Valley Varsity Wins Four Basketball Games

The varsity boys and girls drove to Amarillo Thursday night and played the games scheduled to have been played on Tuesday night with Clayton, New Mexico.

The girls were 14-7 on top at the end of the first period and Clayton came back and went ahead 13-4 at halftime. At the end of three-quarters, Valley had tallied 10 to 9, and at the final bell Valley was on top 25-13. Final score was 53-42 in Valley's favor.

Sherri Hendrix dropped in 19 points for high score, with Mary Dowd and Karen Ramsey sporting seven each.

The varsity boys were lagging

6-12 at the first bell. At halftime, they were still behind 11-12. In the third quarter, Valley finished 15-12 and the final buzzer sounded on a 23-19 quarter in the Valley Patriots' favor. Final score was 59-55.

Tommy Williams scored 17 points, Kraig Cox 12, and Will Williams 11 points for high scoring honors.

Friday night, the varsity teams drove to Lakeview for a couple of games, winning both.

The girls were on top all the way in this game. First buzzer sounded with the Valley Lady Patriots sporting a 10-9 lead. In the second quarter, the Lady Patriots outscored their opponents 4-1, and in the third quarter Valley led the scoring 8-6. Final quarter scoring was more of the same with Valley leading 16-12. The final score was 38-28 in the Lady Patriots' favor.

Sherri Hendrix scored 18 points, Tammy Clay got six and Mary Dowd, four, for honors.

The boys had no trouble in their game. At the first period end, the Patriots led 29-4. The Patriots outscored their opponents 14-4 in the second period, and 22-11 in the third frame. In the final period, the Patriots continued outscoring with 20-13. Total score was 85-32.

The teams played Silverton here Tuesday night and Hedley comes here Friday, varsities only on both nights.

Boulter Announces Candidacy For Congressional Seat

Beau Boulter officially announced his candidacy for U. S. Congress today.

Boulter, an Amarillo attorney and former city commissioner, is the only Republican announced and expects to face Jack Hightower in the November General Election.

In his announcement remarks, Boulter stressed Hightower's change of priorities since first elected. Boulter believes the number one issue facing the country is cutting federal spending.

"All of our nation's problems can be traced primarily to a Congress which continues to spend more money than it has. Jack Hightower has become too much a part of Washington's system. It's time for that to stop."

In his remarks, Boulter said, "Out of the 35 authorization bills voted on the U. S. House, Jack Hightower voted with Jim Wright and the rest of the big spending Democratic leadership 28 times, or 80%. In comparison, Charles Stenholm voted the same way as Wright on 14 times, or 40%. Phil Gramm voted with Wright only five times or 14% of the time, and Ron Paul voted with Wright one time, or 2%."

Boulter also cited "27 final votes on the actual spending measures in 1983", in which the Republican Congressional candidate said Hightower "voted with Jim Wright and the Democratic leadership 22 times, or 81%". Whereas, Charles Stenholm "voted with Wright only five times, or 18%", Boulter claimed. In 13 of these 22 appropriation votes that Hightower voted with Wright, "Hightower helped to appropriate almost \$40 billion more than Reagan wanted" Boulter charged.

Boulter also attacked Hightower for voting for the "Democratic budget bill", which Boulter says called for "\$32 billion above what the Reagan Administration re-

The Superintendent's Corner

The Texas Legislature will be looking for alternative ways to finance education during the next legislative session. Many taxpayers have found their tax bills decreased this year and are grateful for the relief. Many of the taxpayers, however, suffered a tax increase which was brought on by legislative action. There exists today great inequities in taxation which schools cannot alter without additional help from the legislature.

One alternative source for school funding which will receive major consideration by the next legislature is a reform plan called "Proposition Zero." This is a tax substitution plan which will replace a significant portion of the school property tax on residences with an additional one-cent state sales tax.

According to the sponsors of this proposition, the measure will give tax relief to homeowners, provide a more balanced mix of revenue to schools, provide additional revenue to schools, and reduce the inequities in the educational funding among Texas schools.

The proposition, if enacted, will exempt three categories of property from property taxes:

A) the first \$100,000 of assessed value of single-family residential property; B) the first \$100,000 of rental or multi-family residential property; and C) personal automobiles.

The Bill will dedicate an additional one-cent state sales tax to a central public education fund. Based upon past experiences, this tax could generate well over one billion dollars annually even in a moderate economy. The Comptroller will collect and distribute the proceeds of the sales tax to school districts as compensation for the revenue lost due to the exemption granted by the Bill. No school will lose funds because of the proposal and most will gain.

"Proposition Zero" is not a law, nor is it even a Bill yet, but certainly has a lot of support across the state. Tax relief and an adequate funding for public education is an issue which future legislatures must face. Perhaps "Proposition Zero" is just what we need. At least it is an alternative.

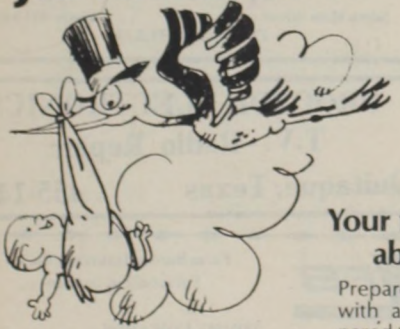
