Briscoe County Day B-I-G Success

The long, hard hours of work in preparation paid off soundly in a wonderfully successful Briscoe County Media day, Saturday, May 6, 1989. The effort in planning was evident as the many elements came together.

Registration, skits, refreshments, tour, meal and all else came together in perfect mesh. Over 150 people gathered on the courthouse lawn to greet guests as they arrived.

The bus began the tour just fifteen minutes off the scheduled time of 9:30 a.m. starting time. The tour and skits came off with precision and the 40 guests arrived at the BBQ site in Caprock Canyons State Park on time.

The entourage included development and tourism people from the Amarillo and Lubbock Chambers of Commerce, development investors, newspaper representatives, persons from Texas Tech Ranching Heritage Museum, Panhandle Regional Planning Commission personnel and others. These are all the people who are intimately involved in promoting tourism and making things happen. They were very favorably impressed. Dialogue is continuing and this area will soon be benefiting from the increased number of visitors who will be coming.

A key to the success of the event was the great spirit of community cooperation which was on display. Approximately 375 people turned out for the BBQ Dinner at Caprock Canyons State Park. The meal was prepared and served by a great crew of people from all over the county. People from Silverton, Quitaque and Turkey joined the guests for a wonderful afternoon of visiting, eating, and listening to great music, which was provided by an assortment of local talent.

City and County planners will immediately begin to put tours in place. This will involve coordinating with Amarillo and Lubbock contacts and local people.

Valley Board Hires New Head Coach

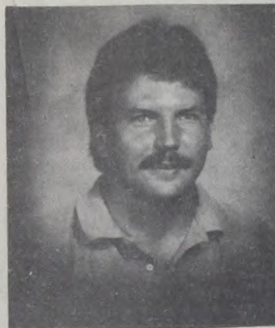
Clifton Gilmore has been employed as head football, boys basketball, and boys track coach at Valley High School. Coach Gilmore will move to Valley from Goree High School where he held similar coaching responsibilities in a six-man football program.

Gilmore attended high school at Harrod, Texas and played six-man football there before attending Midwestern State University, at Wichita Falls, Texas. At Midwestern, he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, majored in physical education and minored in history.

Gilmore began his coaching career as head football coach in a six-man football program at Vernon Northside ISD. He then accepted an 11-man coaching position at Wichita Falls Notre Dame High School before moving to Goree High School as athletic director and head football coach, basketball, and boys track. At Valley he will serve as head football coach, head boys basketball coach and boys track coach.

Coach Gilmore comes highly recommended by school officials at Goree and by many of the coaches who know him well. He is said to be a coach who leads by example, good motivational techniques, and knowledge of the game he coaches. His expectations are high, but he has a caring way in which to build solid winning attitudes in his players. He thinks Valley will be strong in six-man football—the game which he loves—and the Valley fans as well as students will learn to love the game.

Coach Gilmore is married and has two children. His wife, Dianna, is a certified Educational Diagnostician

and certified Special Education Teacher. She will be employed at Valley if a teaching position becomes available. Gilmore's son will be enrolled in the first grade next year and his daughter is preschool age.

The Gilmore family will reside in an available teacherage at the school.

Voter Turn-Out Good In General Election

Saturday's voter turn out was slightly higher in Turkey than in Quitaque, possibly because of the heated race to raise the Hall County Hospital Tax. The final count of county votes pertaining to the tax dilemma was 883 against and 338 in favor of raising the hospital tax. In Turkey, the vote was 271 against and only 5 votes were cast supporting the raise.

The Quitaque City Council race netted two new members and the return of two councilmen bidding for reelection.

O.R. Stark retained his position for another two year term with 69 votes, and formerly appointed member, Todd Washington was elected to the fill the unexpired term of one year.

New councilmen elected to serve the city by Quitaque voters were Jimmy Davidson with 86 votes and Gary

Chandler with 67 votes.

