Wildlife Resource Promotion Organized

The County Extension Livestock Program Building Committee invited all landowners, farmers and ranchers to a public meeting May 10 in Silvertown, and this meeting was attended by approximately 40 interested citizens.

The meeting was chaired by Jimmy Burson, Livestock Committee Chairman, and Dirk Aaron, County Extension Agent. Burson presented to the group a set of plans developed by the Livestock Committee with a goal to promote the county's lakes, State park, and the wildlife hunting leases available in the area. Those present were very supportive of the idea and as a group set guidelines for carrying out the plans.

The first goal is to develop a county resource guide. This guide will give historical information, information about Lake

Mackenzie, information about Caprock Canyons State Park, a list of hunting leases available in the county, and information about supportive businesses in Briscoe County.

The group will then begin advertising the county's natural resources and recreation spots in major newspapers and magazines across the state. Those who respond to the ads will receive a copy of the guide. The ultimate goal is to let people across the state know about Briscoe County and what it offers and to assist those who wish to lease their land for hunting (mule deer, aoudad, turkey, pheasant, dove, quail and varmits). Local businesses are urged to join in with the promotion plan. By doing so, they will have a spot in the guide that describes their business, location and what they have to offer people who are in the

county for a short period of time.

To reserve a spot in the guide, each interested person needs to develop a one-page description of the land available, wildlife for hunting, person to contact to lease, number of acres, camping facilities, if available, if trail guides are available, address, telephone number. Don't include the cost of the lease.

The cost to join in the promotion is \$25.00. This money will be used for publication of the guide and cost of advertising in newspapers and magazines. Each lessor of land and business who advertises in the guide will pay the \$25.00 per year fee. The fee for one page description of land available or the business to advertise will be due in the County Extension Office by July 1, 1986. This will insure that the guide will be published and distributed by August 1. Make all checks payable to Briscoe County Wildlife Promotion fund.

This same group will sponsor a hunters' breakfast to kick off pheasant season. Proceeds from the hunters' breakfast will also be used for the advertising program.

There has not been much profit, but we have been very happy in serving the people of this area. The town of Turkey was added a few years later, and to us, the area is just "one big happy family." In 1970, then the editor, Gaston Owens, suffered a heart attack, the "Mrs." began in a capacity which seemed impossible at the time, but with the help (and none of you can realize how much help) of the Briscoe County News, the two little towns have had a community newspaper.

Thanks to all of our supporters over the years. It doesn't look good for the future, mostly because of the farm situation.

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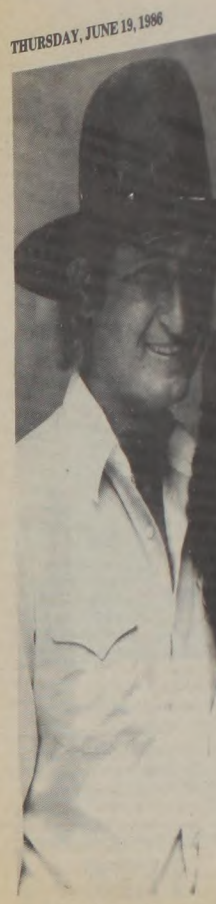

Rodney is a 1979 graduate of Silverton High School and is employed by Regional Utilities in Amarillo.

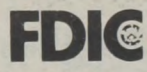

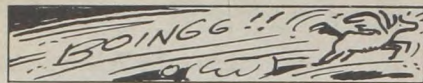

A.I. AND PREGNANCY TESTING SCHOOL PLANNED

The Briscoe and Swisher County Extension offices are jointly sponsoring an artificial insemination and pregnancy testing school this summer. All area livestock producers are urged to enroll by July 1.

The school will be held July 21-24 and will be from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day. This gives each producer plenty of time to complete his chores. The instruction at the school will be done by qualified personnel from American Breeders' Services and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Total cost of the school will be \$350.00 per person with a \$100.00 deposit due at either County Extension Office by July 1.

Classroom instruction will be at the courthouse annex in Tulia, 310 West Broadway, and the practical work will be completed at the Tulia Livestock Auction Barn south of Tulia. Producers who enroll from Briscoe County will have the opportunity to ride in a car pool, if they so desire.

This educational activity is another example of the many educational programs recommended by the Briscoe County Extension Livestock Committee. For more information, call 823-2343, or come by the County Extension Office in Silvertown.

Remember, the deadline to enroll is July 1!

IF YOU CAN'T DIGEST MILK

If you have trouble digesting milk, try to drink a smaller amount at one time, eat yogurt or cheese, or drink milk with lactase, advises a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist. Lactase is an enzyme that breaks down milk sugar, says Dr. Dymple Cooksey. You may find milk already containing lactase in the grocery store, or you can buy lactase in a drug store and add it to your milk.

IF YOU DON'T LIKE MILK

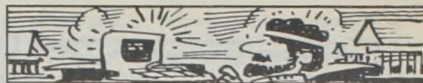
If you don't drink milk because you simply don't like it, Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionists recommend eating more of other foods that include calcium. High calcium foods include those made with milk or cheese and tofu, a soybean product that is often made with calcium sulfate. Dark green leafy vegetables and tortillas made with cornmeal also provide some calcium. Canned or dried fish with edible bones, such as salmon, will also contribute calcium to the diet.

When you buy frozen dinners and entrees, you're paying for the time you gain by using convenience foods. A recent U. S. Department of Agriculture study showed that the frozen entrees and dinners tested cost twice to 2½ times as much as making the same dinner at home, says Dr. Alice Hunt, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialist. She says the study also shows that if you paid yourself a clerical wage of \$7.00 an hour, or an "average" wage of \$7.87 an hour for cooking, the home-prepared dinners and entrees would still cost only about two-thirds as much as their frozen counterparts.

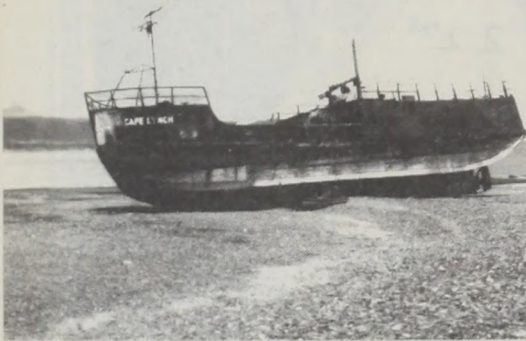

Mid-Season Steps to Reduce Barky Cotton

Cotton farmers suffer stiff penalties on barky or trashy cotton each year, and certain cultural and management practices during the growing season can reduce these.

Giving close attention to the following tactics can mean money in the bank at harvest time due to better prices for higher quality cotton:

—Scout fields regularly to control insects and thus insure retention of early fruit.

—Protect terminal growth from insect and herbicide damage. Such damage causes lateral branching and high stick content in seed cotton—a situation likely to cause barky cotton.

—Manage nitrogen and irrigation to obtain the right balance between vegetative growth and uniform, productive fruiting.

—Control weeds by spot spraying early to prevent strippers from harvesting weed residue that could end up contaminating fiber.

—Avoid root pruning. Cultivating too deep cuts roots and causes rapid moisture loss which can result in fruit shed and lower yields.
