## Solid Waste Meeting Held For Residents

Monday night at 8 p.m. the Quitaque City Council held a public meeting for the residents of Quitaque to meet and talk with Mr. and Mrs. Ernest C. Ebeling Jr. of Plainview about the disposal of solid waste.

Interested townspeople, the council and the Ebelings discussed the immediate problems facing small cities when the new EPA rules and regulations become available in October.

At present the solid waste of Quitaque is being carried to Southwest Land Fill in Canyon. Most small towns will be transferring their solid waste to larger communities with Class I Landfills, only. The Tulia Landfill is the nearest Class I Landfill and consideration is being made to haul Quitaque's solid waste to Tulia.

When a decision is made as to how to handle the solid waste of Quitaque, there will be some guidelines as to what can be handled by the landfill and suggestions of what to do with the rest of the trash.

A recent letter from the Texas Department of Insurance outlining deficiencies from a recent inspection by the State Fire Marshal's office was presented during the Public Hearing. It was noted that Quitaque is being surcharged on their key rate

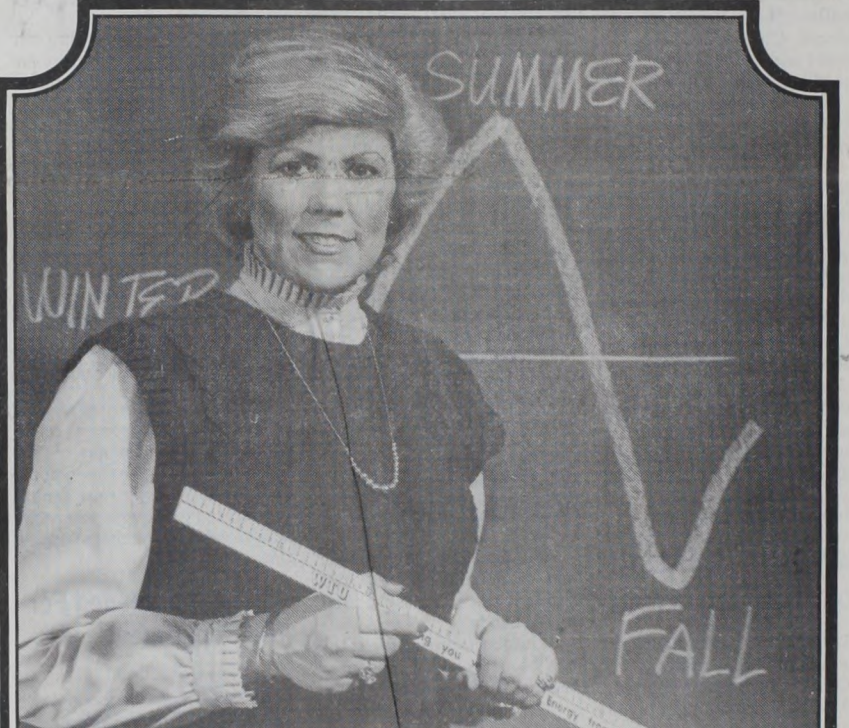

**TURKEY-QUITAQUE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT  
NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES**

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$5,112 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$5,416 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.835 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The Turkey-Quitaque ISD board of trustees will meet Monday, September 23 at 8:00 o'clock p.m. to set a tax rate for the 1991-92 school year.

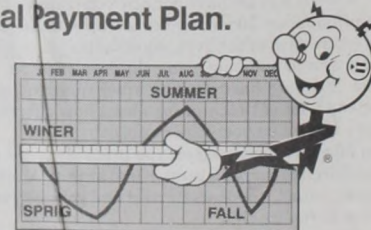

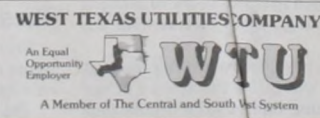

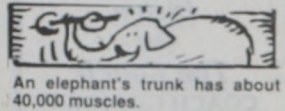

## LEGAL NOTICE

The United States Environmental Protection Agency has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million. Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly. Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest: If your home or water system has lead pipes, or if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or if you have soft or acidic water, or if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

"Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to 'flush' faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing."

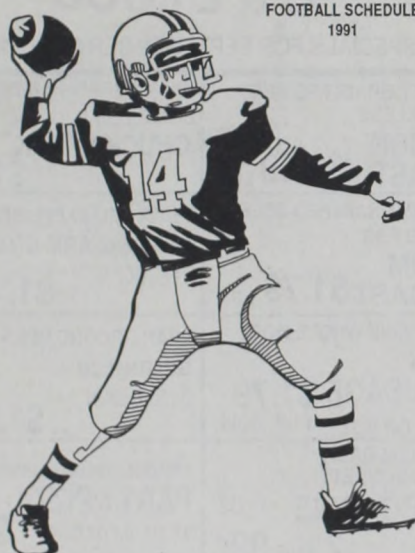
