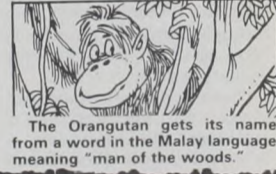

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## Guest Viewpoint

As the income tax deadline is fast approaching, we all need a good laugh. Virgie Vermillion of the Sayre (OK) Journal provides just that. The following is reprinted with permission from Tom Higley, publisher.

Here it is, February, already, and I am not quite through with January. As a matter of fact, I'm not through with December yet.

I don't know where the time goes, but I thought there was plenty of time to finish the bookkeeping I do for Homer like posting, filing, etc., by December 31.

Sure enough, I think I have the figures about ready now to take to our tax person so we can pay up and keep our membership in this country. But getting all that stuff accumulated in one place is very difficult.

I filed each receipt and entered each entry as the transaction took place, but somehow, Uncle Sam has a way of confounding me and causing me to destroy all my organized confusion.

Just when I think I have everything accounted for and am prepared to take the information to the tax office, another 1099 shows up in my mailbox. Where do all these forms come from? I know we haven't made any money, so what are all of these?

I seem to remember when one self-explanatory form was all that was required. Simple instructions told us to fill in the blanks with the amount of money from our W2's, along with the tax withheld, then compute the tax from the table on the back of the form. Then we simply wrote it down and added or subtracted, in order to know how much we owed or were to be refunded.

I prided myself with the fact that I was capable of doing our own. And I maintained that capability even when the form underwent many changes.

But I was so naive. I underestimated the Great American Genius of redesigning of Government forms—especially those from the IRS. I should have suspected something when the new packet containing the forms arrived, weighing 14 pounds. I thought to myself, "Oh, I'll bet they have sent me a very informative booklet of some kind." It was. The only problem with the book was that I needed an attorney to interpret it for me.

The booklet only weighed four pounds. The rest was the new forms that society would be using until the redesigning took place again. Forms like the new SR4-99's 1028-C's, 875-X's, G-Schedule 2, G-Schedule 3, Form ESX35, etc., etc. The booklet explained the forms and how to file one's income tax, if one could locate the Table of Contents.

Well, I thought, they are not going to lick me. I'll figure these out some way, surely.

The first page I scanned seemed simple enough, in the beginning. But the further I read, the more my suspicions grew that my intellect may be insufficient. When I reached the part that said, "Enter on this line the amount of line 22 or, if line 22 is smaller than line 45, or if line 22 is one half of 10 percent of line 69, enter the lesser of the two,"—that was when I made my decision to turn it over to someone else.

The tax people are always so nice when I come in. They usually give me a big smile as they help me carry my papers through the door. I know they are pleased when they find how well I have organized them in their separate containers.

So I am just about ready to transfer my paraphernalia to them. I have all our shop invoices in my shoe box, my bank statements in a grocery bag, my cash transactions in the chocolate box Homer gave me last Valentine's Day and a large manila envelope holds the rest of this "stuff" we've been getting in the mail lately.

I know we should feel patriotic to pay income tax. After all, we should pay for services the government provides. But sometimes I am in doubt as to whether we are getting our money's worth.

Really, all this income tax business makes just about as much sense as Daylight Savings Time. Who wants to save up daylight, anyway? It seems that everything we wear, eat, hear, see, feel and smell is taxed.

Could it be that the government plans to bottle up all that daylight and tax it, too?

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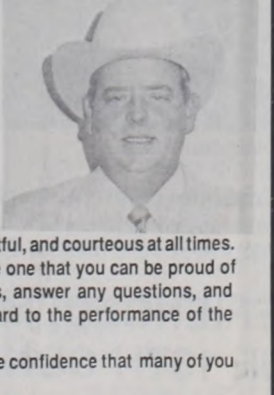

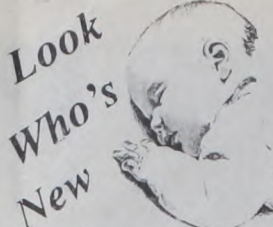
The program opened with each Club member answering the roll call with an interesting news item, a Texas Fact, a new book, or a thought for the day.

The topic of her program was the story of the Texas Santa Fe Expedition that began June 19, 1841 when it left Austin, Texas for Santa Fe. When this expedition arrived in the "Valley of Tears" near Quitaque August 27, 1841, this encampment became known by the men as Camp Resolution. The Texans ascended to the Plains Sept. 19th, 1841, a mile south of the present day highway between Silverton and Quitaque. The men called the river they had been camped on at Camp Resolution the Quintufue, waters which were bubbling along over a bed of golden sand, running nearly north and south, at a distance some six miles were three peaks, which really deserved the name of mountains.

Had the pioneers known of the hardships yet to come -- their subsequent surrender to Mexican authorities, the ghastly inhumane treatment of Capt. Salazar, the forced march of 2,000 miles from Santa Fe to Mexico City, and their confinement in Mexico's worst prisons, they might not have been so eager to leave their camp on the bubbling waters of the Quintufue.

Mrs. Baisden ended the story with the dedication of the Historical markers located in the southeast corner of Floyd County held Sunday Aug. 30, 1987, five miles south of Quitaque on Farm Road 1065.

I would like to clear up a few minor things. You have heard in the past two months about the candidates being STATE CERTIFIED PERMANENT LICENSED PEACE OFFICER. I would like to show the Rules and Regulations on TEXAS COMMISSION on LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER STANDARDS and EDUCATION from Austin, Texas.

A State Certified Permanent License Peace Officer is issued for an indefinite term and shall be valid permanently unless it:

- (1) is revoked
- (2) is suspended
- (3) is voluntarily surrendered, or
- (4) becomes inactive because of a two-year break in service as a peace officer.

Now, to retain their licenses  
Rule 211.96

When a holder of peace officer license is reported to the Commission as terminated and is then not reported as employed or appointed as a peace officer for more than two years when the holder has never been employed as peace officer for more than two years after licensing, the Commission shall automatically place the license in an inactive status.

The holder of an inactive license is unlicensed for purposes of Article 4413 (29a) V.T.C.S., and may not accept appointment or be appointed with risking the criminal penalties of that section.

The holder of an inactive license who seeks to reactivate it shall:

- (1) complete, including examinations a re-entry training course, or
- (2) in lieu of completing the re-entry training course, take a license reactivation examination based upon the same subject matter.

The Commission will not reactivate a peace officer license for a previously licensed peace officer who does not successfully complete the examination.

Whether before or after the re-entry training course, the examination shall only be given a total of three times, including any combination of challenges and re-tests.

After three failures, the applicant may not be retested for one year.

## Social Security News

By Terry J. Clements

A person who returns to work after beginning to get Social Security retirement benefits may qualify for higher benefits because of the additional earnings.

It is not necessary for the worker to take any action if his or her earnings would result in higher benefits. Social Security automatically refigures the benefit rate after the earnings are credited to the worker's record.

People should, however, notify Social Security if they expect to earn more than the annual exempt amount. Earnings over the exempt amount result in the withholding of a person's benefits. In general, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount.

The exempt amounts are \$6,120 for people under 65 for all of 1988 and \$8,400 for people 65 through 69. There is no limit on earnings for people 70 and over.

In addition, a worker's benefit can be increased by 3 percent a year (1/4 of 1 percent a month) that the worker does not get benefits after 65. Starting for people who reach 65 in 1990 and later, the credit will be gradually increased until it reaches 8 percent in 2009. The credit also applies to widows and widowers.
