Miss Bonds died Thursday, May 13, at McFarland Hospital after a long illness.

A native of Wilson County, she was born November 28, 1902, to the late Will and Elizabeth Bonds. She was a member of First Baptist Church, Spring Creek Home Demonstration Club, Life Member of Telephone Pioneers and Dorcas Sunday School Class.

Thirty-five men and women from Silverton, Quitaque and Turkey received Certificates of Completion of a 128-hour Emergency Medical Technician School Monday night. The school has been taught in Silverton as an extension of the continuing adult education department of Amarillo College. The instructor has been George Nussbaum, assistant director of nursing at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Members of the class took their final written and skills tests, administered by the State Department of Health, Monday night. They will not know whether they will be certified by the State as Emergency Medical Technicians for about a week.

These men and women spent 40 of the 128 class hours in training at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, in ICU, CCU, R.T., 2C and emergency room, in addition to putting in many, many hours studying, driving to class and the Amarillo hospital, etc.

The course is designed especially for ambulance attendants, and these volunteers have given their time to be able to better serve their communities. Whether they passed or failed the course, all are better ambulance attendants for having taken the course. They deserve the appreciation and commendation of their fellow citizens for giving their time to improve the skills and services they perform on a volunteer basis.
