PET VACCINATION CLINIC SET FOR QUITAQUE FRIDAY, APRIL 23

Quitaque FFA Advisor Fred Kellum has announced that a Pet Vaccination Clinic will be held at the Fire Hall in Quitaque on Friday, April 23 beginning at 1:00 p. m. Dr. Paul Glasen, Lockney Veterinarian will administer the rabies vaccinations. He will be assisted by the FFA boys.

Mr. Kellum stated that a survey will be made to find out how many will want to have their pets vaccinated in order for the doctor to know how much serum to bring.

Everyone is urged to have their pets vaccinated because there are many rabid skunks being reported all over the Panhandle-South Plains area.

There has been only one actual known case of a pet being bitten by a skunk here at Quitaque this year, but a puppy was bitten by a skunk a few days ago and was witnessed by the owner of the pet. The skunk escaped but the pup is now being kept under observation by a Vet.

Twice this year Lockney has had people bitten by a skunk the latest a six year old girl, and Floydada has had one report of a person being attacked and bitten by a skunk.

Price of the vaccinations will be \$3.00 and the local FFA will share in the proceeds for helping to hold the animals and keeping the records. It is better to be safe than sorry so all pet owners are urged to have them vaccinated.

The firm distributes oil, gasoline, diesel and L-P gas to a wide area around Turkey. They also service L-P-G equipment.

"How long have we between two opinions? If the Lord be God, follow 3:15, 16). He craves our undivided

God hates "lukewarmness" (Rev. Jim.) 1 Kings 18:21.

The Lord Jesus reminded His disciples that "no man can serve two masters" (Mt. 7:24). Yet the church is filled with compromise. Some are neither "hot" or "cold"; and as a result their testimony is insipid and their "salt" has lost its savor. One of the problems, of course, is that people are just too busy today to take time out for meditation, Bible study, and prayer. Few have given the Lord their bodies (Rom. 12:1, 2) and most shun away from the rigors of the unflinching allegiance required by discipleship.

A man writing in The Sunday School Journal tells how he was returning from visiting some friends in Washington one cold night in January when the train on which he was riding stopped suddenly. He finally asked the conductor what was wrong. "A coach is off the track up ahead," he said. "Come and I'll show you." Investigating they found the car in such a position to block tracks entirely. Turning to the conductor the man said, "It seems to me the car is not off the track; if it were, we could go on." "That's right," replied the trainman. "The trouble is it's partly on and partly off." So, too, those who hinder the work of Christ's Kingdom are not so much the blatant un-believers, but rather those un-consecrated Christians who are half-on and half-off the track!
