Mrs. Elliott had lived in Amarillo since 1945. She was born in Utica, Mississippi, and taught school in Mississippi. She was a member of the San Jacinto United Methodist Church, where she had taught Sunday School for more than 20 years. In 1915, the former Eula Mae Alsop married Willie D. Elliott, who preceded her in death while the family lived here in Turkey, prior to their move to Amarillo.

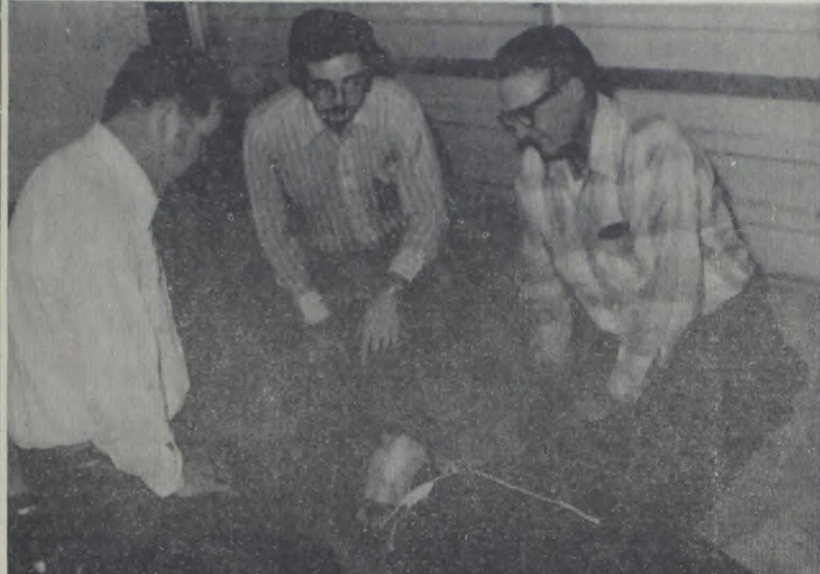
Mrs. Baker was born at Wynne Wood, Oklahoma and grew up in Comanche County. She married Jesse B. Barker in 1911. He died in 1937.

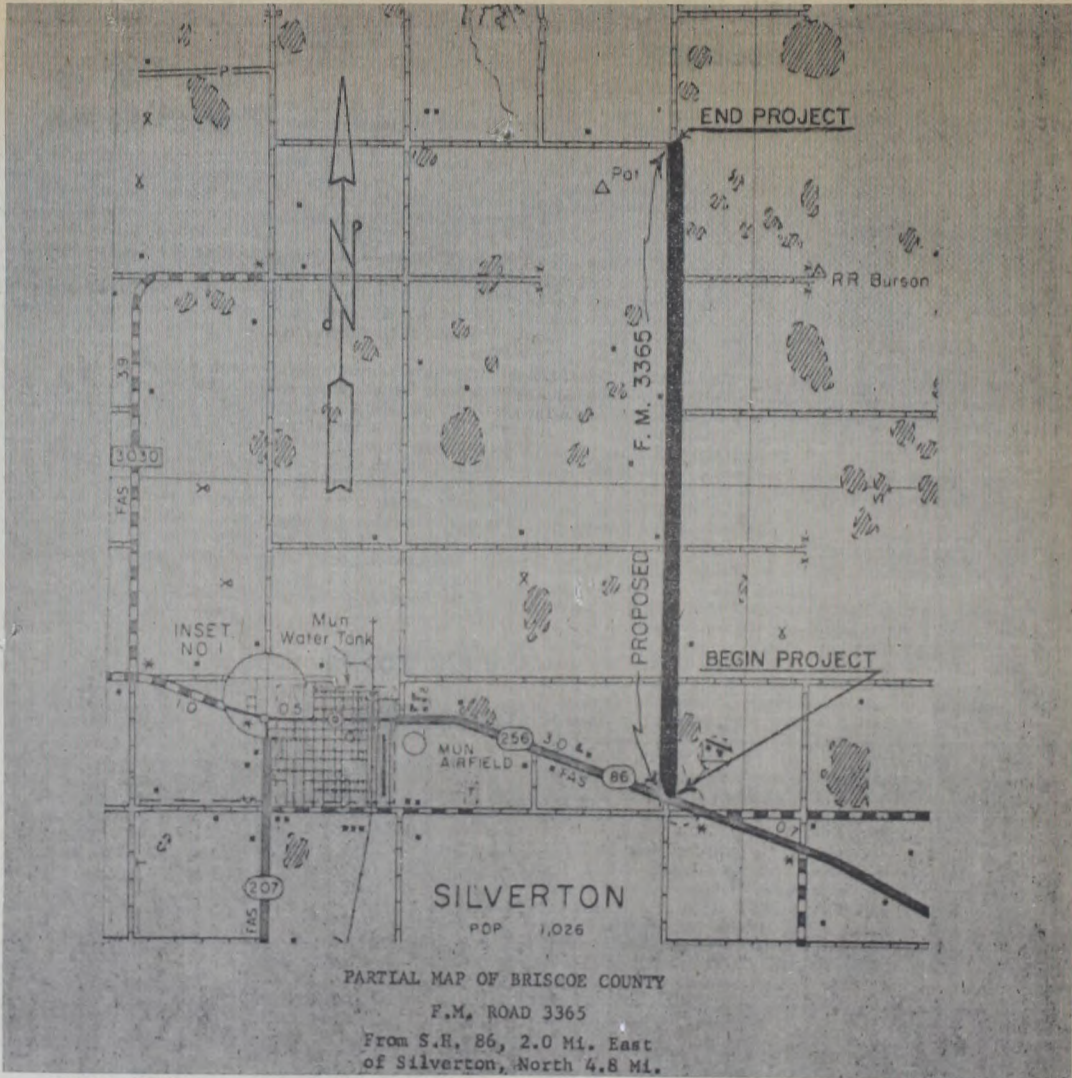
