1st Annual Spring Cleanup Set May 10 -15 In Quitauque

Turnout Light In Saturday's Elections

The turnout was very light in Quitauque and Turkey on May 1, 1993 in the election for a U. S. Senator, school trustees and city council members.

In Briscoe County, Senator Bob Krueger won the most votes with 161 to Kay Hutchison's 114 votes. Hall County gave Krueger 236 votes while giving Hutchison 203 votes. Hutchison carried Motley County with 111 votes to Krueger's 76. There will be a runoff between Krueger and Hutchison on June 5, 1993 for the position of U.S. Senator.

Proposition #1 in Briscoe County had 301 votes for and 138 against. Proposition #2 had 222 votes for and 210 against. Proposition #3 had 292 votes against and 138 votes for.

In Hall County voters gave 358 votes against Proposition #1 with 321 votes for. Proposition #2 lost with 334 against and 322 vote for. Proposition #3 carried with 337 votes for and 321 votes against.

Motley County voters went against Proposition #1 with 293 votes and only 60 votes for. Proposition #2 carried with 248 votes and 113 against. Voters chose to vote against Proposition #3 with 273 votes and only 73 votes for.

In Turkey, Buster Hanna received 92 votes for Place 2, Rick Mullin had 91 votes for Place 3 and Ray Whitaker had 76 votes for Place 5 on the City Council.

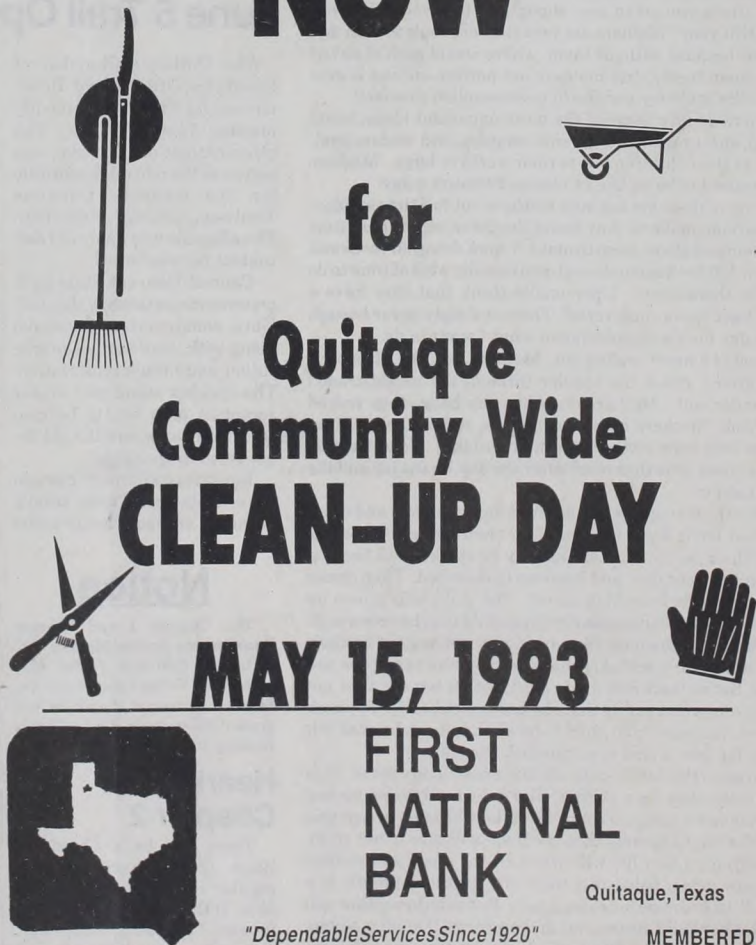
