Old Tribune Equipment Leaves Town

A bit of history left Quitauque Tuesday afternoon as equipment from the old newspaper office was moved. An old paper cutter and a printing press were dismantled and moved out on a flat bed trailer along with other equipment from the Paducah Post printing office.

Although the equipment has been in Quitauque 30 years, it is much older as the Gaston Owens purchased the cutter in 1960 from the newspaper at Aspermont and the press from the Herald in Plainview. Today, this equipment is considered obsolete and is no longer used even by small town newspapers. This printing press, cutter and other equipment will eventually wind up in Old Mexico to be used in its original capacity.

Phone Service Temporarily Interrupted

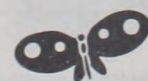
