brough's Champion Spot and Jason Little's Champion Yorkshire. The Lamb show included 48 entries of six breed classes. Warren Merrell's champion Suffolk lamb was named Grand Champion of the show. Buffy Payne's Champion Hampshire lamb was named Reserve Grand Champion. Other breed champions in the Lamb Show included Sandy Lows's fine-wool lamb, Clay Merrell's Fine-wool Cross lamb, Monica Widener's Southdown lamb and Kitsy Payne's OPB lamb. The Steer Show was

Local Educators Attend Workshop

More than eight hundred public school administrators, board member, teachers, employees, and educational organization representatives attended the first annual education-legislative workshop in Lubbock last Sunday and Monday.

The workshop, the first of its kind, was hosted by the newly-appointed chairman of the State Board of Education, Monte Hasie, of Lubbock. Mr. Hasie explained the meeting would be "a good opportunity for school people and their legislators to get together, open communication channels, study current public education and its problems and seek new and better ways to improve our schools in the Panhandle and South Plains districts."

More than 116 school districts from 50 counties were represented, including Valley School. Superintendent Wilburn Leeper, and Board members Robin Harmon and Rusty Henson attended the Sunday session. Leeper and Harmon returned on Monday for the remainder of the workshop.

The program included Senator John Montford, Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance Secretary of State Jack Rains and Commissioner of Education Bill Kirby, as well as numerous legislators from the West Texas area. Board members will receive mandated board training credit hours for their attendance of this workshop.

Valley UMY To Sponsor Workshop

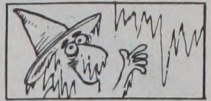

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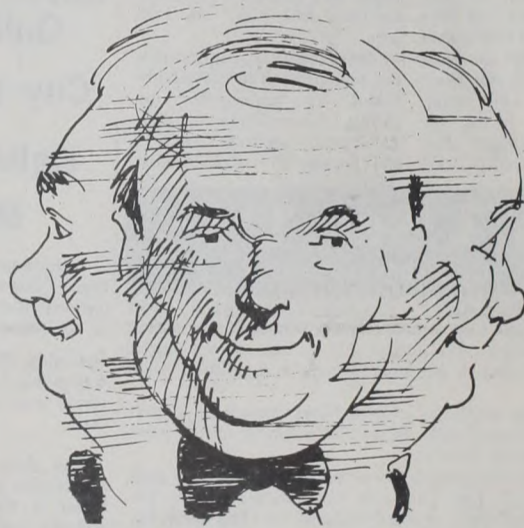

Accent On Health

RE: Measles

The media remains filled with distressing news about the recent outbreak of measles and the need for revaccinations. For every doctor you ask, you get a different answer, as to whether or not you or your child needs another vaccination.

Methodist Hospital in Lubbock states if you are less than 33 years of age, received your last vaccination under the age of 15 months, and received it before 1980, you should be revaccinated.

Although that may be correct, some are having a blood screen (test) done to determine if your still immune to the diseases. If you are, health officials will not administer the vaccine to you, because of a shortage of the vaccine.

The measles (Rubeola) began last November in Houston, and was spread during the Christmas holidays as university students traveled to their homes across the

state. Most cases reported are infants under the age of 15 months and young adults, high school and college age.

Symptoms of Red Measles are fever, runny nose, cough, sore throat, watery eyes and finally on about the fourth

day, a red, itching rash which first appears on the head and face, eventually spreading over the entire body. Experts say if the rash does not develop by the fourth or fifth day, it is not the

measles. An infected person may not know they have contracted the measles, and will be contagious for several days before symptoms began to appear, therefore exposing others unknowingly.

The current outbreak should not be confused with Rubella, German Measles, which can cause serious birth defect in babies of infected mothers.

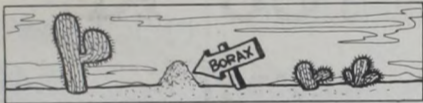
Brownie troop # 366 joined other Daisy and Brownie Scouts in Plainview on February 11, 1989, for a fun-filled afternoon.

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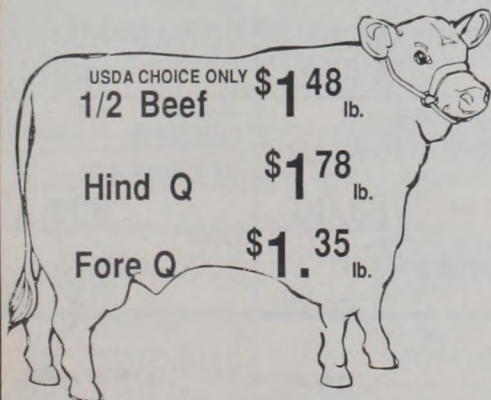
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Mrs. Jeff Fuston Honored With Shower

