Patriots Shoot Down Eagles Prepare To Trap Coyotes

 Valley evened their record to 1-1 Friday as they defeated the Ropes Eagles 65-20 in their first varsity win in 6-man football. Valley broke open a close first half to score 43 points in the second half.

The first half saw Ropes start off the scoring with a 17 yard run. Valley came right back when Kirk Garner took a pitchout around end and with great blocks by Jon Pigg, he went in untouched to even

the score. The Valley defense held the Eagles and took over at the 1-yard line. However, on the next play the Eagles forced Clay Edwards down in the end zone for a safety to

make the score 8-6, Ropes who then added another quick TD to make the score 14-6. But that was it, as Valley turned it on and never looked back.

Clay Edwards took the hand-off and raced 45 yards to the end zone and with Chad Isbell's kick the score was tied.

With 52 seconds left in the half, Valley recovered a fumble on the 1 yard line and Edwards took it over to give

Valley the lead. Isbell's kick was good.

The second half saw Valley score three times on six plays. Kirk Garner added four TD's to his total. Edwards scored once more on a 65 yard kick

off return. Charles Clardy scored on a 36 yard run. For the night, Isbell converted 5 of 7 extra points and Warren Merrell hit Jon Pigg for one 1-point conversion. Kirk Garner was the leading rusher with 131 yards on 11 tries and 5 TD's.

"The team did a great job in coming back in the second half. The defense did a great job stopping their spread and the line (Jason Little, Jon Pigg, Warren Merrell, Chad Isbell) did a great job of opening holes for the back to get through. Isbell has done a great job with our kicking game but our center, Hughes, and holder, Merrell, have done a great job getting the

back ready. This was a great win for us and the boys are really looking forward to this week's Homecoming game with Higgins.

Paymaster Gin And Panhandle Compress To Headline Electronic Pilot Program

The National Cotton Council of America, headquartered in Memphis, Tennessee, has designated Paymaster Gin and Panhandle Compress, both of Quitaque, to head up a national pilot program to test the viability of electronic

warehouse cotton bale receipts.

The program, which is scheduled to begin with this cotton season is to test the operation of a system in which paper receipts would not be issued by a warehouse storing cotton. Instead, a computer data base would be used to maintain the records of who "holds" the receipt. The records (to be known as "electronic warehouse receipts")

would be maintained from the time each bale is deposited in the warehouse until each bale is shipped from the warehouse.

The program, which was researched and formed in 1983 by the Council as Informative Cotton Technology Committee (CITC) to investigate possible efficiencies which could be introduced into the industry

Many questions were directed to Mr. Serafin about the benefits to Briscoe County stemming from the feasibility studies. The consensus of those present was that Briscoe County does not have the resources at this time to hire feasibility studies of such magnitude. The Task Force also felt that the purpose of the organization would automatically preclude its involvement in fund raising for making feasibility studies.

The Caprock Jamboree Committee reported that a sound system has been purchased for the Jamboree performances. Also the Silverton Bazaar was a summer success. 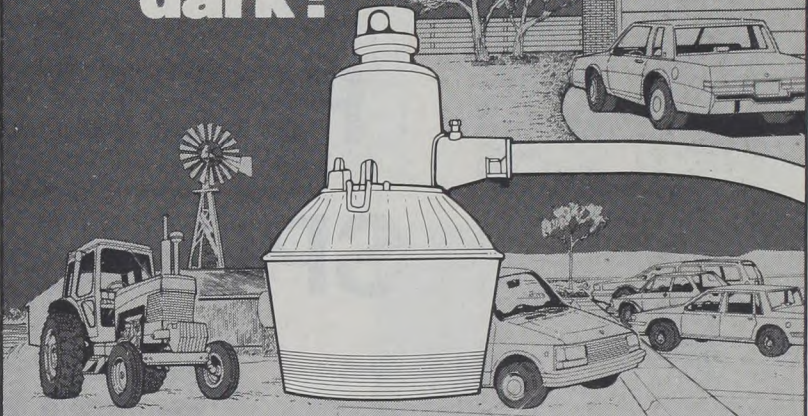

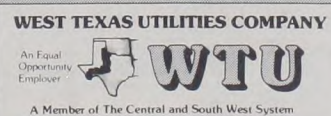

through expanded usage of computer technology.

One major issue was the possible elimination of paper receipts and class cards to be replaced by some type of computer data base system to allow quick, efficient transfers of documents. A very limited pilot test was performed in 1984, and much research has been done since that time.

Paymaster Gin in Quitaque was chosen to be the most qualified independent Gin nation-wide to meet the standards required by the Council. Known by the Council as always looking for better ways to improve their operation, and already familiar with one computer system, Paymaster Gin will be the leader in the most modern technology in the cotton computer industry. Paymaster gins approximately 12,000 bales of area cotton each year and is managed by locals, Ronnie and Jackie Carpenter.

Panhandle Compress in Quitaque was chosen not only for its outstanding service under the management of

Robin Harmon, and it's 12,000 plus bale storage capacity, but it is the sole receiver of Paymaster's cotton. The two will continue to join hands to strive for the better of local farmers.

"The system will speed the process of selling the cotton, therefore making more money for the farmers. It will cut manual paper work and ticket handling. The time element involved in getting the product from the gins to the mills will be reduced, in turn the costs of handling the cotton will be lower," said Carpenter, general manager of Paymaster Gin of Quitaque. "It is such an honor (and responsibility) to have been singled out for the pilot program. It is a major breakthrough, as well as cost efficient and we're excited about that."

The program is scheduled to begin this fall and end on July 31, 1990. In addition to banks and loan servicing agents, the U.S.D.A. and A.S.C.S. offices will be involved through its county offices (which prepares Form A cotton loans) in Briscoe and Hall Counties.
