### THIRTY-EIGHT NAMED TO TEACHING INSTITUTE

Thirty-eight El Paso area elementary teachers and supervisors from public and private schools have been accepted as participants in the University at El Paso's EPDA (Educations Professions Development Act) Institute in English and Speakers of Foreign Languages (ESOL), to be held on the campus from June 9 to August 1.

The Institute, limited to 38 participants, is a cooperative effort on the part of the University and the United States Office of Education, and will be directed by Dr. Patricia Adkins, associate professor of linguistics and speech pathology. The institute is designed to increase the effectiveness of elementary school teachers of children whose native language is not English, with particular focus on Spanish speaking children.

Included in the 38 teacher participants is Mary Jo Polk, who teaches at Ysleta. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leon McCracken of Quitaque.

By Representative Tom Carlin As the 181 legislators traveled home following the close of the regular session of the 61st Legislature the nagging question still lingered. When will the Governor call the special session?

There definitely will be a special session. This was decided when the House and Senate passed a one-year appropriations bill. Regardless of the Governor's de-

cision to veto the spending bill or not, we must return to Austin to appropriate funds for operating our state government during the second year.

The stated reason by Lt. Gov. Barnes and House Speaker Mutscher for the one-year bill is to give Texans freedom from additional state taxes in 1969. What they aren't saying is that taxes will be doubled the following year.

In writing this bill, the authors have not only juggled funds from one state agency to another, but also dipped into next year's revenue. Thus, a heavy tax burden will develop in the second year.

By eliminating the unnecessary spending it's highly possible for the Legislature to draw up a two-year spending bill without the need for additional taxes.

Since the House and Senate versions of the bill were not the same, a joint committee met to decide on a suitable arrangement. Once the conference report was completed and returned to the House we had the opportunity to either accept or reject it. My vote against the bill was against the extra travel.

During the session it was my pleasure to work on four pieces of legislation that were of interest to the district. Sen. Hazelwood and I worked our respective sides of the Capitol to pass a bill establishing a separate Board of Regents for West Texas State University. We also combined forces on a bill which establishes a Hospital District in Donley County.

Early in the session Sen. Hightower introduced a bill, which I carried in the House, that allows the use of tires with protuberances on any vehicle traveling on public highways, providing it doesn't harm the roadway. The use of these tires was already allowed in bordering states.

Through the efforts of Walter Knapp and myself a bill was passed giving Randall County a District Court. The fifth bill was one I introduced in the House. It calls for the establishment of a Utility District for Lake Tanglewood.

My first session of the Legislature was both interesting and rewarding, but most important it provided the opportunity to compare our needs with those of other Texans. For the most part the Legislature passed bills that not

For example in the area of law enforcement, the state now has a campus disorder law, there is a stronger disturbing the peace law and much stronger laws aimed at drug peddlers.

In the coming months, I will be putting together my legislative program for the next session. I'll be interested in your legislative suggestions.

Enzymes in concentrated form—such as those present in some laundry product—may have an irritating effect on the skin.

Although the enzyme concentration in the laundry products is low, some people may be hypersensitive to the enzymes and develop an allergy when exposed either to enzymatic solutions or to clothes washed in them.

If such a problem develops, see your dermatologist and revert to a detergent.

The key to successful picnics is planning and pre-preparation.

Good planning makes picnic meals nutritious, economical and fun.

What foods are best for picnics? One which are easy to prepare, easy to carry and easy to eat.

Choose foods for outdoor meals as for other meals. The basic 4 is a guide. Include a leafy, green or yellow vegetable and a protein food such as meat, cheese, fish or eggs. Bread, buns, or potatoes will provide a starchy food.

Fruit makes a simple dessert. Milk or a fruit drink provides the beverage.

Carefully packed foods will keep in good condition until eating time.

Salad greens and raw vegetables should be washed carefully, patted dry and put into containers to keep them crisp. Plastic bags carry vegetables well.

Meats should be cooled thoroughly before being packed. A Thermos container or an insulated bag is ideal for packing carefully wrapped meat. Meat can be wrapped in several layers of newspaper to keep it cool.

Sandwiches should be wrapped individually and packed carefully. Pack cookies and cake closely in a box so that they don't move around and break up while being carried.

Don't take foods such as potato salad and cream sauces and fillings on a picnic. They spoil easily, especially under picnic conditions, and can cause food poisoning.

Before you leave for the picnic make a check list. Include the food cooking and eating utensils, serving dishes and spoons and condiments such as salt and pepper. Take some paper bags for trash. It helps prevent littering.

### APPLY FOR BENEFITS BEFORE RETIREMENT

Applying for benefits up to three months before retirement helps to assure that social security checks will begin at the earliest possible time, according to Travis C. Briggs, Amarillo social security district manager.

He also advises checking with the social security office early to learn what supporting documents and evidence are required and for help in obtaining them.

Briggs continued, "Even if the worker is not planning to stop working, he should still apply two to three months before age 65 so

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that he has Medicare protection while continuing to work."
