City, School Elections Held

Jake Merrell is the new mayor of Quitaque. He received 73 votes in last Saturday's city election and replaces Pete Rice as mayor. Mr. Rice has retired after serving more than twenty years as a councilman and as mayor.

Three councilmen were elected in Saturday's election.

Incumbent Joe Bedwell was returned to a spot on the City Council with 55 votes; and D. W. "Butch" Baca won the other spot with 44 votes. Ray Doyle Ramsey received 40 votes.

Murry Morrison, who was a candidate to fill the unexpired term of the late M. L. Roberson, received 76 votes.

In the Quitaque School Trustee election held last Saturday, Rex Johnson was elected to the Board, receiving 75 votes; and Dale Smith with 62 votes, was the other winner. Incumbent Arthur Patrick received 37 votes.

SOYBEAN REFERENDUM MEETINGS SLATED

Eleven meetings are slated on the High Plains for the week of April 13 to explain a soybean referendum to producers in 11 counties. These meetings are required prior to a certification by the state commissioner of agriculture for the Texas Soybean Association for the Texas Soybean Association.

Purpose of the referendum is to raise funds with which to conduct programs of education, research, disease and insect control and marketing relating to soybeans. The referendum calls for an assessment of one-half of one cent per bushel of soybeans produced, according to Briscoe County Agent Kenneth Cook.

An educational program will be conducted at each of the meetings to explain the provisions of the referendum and to give a brief rundown of the soybean industry in the area, state and nation, points out Cook.

For soybean producers in Briscoe County, the meeting will be held on April 13 at 7:30 p. m. in the Pioneer Room of the First State Bank at Silverton.

Speaker at each of the meetings will be W. B. Tilson of Plainview, president of the Texas Soybean Association, and John Stephens, field representative of the American Soybean Association. Marvin Sartin of Lubbock, Extension area farm management specialist, will be on hand at the District 2 meetings and Dr. Bob Metzger, also of Lubbock and Extension area agronomist, will speak at the meetings in Hale, Floyd and Briscoe counties.

Cook urges all soybean producers in Briscoe and surrounding counties to attend the upcoming referendum meeting so that they will be able to make a knowledgeable choice when election time for the referendum rolls around. A two-thirds majority vote will be required and producers will also be selecting a nine-man governing board to administer the proposed program.

Soybean producers on the High Plains estimated at about 4,000, grow about 75 percent of the state's total crop, adds Cook. So it's important that all producers understand the referendum.

 broilers, bringing \$73,000,000 gross
 income. Texas ranked sixth in

 broiler income.

Quitaque egg farm, which is

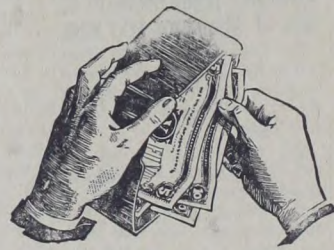
