Roye Piggs Lose Home To Fire Last Week

The tragedy that every family dreads happened Thursday last week to the Roye Pigg family southwest of Quitaque when their farm home caught fire and burned to the ground.

Mrs. Pigg told the Valley Tribune that she and the children were leisurely taking the day

off and she was in the kitchen washing dishes when her son, George, 5, called to tell her the Christmas tree was on fire. Her daughter, Mary Elizabeth, nine months old, was sitting in the floor by the tree. Mrs. Pigg says she caught Mary Elizabeth in her arms and took both children outside. She sent George to his grandparents', the Jack Piggs, home to call for help. She sat the baby down in the snow and went back inside but the curtains were already melting and she went back outside and picked up the baby and started running after George. She said they ran approximately two miles and called the Quitaque Fire Department. She said it couldn't have been more than ten minutes when the Fire Department arrived and the house was already gutted. The family lost everything. She and the children still had on their bed-clothes.

The neighbors and friends began helping the family immediately. A money tree was started at the First National Bank and a box for clothing, appliances and household goods has been placed at Rice Dry Goods and Farley's Flowers and Variety. Mr. Pigg had helped every time anyone was in need in any way and it is being returned to him now. When you come face to face with a need, it is good to live in a small community where everyone is your friend and comes to your rescue.

He finds the people of Turkey very friendly and says, "I take my hat off to the American people. They are so industrious even if they are old!"

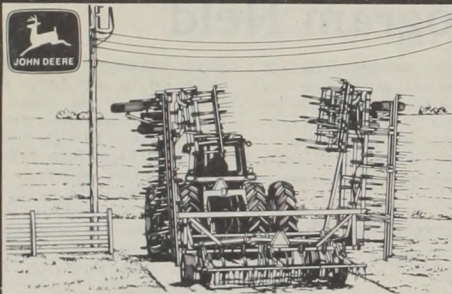

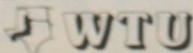
