Saturday's voter turn out higher was slightly higher in Turkey than in Quitaque, possibly because of the heated race to raise the Hall County Hospital Tax. The final count of county votes pretaining to the tax dilemma was 883 against and 338 in favor of raising the hospital tax. In Turkey, the vote was 271 against and only 5 votes were cast supporting the raise.

The Quitaque City Council race netted two new members the return of councilmen bidding for reelection.

O.R. Stark retained his position for another two year term with 69 votes, and formerly appointed member, Todd Washington was elected to the fill the unexpired term

New councilmen elected to serve the city by Quitaque voters were Jimmy Davidson with 86 votes and Gary

Valley Board Hires **New Head Coach**

Clifton Gilmore has been employed as head football, boys basketball, and boys track coach at Valley High School. Coach Gilmore will move to Valley from Goree High School where he held similar coaching responsibilities in a six-man football program.

Gilmore attended school at Harrold, Texas and played six-man football there before attending Midwestern State University, at Wichita Falls, Texas. At Midwestern, he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, majored in physical education and minored in

Gilmore began his coaching career as head football coach in a six-man football program at Vernon Northside ISD. He then accepted an 11man coaching position at Wichita Falls Notre Dame High School before moving to Goree High School as athletic director and head football coach, basketball, and boys track. At Valley he will serve as head football coach, head boys basketball coach and boys track coach.

Gilmore Coach highly recommended by school officials at Goree and by many of the coaches who know him well. He is said to be a coach who leads by example, good motivational techniques, and knowledge of the game he coaches. His expectations are high, but he has a caring way in which to build solid winning attitudes his players. He thinks Valley will be strong in sixman football--the game which he loves--and the Valley fans as well as students will learn to love the game.

Coach Gilmore is married and has two children. His wife, Dianna, is a certified Educational Diagnostician



Since the amount of your benefit, as well as that of your is based on covered earnings over a period of years, the amount of the monthly payment can be affected if you have a number of years of little or

A married woman can receive payments either on her own record or that of her husband. She receives whichever is larger; a benefit on her husband's record. A man who has worked steadily at high earnings might find that her own benefit would be more than a wife's; however, if she had remained at home for several years or had periods of low earnings, she might find it advisable to take the husband's

Cadillac Ranch In Amarillo

Ten Cadillacs nose-down in a wheatfield, in a perfect row, tail fins resplendent against a Texas sky of blue. Only Charles Kuralt could discover such a phenomenon. And discover it he did -- in a winter wheatfield outside of Amarillo, Texas.

Kuralt's story, "Cadillac Ranch," appears in the March/April issue of Philip Morris Magazine. It continues: "At first we thought maybe somebody wight he trying to raise little below. might be trying to raise little baby Cadillacs," he wrote. "Then we thought maybe the farmer just parked them this way each year after he bought a new model."

The farmer was Stanley Marsh Third, and apparently his Cadillacs take on different meaning for different people.
