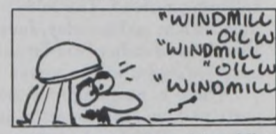
Robyn Lane Made Dean's Honor Roll

A reception was held in the Fellowship Hall of the Church of Christ on May 28th to honor J. T. and Frances Mullin on their 50th wedding anniversary.

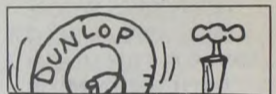
Their two sons, Rod and Bunky Mullin, greeted the guests and registered the guests.
