Turkey Insurance Key Rate Lowered

Mrs. Loetta Ferguson of Ferguson Insurance in Turkey announces that Turkey has had a change in its Key Rate from a former 57 cents rate to a low of 43 cents now.

Before this change could be brought about, Mrs. Ferguson and her employees made a survey of

the town of Turkey, checking on how many shingled roofs and how many composition roofs existed in the community. Previously Turkey had been written up with more shingled roofs than composition, which Mrs. Fuston was able to get changed because the figures had been reversed and no reports had been made by the local Fire Marshall and Fire Department Secretary.

The new Fire Marshall, Byron Young, and Secretary, Ronald Lynn Mullin, have been making their reports, which has improved the city's credit, and the report of the Duplicate Pumping Unit on the fire truck along with a report of the paved streets has been another asset giving even more credit.

All this has been brought about due to the work of Loetta Ferguson and her staff to help Turkey receive credit for this lower rate of 43 cents.
