## Joy Riders Hail And Rain Storms Play Havoc Plague Communities In Turkey

The past week has been a busy one for joy riders in Turkey. They have had a high 'ol time leaving theft and a trail of damage for citizens.

A warning for residents is if it has a motor on it, lock it up, or it may be driven off before morning.

A riding lawn mower was taken from the home of Dona Browning sometime between Saturday night and Sunday afternoon of May 27-28. It is a yellow International Cadet riding lawn mower. A push mower sitting next to it was not disturbed.

Two juveniles took a motor home belonging to I.D. Mullin for a joy ride through Quitaque and Turkey last Wednesday night. As it was being returned to the barn, deputy Garvin Speed was able to apprehend one twelve year old youth; the other ran off, but

was later identified.

A city owned tractor, with a shredder attached, was taken for a joy ride Sunday night by unknown persons. It had been left parked on city property north of town near the swimming pool, and was driven through city streets, damaging yards and one street sign in front of the Leroy Stone home. The joy riders continued down to the home of Johnny and Claudine Perry. There, they left the street, and drove the tractor through the yard into a cyclone fence. The tractor came to a stop, after ripping through a large portion of the fence.

If anyone has any information on the theft of the riding lawn mower, or the identities of the person or persons who took the city tractor are asked to notify Garvin Speed.

Severe weather continued to roam the area again last Saturday night, June 3, 1989, bringing with it the worst fears to life. A tornado hit the Flomot area for the second time this season, destroying anything in its path. Hail and high water were the story around Turkey, wiping out crops, gardens, stripping trees of leaves and branches, and damaging roof tops and vehicles.

Hail stones ranging from marble size in Quitaque to tennis ball size at Valley School to baseball size at Turkey knocked out windows, ripped off window screens, and pounded cotton as well as other crops into the ground.

The storm system moved through the area in about twenty-five minutes, only to be followed by a second storm minutes later.

The homes of Joe Ike Clay and Billy Shannon sustained damages as the twister made its way across the country side. Clay also lost a pivot system. Shannon suffered heavy losses to two barns and a 1984 Ford pickup parked inside one of the barns.

Rain amounts varied around the area. Flomot residents reported some four inch rain gauges were overflowing while creeks and stock tanks were swollen to overflowing. Official reports indicated four to five inches of rain fell as the storm system moved through the area.

Crop damage is the major loss and concern. Most cotton in the Turkey area was hailed out. Farmers are hopeful for drying conditions in time to re-plant crops.

**Bentson Supports Farmers On Crop Loss**

 This winter many Texas farmers have seen their crops cut down by mother nature before the combine ever got a chance at it. Our wheat crop in Texas is now estimated at 60 million bushels, and that estimate is declining every week. By contrast, we harvested 90 million bushels last year and 100 million the year before. So we are looking at a probable state-wide loss of at least 40 percent.  
 More to the point, many farmers have lost their entire wheat crop to weather. Central Texas had a freeze on April 11 that devastated what looked like a good wheat crop. Many Panhandle farmers planted a crop with good rains and then never got another drop. It rained in the Panhandle recently - too late to help, and the storms brought hail that destroyed even more of the crop. Those crops are now gone.  
 A few weeks ago I asked the Senate to go on record in support of the principle of assisting Texas farmers who have seen their winter crops devastated by the weather. The Senate did that as part of the budget resolution.  
 Today I joined with 11 other Senators in introducing legislation to get that job done. Our bill will offer the same assistance to Texas winter wheat producers that was provided last year to farmers in other areas who lost spring-planted crops to the drought. It also provides that this help will not add to the budget deficit, but will come from farm program savings resulting from these short crops.  
 Last year a drought devastated spring-planted crops across much

## Texas Tech Wildlife and Range Field Day June 13

Area ranchers can learn about range land improvements and wildlife and pond management techniques at Field Day 1989, an event sponsored by the department of range and wildlife management at Texas Tech University.

The field day will be from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. June 13 at the Texas Tech Experimental Ranch, two miles southwest of Justiceburg on Highway 84.

## Homestead Act Not Just For Homes

Homes are not the only homesteads in Texas. A business can be a homestead, too. "Anytime Texans talk about their homestead, they probably are discussing a residence," said Judon Fambrough, attorney and senior lecturer with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University. "Most people don't realize that a business can be protected also under Texas homestead laws."

The Texas Constitution provides for an urban homestead that consists of "a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land... provided that it shall be used for the purpose of a home or a place to exercise the calling or business of the homestead claimant..." Protection granted the Texas business homestead is similar to that of the residential homestead, said Fambrough. None of the business premises may be taken by creditors for payment of debts except under certain circumstances. "Tools, equipment, books and apparatus used in a trade or profession also are protected as part of the business homestead," said Fambrough.

Three main elements are required for a business homestead. First, the person claiming the business homestead must have an urban homestead or no homestead at all. Second, the claimant must have a calling or business to which the property is adapted and reasonably necessary. Third, the property must be used as a place to exercise the calling or business. "The business homestead protection is possible only when there is no rural residential homestead being claimed," said Fambrough. "The rural homestead is considered large enough - 200 acres for the head of a household and 100 acres for a single adult - to protect both home and business. That is not necessarily true for the urban homestead. Consequently, the business homestead is allowed only when there is an urban homestead or no residential homestead at all." 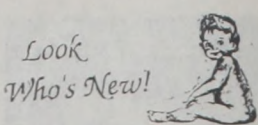

ers and a home care specialist. All physicians are welcomed and encouraged to attend.

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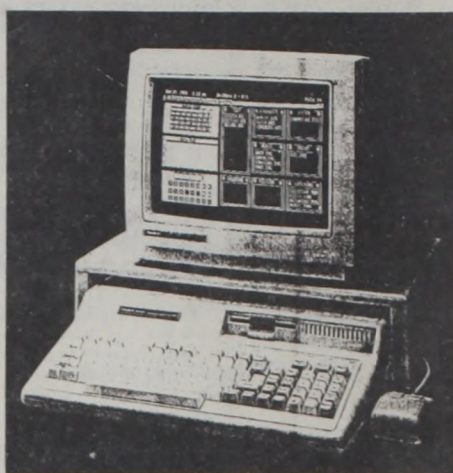
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