A. Yes. The tax law requires parents apply for and receive Social Security numbers for children five or older.

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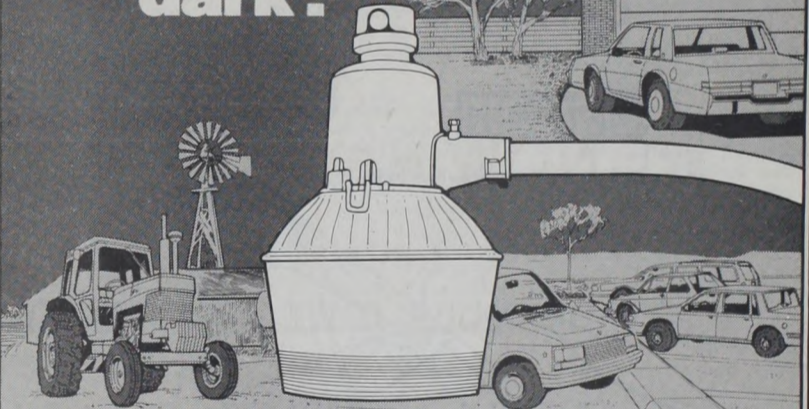
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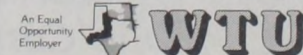


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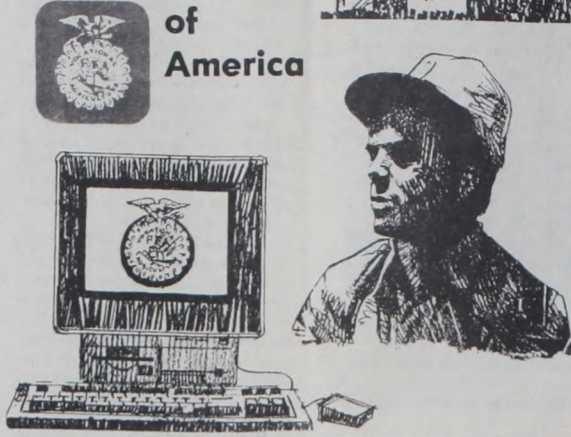

Constant movement through the water compensates for the animal's low blood pressure and small heart.

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American Ag Movement Celebrates Anniversary

The American Agriculture Movement came to Washington, D.C. last week with their tractors. The family farm advocacy group spent the past week in Washington celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Tractorcade to D.C., and meeting with members of congress to discuss the farm agenda for 1989, a year that promises to bring several tough legislative challenges.

"When we came to Washington 10 years ago on our tractors, we had no idea that the protest movement would evolve into a permanent farm organization capable of aggressively fighting for family farmers year after year," said AAM Texas president Don Kimbrell. "But, we've done it, and we've been able to win some real victories for farmers. We intend to continue this fight until our federal farm policies once again make it possible for farmers to make a decent living."

Proposed agricultural budget cuts, Farm Bill reauthorization, increased excise taxes, foreign trade proposals, groundwater contamination, expanded ethanol production and farm debt restructuring were among the many issues of concern discussed over the last few days, ending with a joint farm group agricultural trade meeting last Friday.

"We've come a long way in these first ten years," said David Senter, AAM's National Director. He added, "The work we did last year was crucial to win passage of the Agricultural Credit Act and the Drought Emergency Assistance Act, and to repeal the excise tax on diesel fuel for on-farm use. This puts us in a good position to carry on the fight for the family farmer in 1989."

Of particular concern to AAM is the proposed federal budget cut

which would further reduce income to farmers and significantly limit the availability of farm credit. "We're willing to do our part to solve the budget deficit," said AAM National president Harvey Joe Sanner, "but we can do that without bankrupting the family farmer. AAM will be working with Congressional leaders to come up with a plan to save the necessary dollars without reducing prices farmers receive for their commodities.

Hundreds of family farmers traveled to Washington D.C. to participate in various seminars and meetings with congressional leaders during the week, including E.G. and Barb Reed from Quitaque, Texas, and several others throughout the State.

AAM hosted a giant Fish Fry and Chicken Feed with live country music on Tuesday for 800 people, including many Senators and Congressmen, congressional aides, friends of AAM and farmers from around the country who had come to participate in the celebration. "It's a great way to bring everyone together, introduce new folks and take care of business," said Sanner, a rice and soybean farmer from Arkansas. "This year's event is a stark contrast to our experience ten years ago, when we sat outside the Capitol on our tractors in the snow."

Sweet surprises: The discoveries of the artificial sweeteners most popular today were all accidents of the laboratory. But according to *International Wildlife* magazine, future breakthroughs in sweetening may come from exotic plants. One super sweetener is miracle fruit. The plant's small red berries are calorie free and one thousand times sweeter than sugar.

AGRICULTURAL MILESTONES

LEAN BEEF, in the wide range currently available in your local supermarket, has been a long time coming.

But market surveys, made in the middle 1950s by economists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, reported consumers wanted leaner beef.

Many producers dismissed these results, because "consumers also want tender beef, which is dependent on fat."

This is a mistaken idea. A Texas agricultural scientist, in the mid-1940s, conducted a series of studies on lamb and beef and discovered that tenderness is heritable but is negatively affected by the age of the animal at slaughter.

The scientist also proved that tenderness is not closely related to fatness of the animal but is dramatically affected by the method and final temperature of cooking.

Her findings have been verified over the years, and have proven significant to modern meat studies on red meats. Fat's major contribution, in the form of marbling (the flecks of fat in the lean portion), seems to be added flavor and juiciness.

In recent years, Experiment Station research on a national scale, done in conjunction with cattlemen's organizations, has proven that a sizeable segment of consumers do want lean beef.

Other research has brought about changes in grading, processing, and marketing so that the lean, heavily-trimmed beef offered in the supermarket today is in large part attributable to this research.
