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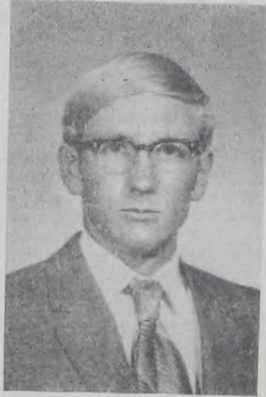

DAVID SEYMOUR

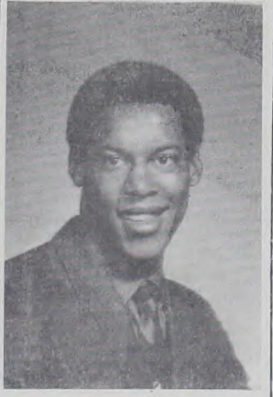

Area Business Review

First National Bank

In their capacity of receiving, safe guarding and lending money, banks are probably one of the most important business in a community. The growth in structure of the area is centered around these institutions—with the development of the various economic features dependent on a very large degree on the initiative policies of the banks.

Quitaque can be proud of the 5000 banks which serve them throughout the nation — offering complete deposit safety and other special services enjoyed by depositors today.

The modern banking facilities of today are a far cry from the institutions which operated from 1836 to 1864. During these early days banks issued bank notes for depositors. Little or no regulations existed and some of these early banks were unable to redeem in coin these deposits, and the depositors lost. This situation ended when the legislation of the National Bank Act of 1863, when the U. S. Government established its own currency, guaranteed with a pledge of U. S. Bonds.

In 1933 banks went through a

other crisis and, many will remember this period. During the early days of the depression many banks closed, their failure due to too little capital stock, poor judgment and a world-wide depression. Many changes have been brought about since the 30's. The number of

banks have been reduced from 30,000 to 15,000 — 5,000 of these National Banks. Each bank now pays an insurance premium every year to the Federal Government based on its deposits which insures depositors accounts up to \$20,000 in all National and most of the State Banks through the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Deposits, at an all time low in 1933, have now reached a high of over \$200,000,000,000. at the last Statement of Condition, on Dec. 31, 1970, the First National Bank in Quitaque had \$5,310,717.13 on deposit.

The First National Bank of Quitaque was opened for business on August 30, 1920 and since this time has been an unfailing source of financial service essential to the development of Agriculture and business. Officials have worked faithfully in the interests of depositors and stockholders, with a sincere interest in development of economic potential of the area.

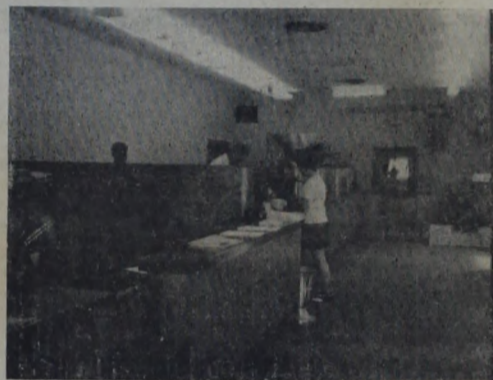
The fact that it was among the number of banks examined in 1933 and found sound speaks well for the sound banking principals employed by capable administrators.

Amos Porsons was the first president after the bank was opened in 1920, with J. B. Russell as vice-president. Orlin Stark was cashier at the time. He moved here in 1919 to work as cashier for the First State Bank, located across the street from where the First National Bank now stands. He began his duties with the First National after this bank purchased the outstanding notes and other interests of the First State Bank in 1920. He served as cashier until 1927, when he became president. Gene Bedwell, now President of the Sunray State Bank, was appointed cashier.

Although he is retired, Orlin Stark is still chairman of the Board of Directors and maintains an office in the bank.

O. R. Stark is now president; Bob Ham is vice-president; Jimmy Davidson is cashier; and Deloy Myers is assistant cashier.

O. R. In addition to his duties at the bank, takes an active role in promoting various programs of the Quitaque area. A newsletter is published under his direction. This enjoys a wide circulation. This publication, which carries information concerning the various economic aspects of the area, never fails to cite some of the interesting natural features of the Quitaque Valley.

Shirttail Sermon

"If Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins. Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished. If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable." I Corinthians 15:14-19

The Resurrection is the guarantee of four great truths:

I. It proves that truth is stronger than falsehood. In Jesus God's truth came to men; men sought to destroy the truth but the Resurrection is the final proof of the indestructibility of the truth of God.

II. It proves that good is stronger than evil. Jesus Christ was the very goodness of God. The sin of man sought to destroy that goodness. But the Resurrection is proof that goodness can triumph over evil in the end.

III. It is the proof that life is stronger than death. Men sought to destroy the life of Jesus Christ once, finally, and for all; the Resurrection is the proof that the life which is in Christ cannot be destroyed—and the Christian shares that life.

IV. It is the proof that love is stronger than hate. In the last analysis the contest in Jerusalem was a contest between the hatred of men and the love of God. Men took that love and sought to break it forever upon the Cross; but the Resurrection is the proof that the love of God is stronger than all the hatred of men.

Unless we could be certain of these great truths life would be intolerable.

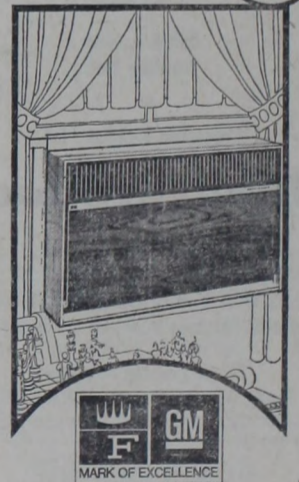
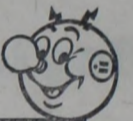
