## Turner Artwork To Show

Don Turner, a native of Turkey, a western artist, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Turner of Turkey, will be a guest speaker for the Nuevo Study Club in Turkey Thursday, Feb. 12 at 3 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of the United Methodist Church, Turkey.

The Nuevo Club members are inviting guests and wish for any and everyone interested in seeing Don's

work to feel free and welcome to come to this program.

If Bob Wills put Turkey, Texas on the map, Don Turner will keep it on the map, without the Rose of San Antonio.

Wills was judged by a lot of Texans and Southwesterners to be a master of music and many of his songs live on. Don Turner of a younger generation is fast becoming a master of art and his works in bronze are expected to appreciate in value with each passing year.

Turner, who now hangs his hat in a ranch bunkhouse near Tarzan, Texas, is first and foremost a cowboy, although a 1980's cowboy knows cowboying the old way.

"All I wanted to be was a cowboy and that's all I ever will be. It takes more than working on a ranch to make a cowboy. Somethings are born in you and others you develop through the years", he explains. To Don Turner, his art is a natural growth of years of watching and listening and learning to be a cowboy.

"When I was in high school here at Turkey, I'd rather draw than study. Finally when my Ag teacher realized

he couldn't stop me from drawing, he decided to help me and gave me the first real encouragement to become an artist," Don states.

## Farm Convention Held In Austin

The 83rd regular Convention of Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union of America, Texas Division was held at the Sherton Crest Hotel, Congress and First Sts., Austin, Tx. Jan. 29-31, 1987.

Purpose of the meeting was an election of delegates to the National Farmers Union Convention.

Official registration began Thursday afternoon Jan. 29 at 3 p.m.

Those attending from this area as delegates were Virgil and Edna Blackney, Hall County; and E. G. and Barbara Reed, Briscoe Co.

During the meeting on Thursday night the Hon. Jim Hightower, Commissioner of Agriculture, gave a Media Award to the late H.M. Baggerly, Editor of the Tulia Herald. Among the well

known speakers present were Hon. Lloyd Bentson, U.S. Senator; Hon. Garry Mauro, Texas Land Commissioner; Hon. Jim Mattox, Attorney General; Hon. Bob Bullock, State Comptroller; Bob Mullin, Director of Legislative Service, National Farmers Union Washington Office; Cyril (Cy) Carpenter, National Farmers Union President. Ralph Yarbrough was present as a guest speaker. All speakers referred to the "Hawkins - Gebhardt Bill".

A special order of business was called at the conclusion of the meeting of the convention for a unanimous support of the "Hawkins Gebhardt Bill".

This bill is for 70% parity with 35% set aside. The present bill, as you know, steps down each year and if it stays in existence by the year

of '95, there would be a 77% difference in the two bills.

National President, Cy Carpenter has contacted different organizations to line up in favor of the above bill such as National Council of Churches, League of Women Voters, Jewish organization, on strong labor union and a congressional action committee.

President Carpenter said, "A well financed campaign is working against the Hawkins Gebhardt Bill and we would like to know where the money is coming from." The new bill is a lot better than the present bill that is in effect. We are urging each one to work hard for this new bill.

Virgil Blakney plans to schedule a called meeting of the local Farmers Union Organization, to present some very interesting things that went on at the convention. Also, at this meeting, the local Farmers Union will elect a full board of officers for this year.

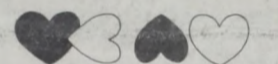
## Harvest Near Completion

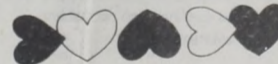

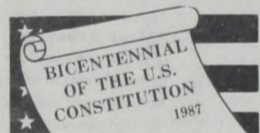

The State Board of Education is asking the 70th Texas Legislature to make several changes in state laws which are related to public education.

Among the recommendations is a proposed change in the implementation of the law which requires schools to maintain a 22-1 ratio in grades three and four.

The Valley School Board has adopted a wait-and-see position on this issue before committing funds necessary to meet the new requirements.

Kindergarten, first, and second grades at Valley are currently complying with the law which went into effect for those grades last year.

The intent of the law was to establish a uniform school calendar throughout the state.

February 23 is a teacher inservice day and students will not attend classes.

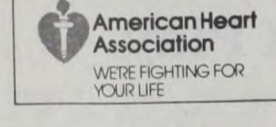
Hospital Notes

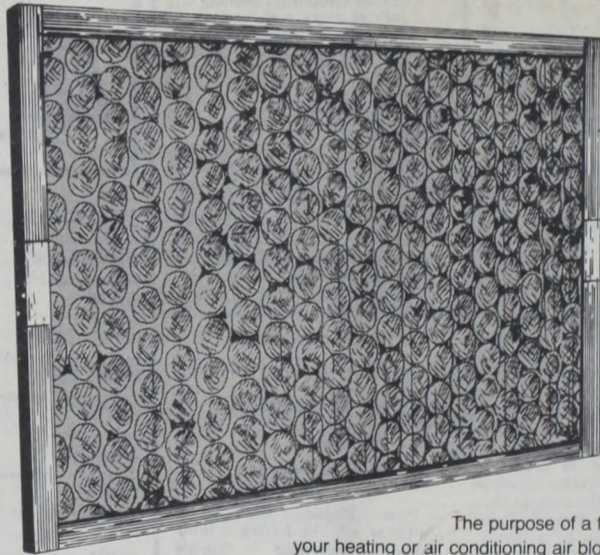

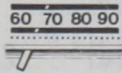

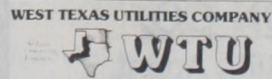


**Keep Damper Closed**

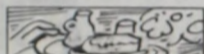
## Amanda Mullin Honored With Shower

The training will be conducted by Panhandle Community Services in Amarillo and is sponsored by the Executive Board of the Briscoe County Extension Program Council.

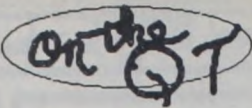

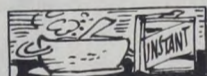


