Patriots earn win over Miami.

Second Win Of Season

Valley Patriots Defeat Miami, 54-44

After a super effort in the first half and a great second half comeback by Miami, Valley earned its second win of the season Friday night at Patriot Stadium with a 54-44 win.

The Patriots used a strong ground game and a tough defense to get off to a 40-8 half-time lead. Leading the way for the Patriots were Kirk Garner, Clay Edwards and Bubba Clardy who combined for 554 yards rushing. A strong blocking effort was produced by Chad Powell, Cory Pointer and Tommy Pinkerton. "The line did a great job of opening holes against a quick defensive front of Miami." In the passing department Bradley Price hit 4 of 9 passes for 40 yards but 9 were the most important of the game.

With Valley leading 48-44

with 2:17 left in the game. Valley faced a four and 5 at the 9 yard line. Price faced into the line and bootlegged out and hit a wide open Chad Powell for the score. Price was hit hard as soon as the ball was released but was able to give Valley the lead they needed to hold off Miami. Chad Powell had 3 catches for 39 yards and 1 touchdown. Edwards ended the night with 287 yards and 3 touchdowns. Garner racked up his second 200 yard game. He has a total of 207 (3 Tds) yards on 16 carries for a 12.9 yards per carry.

Bubba Clardy got back into the offense as he carried 13 times for 61 yards and 1 touchdown. Chad Calvert hit 3 out of 8 extra point attempts for 6 points. On defense Jason Smith had 2 interceptions and 15 tackles. Price blocked an extra point and pro-

duced 14 tackles. Cory Pointer played heads up with 13 tackles. A strong effort was given by Ron Tritt and Chad Powell with 13 and 9 tackles respectively. Brittan and Powell also earned up with a turnover as Powell hit the Miami quarterback and knocked the ball loose. Brittan was there for the recovery.

Valley will face the #3 ranked McLean Tigers Friday at Patriot Field at 7:30 p.m. JV and JH travel to Lefors Thursday for games starting at 5 p.m.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. The cost is only \$60.00 ± \$4.50 S&H. A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.
