### O. E. Chandler Named Outstanding Farmer

O. E. (Babe) Chandler has been selected as the outstanding Conservation Farmer of the year in the Caprock Soil & Water Conservation District. Chandler did an outstanding job of protecting his very sandy irrigated cropland with rye cover crops. He overseeded cotton with rye early in the fall. The rye was ready to graze in January and some fields are still being grazed. Chandler also improved his irrigation system by installing irrigation pipeline.

Rye cover crops can be used on any soil in the county. They are especially beneficial on loose sand. These sandy soils suffered severe wind erosion damage where they were not protected with cover crops or crop residues during the past winter and spring. Wheat is another crop that can be used as an overseeded cover crop. The acreage in cover cropping has steadily increased during the past three years.
