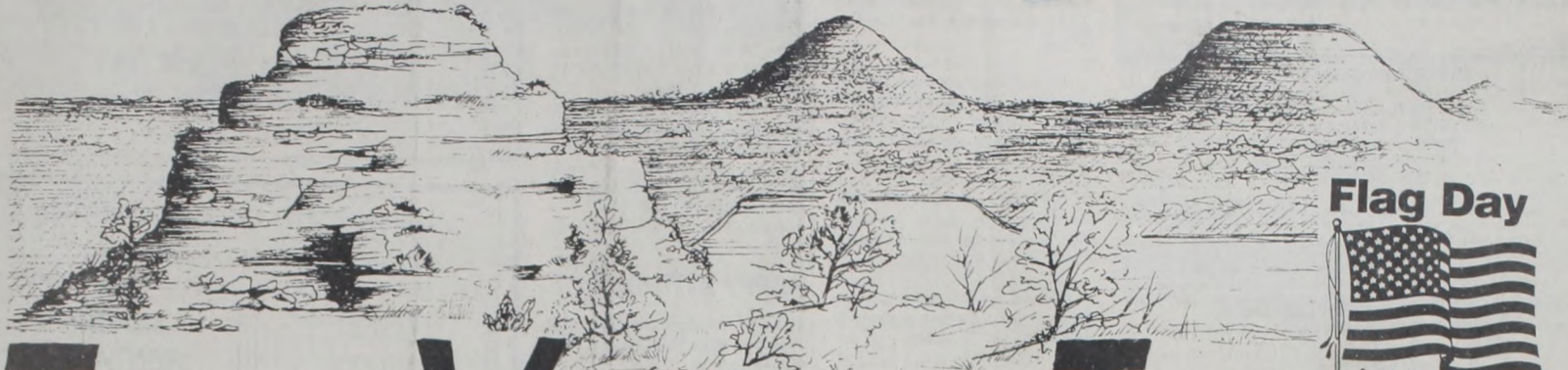

Hall County Centennial Monument Being Readied

An attractive monument commemorating 100 years of existence of Hall County, Texas is soon to be placed on the courthouse lawn in Memphis. The monument is being prepared by Wallace Monument Company and is being donated by Mr. and Mrs. Ben Parks.

The centennial logo, which has been used on all items such as the flags being flown in Hall County, seals and souvenirs, will be used as the major design on the monument. The dedicatory message honoring the pioneers of Hall County will be on the reverse side. This is the same

wording as is printed on the commemorative coins being sold for the centennial celebration. Target date for dedication of the monument is set for the third weekend in September, which is the date of the annual Hall County Celebration.

Thrips Threatening Area Cotton Crops

The Cotton Belt is sitting on a powder keg of damage that thrips can do to cotton, according to articles from several cotton magazine and insect reports. Extension agent Mark Brown from Crosby/Floyd County, reports the primary insect pest now is the cotton thrips. Thrips counts in fields are averaging 3-5 per plant in 3-4 leaf cotton.

The highest count recorded was an average of 13 thrips per acre on 2 leaf cotton. Treatment level is when 4-5 on 2 leaf cotton are found. This cotton did not have systemic at planting time. Another farmer from Hall County said all his cotton looks good that was treated with systemic, but one field he planted with seed not treated, was being damaged by thrips.

Thrips come out of wheat to cotton when the wheat ripens. The problem wheat strips in our area cotton are going to make the thrip problem worse this year, so according to all reports, fields need to be checked close to save damage to cotton that can be set back two weeks because of the thrips. Thrip damage looks a lot like sand blast on young cotton.

- Miss Rolling Plains, ages 14-18.

