### SPD SWINE MEET SLATED FOR PLAINVIEW

A conference designed to focus on the swine production industry of the South Plains will be held at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview on Thursday, April 9, announces County Agricultural Agent Kenneth Cook.

The conference will begin at 2 p. m. and will be sponsored by the South Plains Development (SPD) program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Conference moderator will be James Rogers, general manager of the Plainview Production Credit Association and chairman of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Committee.

A slate of top-notch speakers will be on hand to discuss various phases of swine production. They include F. V. Wallace of Amarillo, newly elected president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; Dr. T. D. Tanksley, associate professor of animal science and Extension animal husbandman at Texas A&M University; Dr. Gilbert Hollis of Lubbock, area husbandman at Texas A&M University; Paul Gross of Big Spring, Howard County Agricultural Agent; Roy Poage, Lubbock Swine Breeders, Inc.; and R. A. (Dick) Hurley of Plainview, manager, Jimmy Dean Meat Co. Wallace will express some views on how the West Texas C. C. looks at pork production while Tanksley will discuss the long range outlook for pork production on the South Plains. The use of existing facilities by small farm operators in producing swine will be the subject of Gross' talk.

According to Kenneth Cook, Poage will discuss facilities for a pork production operation. Hollis will give some survey results on the most profitable steps for a beginner in producing pork while Thomas will discuss low cost rations for maximum profit. Hurley will round out the program by discussing his experiences in marketing more than 10 pigs per litter from 400 sows.

Mr. Cook encourages all pork producers and potential producers in the county to attend this conference. It should prove to be quite informative, and all guest speakers will be available for individual consultation following the program. This will offer interested individuals an opportunity to seek advice or additional information with regards to their individual situation.

### TEXAS PEANUT PRODUCERS HOLD BOARD MEETING

The Texas Peanut Producers Board held a full Board Meeting in Mineral Wells, Texas on March 17 and voted to take the following action:

To adopt a budget for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1970. The budget is not a part of this release as each item would require detail clarification and necessitate too much space for publishing. However, the budget will be presented to the Commissioner of Agriculture in a very detailed manner, and anyone desiring a copy of this presentation should write to the Texas Peanut Producers Board, Box 358, Gorman, Texas 76454 and we will be happy to mail you one.

To pay the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association the full amount for expenses incurred in conducting the self-assessment referendum. This amounts to \$8,627.30.

To invite the heads of each farm organization to attend one of our Board Meetings.

To consider May 1, 1970 the beginning of the first fiscal year of operation for the Teyas Peanut Producers Board.

To diversify our banking among more than one bank. Banks used are to be determined by the interest rates and the bank's interest in the peanut producers and