Unseated by the election were Randy Powell with 43 votes and Larry Don Price receiving 42 votes. The other contenders for the positions were candidates Johnny Griffin, who received 39 votes and write-in candidate, Steve Ulrey with one vote cast for him.

The Turkey-Quitaque ISD voters seated two new members to the Board of Trustees. Ronald Mullin received a whopping 319 votes and Leckie Fuston won his place at Valley with a count of 252 votes. Dee Whittington was defeated at the polls with 153 votes cast for him.

Three incumbents remained to serve the City of Turkey, unopposed, as council members. Arlowene Williams, 164 votes, Steve Farley, 194 votes and Lorene Setliff received 171 votes.

George Thomas Vera Woods

Services for George Thomas, 76, of Denton, Texas were held Saturday, May 6, 1989, at the First Baptist Church in Turkey with the Rev. Jack Howard, pastor of the Full Gospel Church in Denton and the Rev. Melvin Clinton, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Turkey, officiating. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors.

Thomas died Wednesday, May 3, 1989. He was born in Clarksville, had lived in Turkey before moving to Denton 13 years ago. He married Ruth Guest in 1937 in Matador. He was a retired construction worker. His son, Bill Thomas, preceded him in death in 1960.

Survivors include his wife; a son, James W. Thomas of Denton; four sisters, Ellie Livingston and Katie Stephenson, both of Levelland, Lucille Delece of Lawton, Oklahoma and Annie Eudy of Bogota; five grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

Services for Vera Dorothy Woods, 71, of Quitaque, were held at 11 a.m. Friday, May 5, 1989, at the First United Methodist Church of Quitaque, with the Rev. Steve Ulrey, pastor and Elgin Conner, minister of the Quitaque Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Quitaque.

Mrs. Woods died Wednesday evening, May 3, 1989, in Lockney Care Center, Lockney, Texas.

She was born on December 15, 1917, in Brown County, Texas. She had been a resident of Quitaque since 1947. She married Carl Woods on January 25, 1945 at Brownwood. She was a homemaker and a member of the Church of the Nazarene.

She is survived by her husband, Carl Woods of Quitaque; two sons, Carl Wayne Woods of Quitaque and Wesley Woods of Plainview; a daughter, Ina Gail Rowell of Pampa; three brothers, George O'Neal and Fred O'Neal, both of Waco; two sisters, Jennie Givens of Dallas and Bessie Bea Pond of Midland; and six grandchildren.

Quitaque Catholic Center Soon To Become Reality

Construction is expected to begin soon on a \$40,000 building to house the Quitaque Catholic Center near the intersection of Tunnell and Third Streets in northeast Quitaque.

The 3,200 square foot center will include a fully-equipped kitchen, restrooms, storage room and large meeting room for Mass, Bible study, fund-raisers, funeral dinners and social occasions such as wedding and anniversary receptions.

Quitaque Catholic Manuel Cruz, who is helping coordinate the project locally with Father Rex Nicholl, pastor of Our Lady of Loretto Church, in Silvertown, said several Catholics in the area have either moved from the area or left the Church for

other denominations because there was no facility to help accommodate their religious needs.

"The center is going to be wonderful when it is completed because we have needed a place to meet for a long time," Cruz said, adding that Father Nicholl comes to Quitaque once a month to say Mass in someone's home or in the local bank community room.

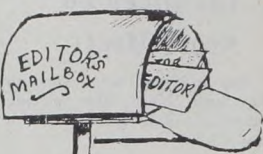
Other times, Quitaque Catholics commute to Turkey or Silvertown for Mass and the Catholic Church Sacraments.

The structure is being funded by a grant from Catholic Church Extension Society of America and by local funds.

