Crop Reports From Farmers Needed

During the last half of May, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Cary D. Palmer, Agricultural Statistician for the State of Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for each county. There are 25 counties in Texas and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry—agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Farmers Showing Referendum Interest

Fred Mercer of Silverton, Briscoe county leader of the Amarillo-based Texas Wheat Producers Association said today that "individual farmers are showing an increasing interest in the forthcoming wheat referendum and producer board election as a step toward strengthening their income from wheat through stronger organized producer efforts."

Wheat farmers in 34 counties of Texas that normally produce 75% of the state's 50 million bushel wheat crop vote Tuesday, May 11 in a research and promotion referendum. If passed by 2/3 of the growers voting, an assessment of not more than 5 mills per bushel will be made at the first point of sale on all wheat marketed in the area. Proceeds from the program, if passed, will be invested in research in production and marketing, disease and insect control, and market development at home and abroad.

The referendum is being sponsored by the Texas Wheat Producers Association on certification by John C. White, Commissioner, Texas Department of Agriculture, under authority of the Texas Referendum Act of 1969, passed by the 61st legislature.

Leo Witkowski, Hereford, president of Texas Wheat Producers Association, said that "wheat has been a declining crop in Texas the past few years from the standpoint of acreage planted, harvested and marketed." He pointed out that "this decline has been very costly in terms of loss in income, not only to the producer, but also to the elevators handling wheat, and to the entire agricultural economy dealing in servicing, financing, transporting, and supplying the wheat farmer. Passage of this wheat referendum would provide funds to initiate development projects which might help in reversing the decline in the wheat industry and increase producer income from wheat."

"Passage of the Wheat Producers Referendum in Texas is a must," according to State Representative Delwin Jones of Lubbock. Mr. Jones, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Texas House of Representatives, stated, "Those of us in state and national legislative bodies are watching to see if farmers are really concerned about their problems. When insects, disease and other problems need immediate attention, the legislature is usually willing to help solve them when farmers themselves show enough concern to help with the costs, such as could be done with the passage of the wheat referendum."

Since passage of the 1969 Commodity Referendum Act, successfully led through the legislature by Representative Jones, producers of peanuts, turkeys, grain sorghum and soybeans have held referendums and voted self-assessments for research and promotion of their commodities.

Carl Dumler, president of Great Plains Wheat, Inc., which conducts market expansion programs abroad for U. S. wheat producers, recently reported that "we could hasten the acceptance of types, quality and purchase of wheat grown in the United States by many potential foreign users if we had a larger budget to work with—foreign market development is a lot harder today than it was even five years ago, so the American farmer will have to work harder through commodity groups like Texas Wheat Producers Association to get and keep his share of the expanding wheat markets around the world."

The percentage of the funds generated by the program, if passed, that will be directed toward insect and disease control, foreign and domestic market development and production or marketing research will be determined by a 9-man producer board elected on

Ray Doyle Ramsey's Farm Store and Appliances was hit by burglars between 3 and 4 a. m. last Friday morning, the robbers taking two

television sets, a stereo record player and a clock radio tape player, tape recorder, and two socket sets, all valued at more than \$900.

Nightwatchman Grady Cunningham discovered the robbery at 4 a. m. and notified Mr. Ramsey. Grady stated that he made his rounds at 3 o'clock and had checked the door at that time and all was well.

The sheriff's department was notified immediately and they in turn radioed the word to law officers all over the area.

Sheriff's deputies, Texas Rangers and city detectives in Lubbock apprehended three suspects there 11:45 a. m. after receiving information about the Quitaque robbery. Mr. Ramsey was called and he drove to Lubbock and identified items taken from his store and recovered all that was taken from his store except a couple of the smaller items. Three men were in custody charged with the robbery and it was reported that a fourth man took part in the break-in and that his identity is known. The men were moved to the Briscoe County jail at Silverton.

This was the third time for the firm to be robbed.

