The Big Chill- Out Of '89 Continues

The Alaskan Cold, that will be remembered as the great freeze of 1989, has dropped temperatures and broken one-hundred year-old records every where the wind blows, continues to shut down businesses and schools due to icy weather conditions and natural gas shortages.

The mercury remains below freezing for day seven, with another cold front due to pass through our area tonight or tomorrow. Conditions are expected to worsen as the

threat of snow accumulation remains.

The harsh temperatures have added to the list of area citizens being hospitalized with pneumonia and flu-like symptoms. Valley School has reported numerous student absentees due to colds, flu and stomach virus. As many as 8 to 12 per day were absent last week for elementary grades alone.

Reports of newborn calves freezing to death are not

uncommon.

Local utility companies have not reported any major problems, other than the average rash of frozen water pipes creating headaches for homeowners.

Quitaque City Secretary, David Brunson, offered some suggestions to possible prevention of freezing pipes, "residents need to leave a faucet running slowly, not the hot water, because that will increase their heating bill, leave bottom cabinet doors open, wrap outside faucets with a towel, then with plastic to keep out moisture. People should use a lamp or electric heater when attempting to thaw water pipes, never use a torch, and leave the heat on in homes, when they must go out for a while."

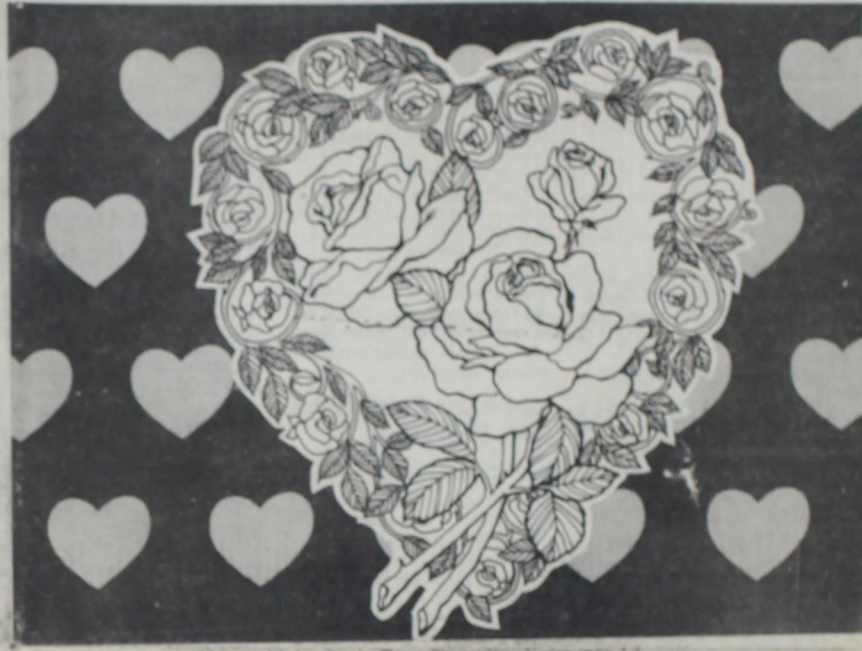

Houston Officials Urge Students Immunizations

In an immediate press release this week, officials of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and the city of Houston are joining in an effort to slow a measles epidemic and make the 1989 Show a safe, healthy outing for all exhibitors and spectators.

The type of measles being spread is 10-day rubeola measles, different from 3-day, German measles. Houston's director of health, Dr. John E. Arradondo, is recommending that anyone

City Application Placed Eighth On List

On Tuesday, January 31, 1989, the Regional Review Committee of the Panhandle Regional Planning Committee heard grant applications from forty Panhandle entities requesting funds from the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA).

The Cities of Quitaque and Silverton made an application to TDCA for \$171,000.00 to develop a joint solid waste disposal facility.

This joint application was presented by Quitaque Mayor Elgin Conner and placed eighth in the regional scoring level.

The application will now be sent to Austin to be scored by the State Review Committee. The committee's scoring results and the combined results should be available in March.

If funds are made available, the facility would be built on an already secured landsite nine miles west of Quitaque.

