A. J. Taylor Recipient of Archeologist Of The Year Award From THC

Anna Jean (A. J.) Taylor, Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum archeologist, is the recipient of the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) archeologist of the Year Award, a category in the Awards of Excellence in Archeology program. Her nomination was generated in the office of the State Archeologist at the THC. Taylor will share the award with colleague Cheryl Lynn Highley of San Antonio. The award will be presented at the annual THC Preservation Conference in Amarillo next month.

The Award of Excellence in Archeology is presented in three categories and is a certificate signed by the governor of Texas and the Chairman of the Texas Historical Commission. It recognizes outstanding achievement in the field of technical scientific research, outstanding achievement in the field of archeological site and/or archeological collections preservations, and individual accomplishments in the

Taylor's Archeologist of the Year Award recognizes her accomplishments during a single year of a lifetime of service in the realms of archeological preservation. Eligibility for this award category is limited to professional archeologists.

Taylor joined the PPHM staff on July 18, 1994 as staff archeologist. She hold a B. A. in American History from Wayland Baptist College, a M. A. in anthropology from Texas A&M University and is presently in the doctoral program at The University of Texas at Austin. Taylor worked as an archeologist with the Center for Archaeological Research at The University of Texas at San Antonio and with the Texas Archeological Research Laboratory at the University of Texas at Austin. She has worked on a number of archeological projects, including the Yellow house Canyon Project directed by the PPHM in 1977, and the 1979 and 1984 Panhandle Pastore projects, co-sponsored by the



Professional memberships include the Society for American Archaeology, Plains conference, Council of Texas archeologists, Texas Archeological Society, Panhandle Archeological Society and Randall County Historical Commission.

Taylor is the daughter of Walter and Colleen Taylor of Quitaque.

Lynn Gives Talk At Canyon Museum

Alvin Lynn, a vocational historian, gave a talk about his research and field findings on the Fort Bascomb to Adobe Walls Trail used by Kit Carson in the third of four public lectures on April 12, 1996 in the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's Hazlewood Lecture Hall.

Born and raised in Motley County at Whiteflat, near Matador, Texas, Lynn received a bachelor's and Master's Degree in Geology from West Texas State University, now West Texas A&M University. He taught school for 31 years and taught field geology for WTSU for three summers.

"Archeology and history have been a lifelong interest to me, growing up on Middle Pease River in Motley County afforded me areas rich in both history and archeology. Several historic roads ran within a few miles of my home. The Rath Trail from Dodge City to Fort Griffin ran through Tepee City a few miles to the east. The Texas-Santa Fe expedition passed very near Matador. The stop for the Childress-Whiteflat state line was on the place where I lived and the Mackenzie Trail was along the Caprock about 15 miles to the west."

Living in Dumas allowed Lynn the privilege of studying other historic roads since the Canadian River was the lifeline for early travelers crossing the Panhandle in an east-west direction.

He is presently mapping the historic roads of this area with emphasis on the road used by Kit Carson in 1864 from Fort Bascomb to Adobe Walls, the topic of his talk.

In observance of Texas Archeology Awareness Month, the Museum's Archeology Department is offering a series of public lectures on a wide range of topics relating to the Panhandle-Plains and adjoining regions. Archeological sites are an irreplaceable part of Texas history, and only scientific investigation can reveal the secrets that lie buried in the soil. In the past, one week in April was designated as "Texas Archeological Awareness Week" a time when Texans could look back on their archeological heritage. This year April is designated "Texas Archeology Awareness Month," and is devoted to the promotion of public awareness and education to encourage and support the protection of archeological sites in Texas.

The series will conclude on April 28 with a discussion of the Box Canyon and the Dark Canyon rock art sites in the Panhandle, presented by Roberta Speer, West Texas A&M University and Rolla Shaller and A. J. Taylor from the PPHM.

No admission will be charged, although donations will be accepted to offset speakers' travel expenses. For more information, please call the Museum at 806/656-2244.

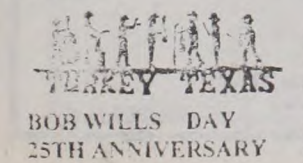
Quitaque EMS To Sponsor Life Pak Demonstration

**A&M Scientists Hope To Reduce Fire Ant Problem**

Scientists at Texas A&M University are studying a tiny parasite, called *Caenocholax fenyessi*, that they hope can be used to reduce the red imported fire ant problem in the United States. The parasite's male larvae feed on immature ants, causing the ants to "bleed" to death. The major benefit of the parasite is that it already occurs naturally in Texas.

**Stamp Honors Cal Farley**

The Postal Service will issue a 32 cent Cal Farley definitive stamp on April 26, 1996 in amarillo, Texas. The stamp goes on sale nationwide April 27.

Designed by Dennis Lyall of South Norwalk, Connecticut, the stamp features a portrait of Cal Farley, a great humanitarian who founded Boys Ranch near Amarillo, Texas, to help disadvantaged, homeless or troubled boys.

Farley was born on Christmas Day in 1895 to a family of six children. Raised on a Minnesota farm where times were hard, Farley left home as a young boy to pursue a career of semipro baseball and wrestling. He later settled in Amarillo, Texas and during the Depression helped organize the Maverick Club, which provided organized athletics to boys as an alternative to the streets. Years later, Farley's dream was realized when an Amarillo businessman donated the land on which he could establish a home for disadvantaged boys. Since Farley's death on February 19, 1967, the Ranch, which began admitting girls in 1992, has become the home of over 400 boys and girls. In addition to homes, the Ranch also includes numerous facilities for health, education, athletics and worship.

Customers have 30 days to obtain the first day of issue postmark by mail. They may purchase the new stamps at their local post office, affix the stamps to envelopes of their choice, address the envelopes (to themselves or others), and place them in a larger envelope addressed to: Cal Farley Stamp, Postmaster, 2301 Ross St., Amarillo, Texas 79120-9991.

The United States Postal Service is having a ceremony dedicating the new Cal Farley, U.S. postage stamp on Friday, April 26, 1996 in Amarillo.

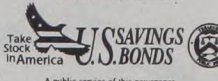

**Resist The Urge To Turn.** Don't turn the food during the first few minutes. More natural juices and flavors will be retained.

**Marinate, Marinate, Marinate.** A little marinating with bottled Italian dressing can make a good thing even better. Meat and bone-in poultry should be marinated at least an hour; seafood and boneless poultry, 30 minutes; and veggies for less.

### Second Coat Of Caliche Now Being Placed On Streets

Opening of the pit at the top of the caprock Tuesday marks the beginning of operations for laying the last course of caliche on the four blocks of city streets already prepared, Mayor J. W. Ewing stated Tuesday afternoon.

Two blocks of Main Street, and one north of Main on First Street, have already received the initial courses, while a fourth block, south on First Street from Main, is nearing completion.

Concrete curbing on all four blocks has been completed. The work is going forward under the auspices of the Works Progress Administration, a part of a \$20,000 city paving project approved by the Administration. Seven blocks of the city streets are scheduled to receive hot-topping with caliche base before work is complete.

Laying of the final caliche course on the four blocks now being prepared is scheduled to start this week and will place the stretch in readiness for hot topping when WPA authorities permit it to begin.

### Commissioner's Court Employs H.D. Agent

Acting upon petitions from local and Silverton Home Demonstrations Clubs, the County commissioner's Court Monday contracted for a full time County Home Demonstration Agent to start work here on July 1, Judge W. W. Martin announced.