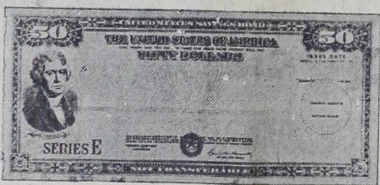

FAMILY HAS A BALL

We're a family of inveterate ball players. Depending on the weather and our moods, our weekends are filled with baseball, touch football, basketball, tennis, running bases or just having a catch.

One recent rainy day, my daughter told us how surprised she was, in reading Homer's "Odyssey" in junior high school, to find two references to ball playing.

Armed with this precious bit of intelligence, we went scurrying to the encyclopedia to find out more.

We found out that the ball has been used since prehistoric times, being mentioned in earliest recorded literature and in graphic representations. Ancient Roman baths even had a separate room for ball playing.

Earliest descriptions tell the experts that the ancient ball was made of leather strips sewn together and filled with various materials.

The smallest was a hard ball filled with feathers. The largest had an air filled bladder similar to our basketball.

That brings me to the newest development in the fascinating world of ball playing. It's the Porky Ball being introduced by Ideal Toy Corporation. The Porky Ball—Porky is for porcupine—is round like a ball, but its soft plastic points make it incredibly easy to catch and throw.

None of us can figure out why, but once we start playing with it, we can't stop. More good news is that the Porky Ball is being given away free for a limited time by participating toy dealers all over the country.

CREATIVE CRAFT IDEAS

Springtime Re-Decorating with Color

With the change of season come thoughts for a change of surroundings. The easiest way to change your immediate surroundings is with a change of color and with creative tie-dye accents.

The magical effects of tie-dye are easy to do for such things as curtains, pillow covers, bed spreads, fabric coverings for boxes, waste baskets and lamp shades and for striking wall hangings. The ancient art involves use of fabric, rubber bands and all purpose dye. The process is really simple, tie the fabric then dye it. The ties resist penetration of dye resulting in pattern lines on a dyed background.

The choice of colors and pattern effects are up to you. The results will be creative and original as no two tie-dyes are exactly alike. You can dye any washable material except for some of the polyesters and acrylics and glass or mineral fibers. Material can be white or light colored. You may want to experiment first to test color results and determine the best patterns.

For a striking sunburst wall hanging: Start with a large piece, about 54 inch square, of fabric such as cotton sailcloth. After laundering, lay wet fabric out flat. Mark a point for center of sunburst. Pick up point and secure tightly just below point with rubber bands. Holding center, twist and smooth remaining fabric down, securing tightly at frequent intervals.

Prepare dye solution (starting with lightest color to be used first) by mixing 1/4 cup liquid or dissolving 1/2 package powder Rit all purpose dye into 1 quart hot water. (Increase amount of dye solution as needed using a container large enough to avoid crowding.) Heat to simmering.

Immerse tied fabric into solution and stir for about 15 minutes. Remove ties and rinse well in cool water.



Starting at same center point, retie as before, twisting fabric so that undyed or lightly dyed areas are on the outside. Immerse into next dye solution. Continue this process, using remaining dye solutions, until there are no undyed areas remaining. Rinse well after each dyeing. When finished, untie and rinse again thoroughly under running water until water runs clear. Hang to dry and iron while still slightly damp.



To mount your new wall hanging, stretch it over a wooden frame and secure with staples. Finish edges with tape or hem all edges and hang by dowel sticks through top and bottom. 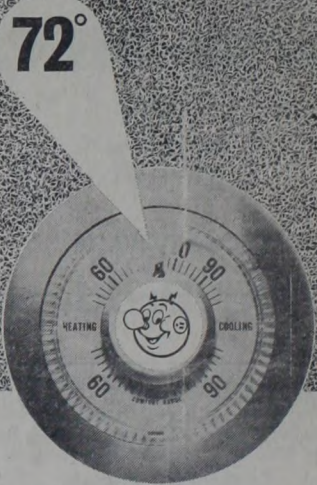
