Phil Cates Retds Returned Questionnaires

"The people of the 66th Legislative District care about good government," Rep. Phil Cates said today, as responses to his opinion poll continue to pour into his Austin office.

"People in my 10-county district are returning the questionnaires by the hundreds," Rep. Cates noted, "and their concern for the issues we are facing in State Government is most impressive."

Some 16,000 questionnaires, which were neither printed nor mailed at State expense, were sent out from Cates' Austin office April 13.

"I read every questionnaire personally and welcome your comments, suggestions, and support," Rep. Cates stated, noting that it is his continuous pledge to remain close to the people of his district and vote their views.

"I wish each one could be here with me to share in the decision-making on a daily basis, but since this is not practical, I seek your

suggestions and advice by means of the questionnaires," Cates said. "I can then take a stronger stand for our people in Austin and better serve our district."

He stressed that anyone from the district who did not receive a questionnaire and would like a copy, to please contact his office at the State Capitol.

Many early responders have made favorable comments on the questionnaires, Cates said, some stating this was the first time the opinion of the voters had ever been asked for on State matters.

Questions on the sheet include topics on taxes, education, water development, labor, crime, horse racing and pari-mutuel betting, insurance, and economy in State government. Space was left for comments on how the reader believes State Government can be improved.

Cates said he was tabulating the questionnaires as they came in, and would announce the results when they were finished.

One For Christ

Several churches have received form letters to mail to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Manned Space Craft Center, Astronauts Office, Houston, Texas 77059, to add their support to the decision of the astronauts to read the Bible from their space craft as they orbited the moon during December 1968.

INFORMATION FOR LOAN APPLICATIONS FOR SWISHER AND BRISCOE COUNTIES

Farmers in Swisher and Briscoe Counties, Texas who had suffered crop or property losses because of the drought and other natural disasters during the period of January 1, 1972 through June 1972, who have not received an Emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, 219 Northwest Second Street, Tulia, Texas, on or before May 8, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for Emergency loans at 1 percent interest. In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000, based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

From The County Agent's Desk

LOW QUALITY — A PROBLEM
LUBBOCK — Producers will again be faced with the possibility of using low quality seed in planting their 1973 crop.

Weather conditions in 1972 that resulted in low micronaire lint, says Dr. Robert B. Metzger, also contributed to the production of immature seed. Metzger is the area agronomist-cotton with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The result," he says, "was a heavy cleanout at delinting plants to obtain acceptable seed or planting."

"These seed are often low in vigor even though they show satisfactory germination. Even heavy and fully developed seed frequently deteriorated in the field due to unfavorable weather. Early harvest produced exceptionally high quality seed in these fields, but seed quality became progressively worse as harvest was delayed due to wet fields," he reports.

The agronomist explains that since high quality is basic to getting cotton crop off to a rapid start, every effort should be made to secure the best quality seed possible. The cost of planting seed represents only five percent or less of total production cost. So, trying to cut cost here by purchasing so-called bargain seed can be most costly in terms of poor stands, replanting and finally low

yields. High quality seed will contribute to more rapid seedling emergence, uniform stands which can better tolerate cold, wet conditions associated with seedling decay organisms.

"In many instances, producers have no choice but to plant lower than desired quality seed," Metzger adds.

"In this case, he should plant his best quality seed first when weather conditions during early spring are more favorable for seedling emergence. As the planting season advances and soil becomes warmer, the grower can use lower quality seed after the other seed has been exhausted."

A good rule of thumb, he says is to allow the soil temperature at the eight-inch depth to average 60 degrees Fahrenheit for 10 days before planting. A significantly higher percentage and more rapid emergence of seedlings will be obtained if this soil temperature is reached at planting. This is even more critical if lower quality seed are planted.

In using low quality seed, the planting rate may be increased by five to ten percent depending on the level of seed quality. The Extension specialist warns that excessive increase in planting rate can worsen matters by causing a buildup of seed decay organisms in the drill row. In order to adjust planting rates properly, a grower must know the germination percent and quality of the seed he is about to plant. He should make sure that seed are treated with a recommended fungicide.

If producers have to plant low quality seed Metzger concludes, they should delay planting until the soil warms up, increase seeding rates slightly and prepare a good seed bed preferably on a bed.

SOIL MAPS AVAILABLE FOR SALE TO THE PUBLIC

A multi-colored general soil map of Texas has now been published and is available for sale to the public, a local conservation official said this week.

Henry Gregory, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Memphis, said the beautiful 36 x 45-in. map can be seen at his office. It shows soil information compiled from years of detailed soil survey work by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Gregory said the map lists basic soil information which should be useful to teachers, planners, conservationists, contractors, engineers, developers, realtors, farmers, ranchers, researchers, and others.

The map gives color delineations of the 73 major soil associations (containing 161 separate soil series) in the state and their extent. It also lists special limitations of the soils that affect their use. Inset maps show rainfall, temperature, and length of the growing season across the state. Current and potential urban and rural uses by soil associations are also listed.

For mounting on a wall, Gregory recommended the two-sheet style. For folding and filing, he said the map printed on both sides might be the best.

The map may be purchased from the Department of Agriculture Communications, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

Order blanks can be obtained from the SCS office at Memphis or from the County Extension Agent's office at Memphis.

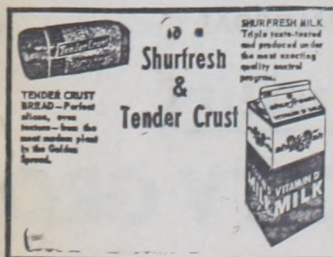
