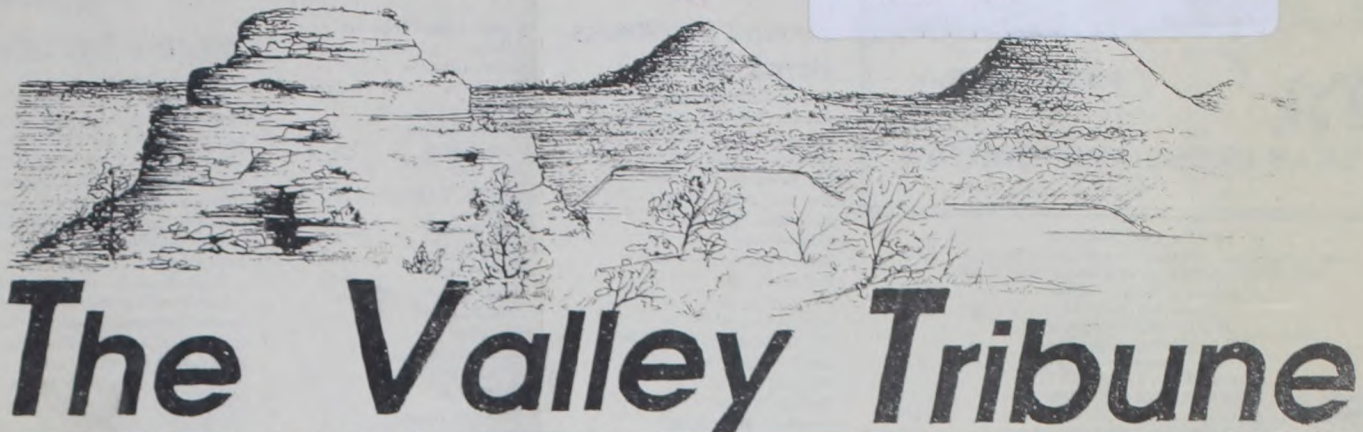

## Pre-Register By November 30

Are you interested in having a 10% discount on your car insurance? Are you 50 or older? If you answered yes, to both of these questions, then we have an answer for you!

55/Alive is a driving program sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) for Adults 50 years and older. It was developed to improve the driving safety for all senior drivers. Instructors for the program are specially trained AARP volunteers.

The course is given in 6 sessions that require 2 days of 4 hours each. Participants must attend all 6 sessions. Certificates are issued at the end of class on the 2nd day. The certificate will then allow you to qualify for 10% discount on most of your car insurance, for up to 3 years.

The course is being sponsored by the Briscoe County Extension Home Economics Committee and will be held on Thursday, December 3, and Friday, December 4 from 4:30-8:30 p.m. The course will be held in the community room of the First National Bank in Quitaque.

Seating is limited, so pre-registration is necessary. You must register by November 30, 1992. If there is not enough interest shown the program will be canceled. To register, call the Briscoe County Extension Office at 823-2131, ext 12 or come by the courthouse.

## Briscoe Appraisal Board Discusses 1993 Appraisal

The Board of Directors of the Briscoe County Appraisal District met on Thursday, November 12, 1992 for their regular meeting. The meeting was called to order by L.B. Garvin, Jr. Secretary John Francis read the minutes from the last meeting.

Caryle Fleming gave the financial report. She noted that the appraisal district staff is preparing to begin the next re-appraisal which is scheduled to be finished by May, 1993.

Over-all collections of the 1992 tax roll through October are at 50.5%, as compared to 46.1% at this time last year.

Caryle reported that the delinquent tax attorneys have recently filed 46 tax suits--14 suits in Justice Court and 32 suits (on 52 parcels) in District Court. The attorneys have indicated that some tax sales will be scheduled within the next two months.

Jimmy Burson made the motion to appoint Clifton Stodghill to serve on the Appraisal Review Board for the 1993-94 term. The motion was seconded and carried.

## New Phone Service Begins December 1, at Quitaque

GTE and International Mobile Machines Corporation (IMM) will put the new telephone system into service on December 1, 1992 for approximately 420 Quitaque customers.

"This is an exciting new technology," said Hardy White, GTE's MidWest Texas Division Manager. "We're proud to be able to offer this to our customers in Quitaque. We hope the community shares in our excitement."

The wireless system is called Basic Exchange Telecommunications Radio Service (BETRS). The quality of service will be enhanced by the new system. Some might see an antenna on the telephone pole outside their home, and phone radio cluster units will be located on concrete pads in various locations.

The wireless concept will provide private line telephone and data services to GTE customers. GTE will upgrade the existing outside plant equipment from wire to digital radio and eliminate the local central office switching equipment. In high-cost rural areas, digital radio is more cost effective than wire and cable.

Another advantage is realized in the ongoing maintenance savings associated with long rural subscriber loops. Other advantages are the quality of service compared to open wire and the ease that new customers may be added to the network.

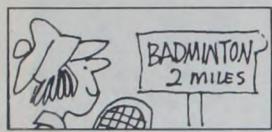

Jeffrey says it is pretty discouraging to treat patients when you know there is no cure, and they cannot get better. "We feel educating communities and youth through prevention is much more rewarding."

It was apparent that these two students are dedicated and caring. Student comments regarding the presentations were: "It was very informative;" "It really made me think twice about the decisions in my life;" "They were really cool!"

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

### DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

### DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

### DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

### Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

### DDS Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

### DDS Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

### DDS Transport Termination

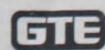
This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DDS Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DDS Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the service.
