Valley High Teams Sweep The Slate Over Motley Co.

The Valley High teams scored a clean sweep over Motley County in a four-game series here Tuesday of this week.

Coach David Sanders' JV girls started the victory string in Tuesday's games by taking a 31-24 win over the Motley JV, sparked by Paula Lipscomb's 19 points. Peggy Shannon tossed in nine points and Brenda Coker added three points to the total.

The Valley JV boys took a 42-36 win over the Motley County JV with Jeff Crump leading the way in the scoring column with 13 points. Kenny Chandler was right behind him in the point output with 12 points. Jesse Ferguson hit for five points, Kenneth Helms and Darrell Dowd scored four points each and Lyndall Couch added two points in that game.

In the varsity games, the Valley girls, after a slow first quarter, caught fire and won going away over Motley 62-39. Valley trailed 6-8 at the end of the first quarter but went on to lead 23-17 at the halfway point, 37-21 at the end of three quarters. Mitchie Lipscomb hit for 18 points, Janna Turner and Sherice Price each scored 17 points, Joanie Turner scored six points and Jena Mullin, four points.

Blood Drive To Be Conducted Dec. 22

The Blood Center is a non-profit organization which relies totally on blood donations. They do not buy blood from anyone. The need for fresh and safe blood is great. Every 4 1/2 seconds someone needs a blood transfusion here in the United States. Plan to donate. You could save a life.

Remember that each person who donates receives free blood insurance for the donor and his family for one year. This coverage is good anywhere in the country, at any hospital, and could save you hundreds of dollars.






TEXAS TALK



Salt water ponds made of plastic may be the answer to solar energy supplies for farm buildings. Such a pond would be designed as a solar heat trap. Research on such a contraption is now underway at Ohio State University where they are using a 150-thousand gallon model with a depth of nine feet. Solar ponds are special in that they utilize a black plastic lining and are filled with salt water. The lining attracts and absorbs more heat... salt water keeps the heat from rising to the surface. Fresh, cool water is then pumped through plastic tubes at the bottom of the pond... that water is heated then pumped back through the floor of a building to provide natural heat. Scientists warn of one problem in trying to utilize the pond as a swimming pool... temperatures at the bottom have been measured as high as 194 degrees.