Quitauque Senior Citizens

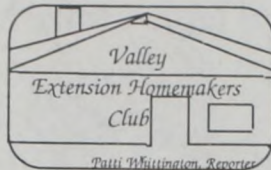

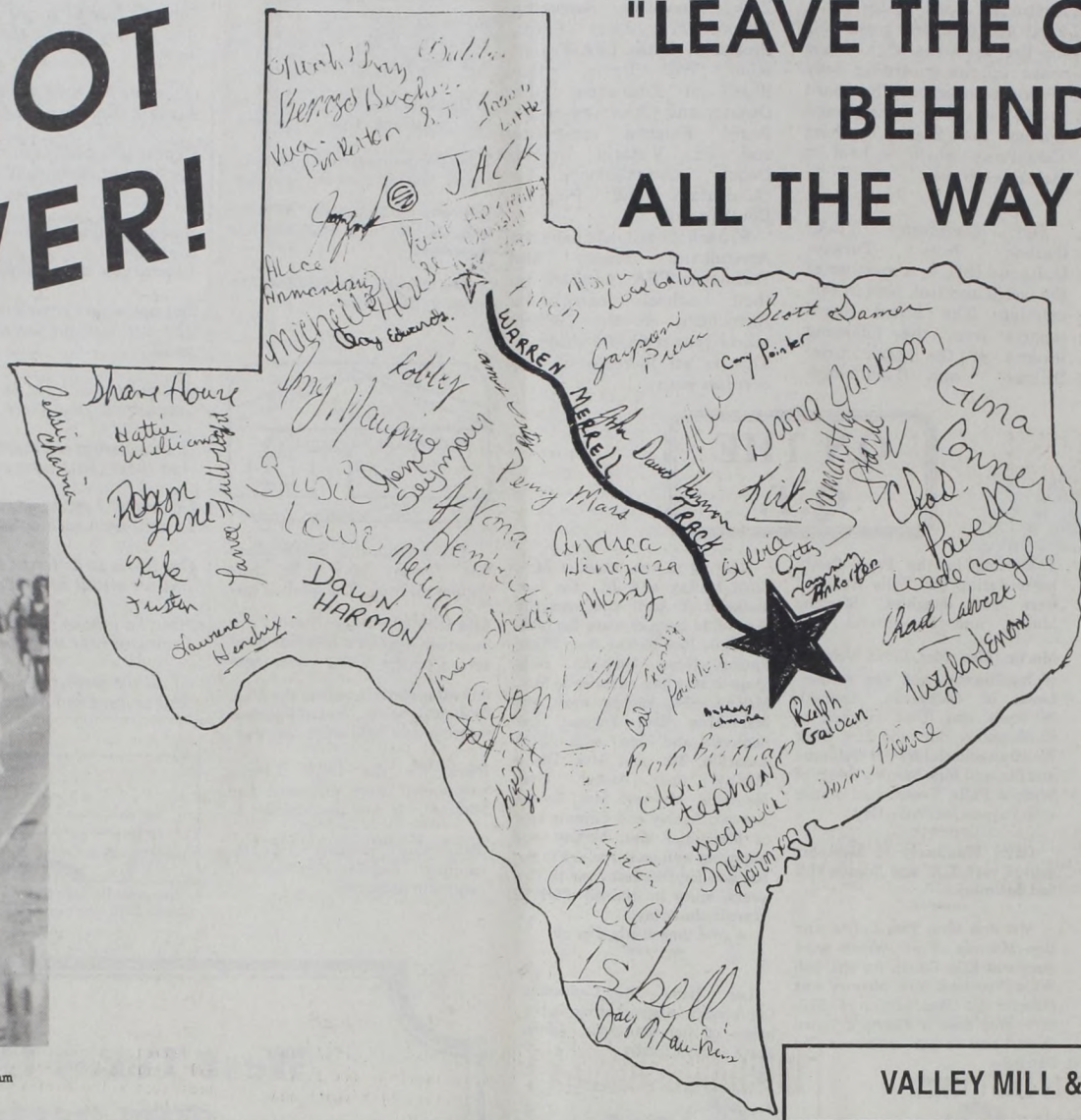
