In the game Tuesday night, Valley led 14-10 at the first bell; 31-29 at halftime. At the end of three quarters, Whitharral held a one-point advantage, 46-45, and the final score was 67-65 in Whitharral's favor. The whole game was close.

Species still available are caragana, cotoneaster, honeysuckle, lilac, plum, sumac, sand cherry, nanking cherry, sage, ash, Chinese elm, cottonwood, golden willow, hackberry, honey locust, Russian olive, poplar, aspen, Austrian pine, Colorado blue spruce, eastern red cedar, pinon pine, ponderosa pine, rocky mountain juniper and Scotch pine.

THE SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

by Wilburn Leeper

Hundreds of bills have been introduced into the Texas Legislature this session and many of them are related to education issues. The education bills range from discipline issues, to transportation, student testing, and on to the ever-popular extracurricular activities question. One issue certain to be addressed in the legislature has to do with student/teacher ratio or class size.

The question of class size is a major concern to both large and small schools, and will have a major impact upon the cost of education statewide. House Bill 72, passed last summer, states that each school district must employ a sufficient number of certified teachers to maintain an average ratio of not less than one teacher for each 20 students in average daily attendance. The statute further requires that with the beginning of the 1985-86 school year, a district may not enroll more than 22 students in a kindergarten, first, or second grade class. And then, beginning with the 1988-89 school year, a district may not enroll more than 22 students in a third or fourth grade class.

Valley School has found it desirable to maintain a low student/teacher ratio and would not argue a goal of no more than 22 students in any one class. But this law is inflexible and will create hardships on this and other schools unless the legislature changes the 22 limitation.

If this requirement remains as written, Valley School will find it difficult to comply with its provisions next school year. Our kindergarten, first and second grades each currently have more than 22 students enrolled and likely will be above that magic number next year. The second grade has 29 students enrolled while the kindergarten and first grades have 25 and 23 enrolled respectively. The second grade will be third grade next year and therefore will not be affected by the law. The other two grades, however, have a total of four above the 22 limit and this school will be required to provide classrooms and teachers in order to comply. The law is inflexible and does not allow for "a little above" or "not much more than" the 22 limit.

Valley School does not have the available classrooms to further divide classes nor the resources with which to pay additional teachers. This is a more critical issue for Valley than any other proposal before the legislature at this time.

1979 was a big year for Valley music students. That was the year when two Valley students, Cindy Griffin and Dana Ramsey, under the direction of Patsy Herrington, won the state University Interscholastic League sweepstakes in Solo-Ensemble contest. Winning that trophy was an accomplishment unequalled by any Valley effort in any school activity.

Although 1979 was an eventful year, Valley has qualified yet another talented pair of students to the state contest. Last Saturday, at the Regional Music Contest in Lubbock, Iva June Johnson and Joe Morrison performed with perfection and were

selected to represent this region and Valley School in the state meet. The state contest will be held in early June and we are hopeful that Iva June and Joe will continue their winning ways.

Other Valley students accompanying Mrs. Herrington to the Regional meet were Melissa Maupin, Sarah Hewett and Cari Morrison. This was Melissa and Cari's first trip to the contest, while Sarah was selected last year to participate in the state meet. All these students are outstanding in music and we are proud of their accomplishments.

It is about school board election time. This year's election will be held to fill three places on the board of trustees. The regular three-year terms held by Jim Saul and Jerry Morgan will be filled in the April 6 election

along with one year remaining of Murry Wayne Morrison's term. Murry Wayne served two years of his three-year term before vacating his place on the board. The one remaining year of that place will be filled during the April election. Deadline for filing is March 6.

MISS HELMS MAKES DEAN'S HONOR ROLL

Paula Helms, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Edd Helms of Quitaque, is now in her senior year at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. She has been named to the Dean's Honor List, which is awarded only to those students who have attained a grade point average of 3.5 or better during the past semester.

Miss Helms is practicing her student teaching at Casey Ele-

mentary School at Wolforth. She is teaching in the third grade and kindergarten.
