbors, fought for life and property for more than three and a half hours before bringing the fire under control.

Property damage was high on only one structure, a metal barn belonging to Clay. The barn housed five peanut combines, which were destroyed. One of the combines belonged to Vance Price of Turkey. Firefighters were able to remove a peanut plow from the burning structure, before it was consumed.

One baby calf belonging to Clay was the only reported livestock killed as a result of the blaze.

The cause of the fire had not been reported at press time.

Fire Department members remind citizens to exercise extreme caution when burning trash or grass. Conditions are extremely dry, which can cause a fire to get out of control very quickly.

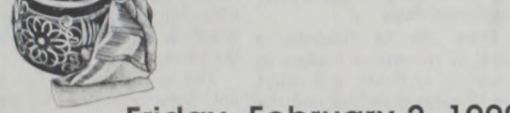

Virgil Blakney Attends Texas Farmers Union Convention

Following the theme of "A Tradition of Pride and Accomplishment for Rural Texans," the Texas Farmers Union completed a three day convention setting a course for restoring prosperity for family farmers and ranchers and all rural Texas. Attending from Turkey was Virgil Blakney, a convention delegate.

Delegates representing farmers and ranchers from across the state heard Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower speak.

Four candidates for governor addressed the convention: Democrats Ann Richards, Mark White

and Jim Mattox and Republican Jack Rains. Comptroller Bob Bullock, the Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor also spoke to the TFU delegates.

Joe Rankin, from Crosby County, was re-elected as president of TFU. Robert Green, from Hartley County, was re-elected as Vice-President. Tim Curtis of Caldwell County was re-elected as Director. New directors are Norbert Schlegel, Wheeler County; Walter Todd, Ft. Bend County; B.R. Parham, McClennan County and Donald Smith, Cottle-King County.

NUEVO STUDY CLUB

The Turkey Nuevo Study Club met January 25 in the home of Mrs. Virginia Degan for their annual noon luncheon meeting with each member bringing a covered dish. Guests present were Mmes. Ginger Morgan, Del Ray House, Mable Morse of Turkey and the guest speaker, Miss Tracy Tomlin of Silvertown. Miss Tomlin is a great niece of Mmes. House and Morse.

Miss Tomlin told of her interesting trip that she had made to Russia with 38 United States students. Slides she had taken pictured the large domed, well cared for Church buildings and other architectural structures in Russia. Miss Tomlin stated she had a bad feeling about the well cared for churches in contrast to the dilapidated homes and lack of modern utilities where the people lived. However, talking with Russian students she learned that the people cared for the church buildings, keeping them in good shape to show their pride for their country, since the government doesn't take care of them. Even newlywed couples often make a gift of money to the church for the upkeep. She also told of the lack of supplies in the country and that it takes about four hours to go through the grocery store lines.

She spoke of the unhealthiness of their public drinking places. About twenty glasses were set out for the people to drink from at each public hydrant, then washed for the crowd for the next day. The public

bathrooms had lots of insects crawling around but she stated the dorm where they stayed was fairly clean but they lacked tissues in the bathrooms. The group had brought tissues with them, and also cokes to drink, but they had to drink them hot as they had no ice.

Miss Tomlin stated that the Russian students work to pass their exams and they only receive a high school education and then expect to have to work for their government. They attend classes until 7 p.m. and the doors stay open until 9 p.m. for students to study. They just complete the eighth grade and then take four years of technical school or secretarial courses. The Russian students look up to the Americans. They copy their way of dressing and

most men smoke because the Americans do. When the American students told the Russian students that Americans were quitting their smoking, they couldn't believe it. It is said that 90 percent of the Russians deal with the black market, trying to get modern American things. They really like American chewing gum and will trade their jewelry and other valuables for it.

Following the program Mrs. Degan presided over a short business meeting. Other club members present were Majorie Bain, Nadine Baisden, Ella Colvin, Kathleen Green, Louise Meacham, Dessie Robertson, Lurline Walker and Wilma Wedge.

Her first step was finding the right medication. She tried nine different non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) before finding one that controlled all of her symptoms. Now she takes Voltaren® (diclofenac sodium), the world's most prescribed antiarthritis medication, introduced to the U.S. in 1988.

Many rheumatology specialists design "whole life" treatment programs for their patients involving medication, exercise and joint protection techniques. In addition, occupational therapists advise making use of adapted devices and changing daily routines to reduce stress on sore and aching joints.

When Ms. Hollis cuts food, for

example, she wields a Swedish, L-shaped knife in which the vertical part of the "L" forms the knife handle. This permits her to use the force of her entire body, displacing the strain from her swollen hand joints.

Voltaren, like other prescription drugs, may have side effects. As with other NSAIDs, the most frequent effects relate to the gastrointestinal tract. Patients should consult a physician regarding the proper use of this medication, and to design a full program of arthritis treatment.

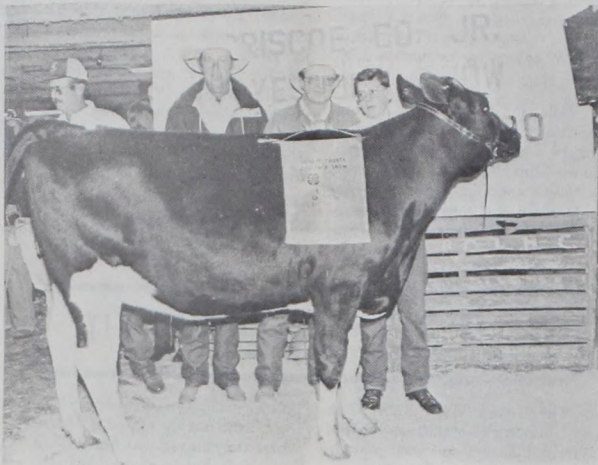
