Immunization Clinics Slated

Blakney Attends Texas Farm Union Convention

The 88th annual Texas Farmers Union Convention was held January 23-25 in Dallas. Virgil Blakney of Turkey attended the convention and was elected to serve on the Executive Board.

Mr. Blakney is the president of Farmers Union Turkey Unit. Joe Rankin of Ralls was re-elected Texas Farmers Union president.

The group heard from a number of elected officials including Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock and U. S. House Agricultural Committee Chairman E. "Kika" de la Garza, National Farmers Union

Legislative Director Cheryl Cook told those attending the TFU Convention that a proposal developed by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade includes provisions for reducing domestic farm support programs, commodity export subsidies, and trade barriers.

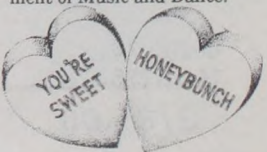
Cook also told the group that close to a billion dollars is available to farmers whose crops were lost due to weather disasters in 1990 and 1991.

The Farmers Union is urging the president to authorize an additional \$775 million in discretionary funds for disaster payments.





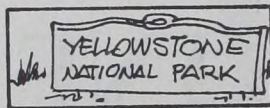