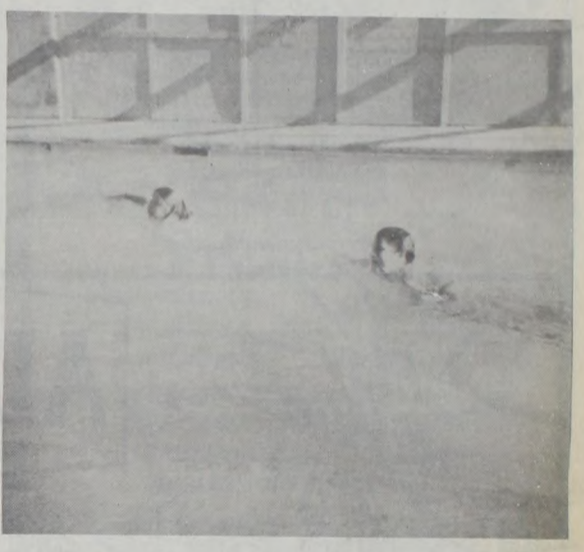

Government commodities will be distributed in Turkey at the Bob Wills Community Center on Tuesday, June 19, 1990 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

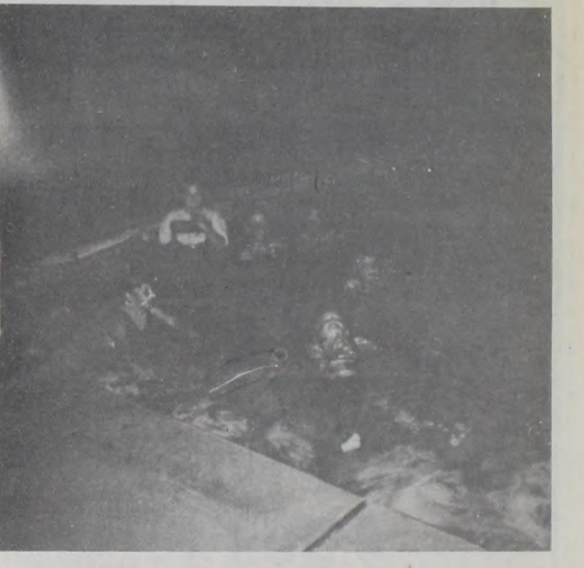
Emergency Haying, Grazing Approved

They are also required to certify that the designated ACR or CU acreage has not been irrigated in 1990 and will not be irrigated until after the 5-month non-grazing period. Lines From Lynda

If you think child car restraints are confining, what about a body cast-or a coffin?

Observation surveys in 34 rural Texas counties shows that three out of four rural children ride unrestrained or incorrectly restrained. My personal observations have noted mothers holding infants on their lap while driving, children standing up in pickup and car seats and between car seats, and children left unrestrained in automobiles with the motor running at the post office or grocery store.

Parents, your infant or child cannot buckle up himself. You are the only one who can protect him. Grandparents and child care people, too, need to take responsibility for buckling up the children in their care.

Have you ever stopped to think that your child could become a human missile if you had to make a sudden stop or if someone ran into you? It is not humanly possible to restrain a child with your arms. If they are riding in your lap, they could be crushed between you and the steering wheel or dash.

The Texas Highway Department has determined that rural Texans are not buckling up their children in child safety seats or seat belts and have asked the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to use their extensive educational network to manage the Rural Child Passenger Safety Education Project. In the first year of the project in 34 rural Texas counties, 72.8 percent of the 4,891 observations showed children rode either unrestrained or incorrectly restrained. The survey found that parents driving pickup trucks were significantly less likely to restrain their children.

I realize that the cost of correct child car safety seats can be prohibitive to many families. Some communities have a child safety seat loan program. If you have an approved child car safety seat you no longer use and would loan it to some other family, call me at 823-2131. It might be that one of the clubs in each community would like to take this on as a community service project.

There are probably many seats out there being stored in garages, closets, or attics that could be loaned to another family for a short period of time or to a grandparent who has a little one coming to visit. I will be glad to coordinate such a project or assist a club in organizing a loan program if there is interest and cooperation from the communities.