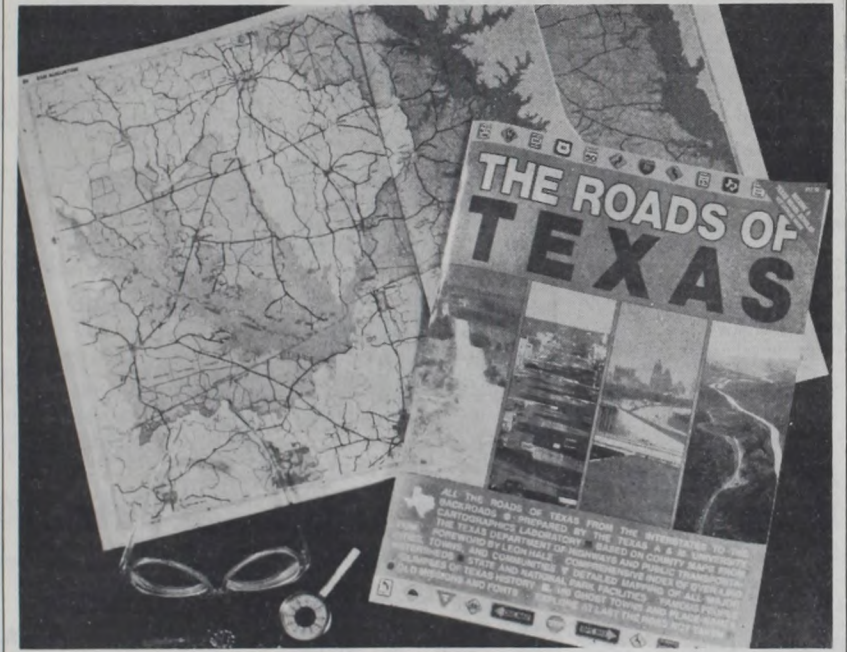

Rolling Plains PCA Had A Good Year

Farmers and ranchers in the Rolling Plains had a "fair to good" year in 1988, according to John S. Rike III, President of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association. The same could be said for the PCA, which reported the largest annual increase in loan volume of any PCA in Texas, excluding those associations merged into one entity.

Rolling Plains PCA's net income for the fourth quarter of 1988 was \$490,345. That compares to a net gain of \$364,350 for the same period in 1987. During the fourth quarter, the PCA was refunded 70 percent of the \$766,000 it had paid to the Farm Credit System Financial Assistance Corporation (FAC) earlier in the year. Under the provisions of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987, all financially strong Farm Credit institutions were required to pay a one-time assessment to support the nation's ailing Farm Credit institutions.

The association specializes in short-and intermediate-term financing for livestock, crops and equipment. Loans are also made to ag-related businesses performing on-farm services. The entity's small loan program cuts down on paperwork for commitments less than \$100,000, and it works with the Farmers Home Administration on subordination and guaranty loans. Term loans for real estate purchases or refinancing are offered, and the PCA has a new fixed rate operating loan program.

Rike says moisture and insect control hold the keys to profitability for area agricultural producers in 1989. During 1988 fair pasture and good prices helped area ranchers and farmers make progress with livestock, but crop production was down due to lack of rain and insect problems.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Significant changes in medicare coverage went into effect in January. The new provisions, which are included in the "Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988," expand medicare coverage for seriously ill persons.

Included in the changes are unlimited periods of hospitalization after payment of the annual deductible amount, unlimited hospice care, and 150 days of skilled nursing facility care.

This year's hospitalization deductible is \$560. A co-insurance payment of \$25.50 per day for skilled nursing facility care must be paid for the first 8 days of care only. Beginning in January 1990, additional medical and prescription drug benefits will be covered, too.

By this time, all medicare beneficiaries should have received their revised medicare handbook showing a side-by-side comparison of the old and new coverage.

"Cholesterol Conscious"

Are you totally confused by the terms cholesterol, fat and saturated fat when trying to read labels and eat healthy? Do you wonder which foods to eat and which to avoid?

In our attempts to follow medical advice and provide healthy food choices, we may find ourselves standing bewildered in the grocery store aisle reading labels and trying to determine what to buy.

What is cholesterol? It is a fat-like substance found in the body cells of humans and animals. This makes it easy to learn which foods have cholesterol - only foods which are animal products, like eggs, meat, fish, poultry, milk and

butter, but not margarine, which is plant product made from vegetable oil.

You may see a margarine container which has "no cholesterol" on its label. That does not mean that that company made the product with no cholesterol, since all margarines made with vegetable oil have no cholesterol.

Another confusion exists with regard to saturated fat and polyunsaturated fats. Saturated fats are found primarily in fats of animal origin but are also found in at least two plant products, coconut and palm oils. When reading labels, note whether one of those two oils is listed if you are trying to avoid saturated fat.

Polyunsaturated fats are found

primarily in fats of plant origin, such as sunflower, corn, soybean, cottonseed and safflower oils. However, some fish are also sources of polyunsaturated fats.

If your doctor requests you to restrict certain of these fats and fat-like substances, you need to learn which foods to avoid. Some foods have a high cholesterol content but low fat content, like shrimp. Veal also has a high cholesterol content in relation to its total fat content. Many organ meats have a

lower fat content but higher cholesterol.

If you want more information on fats and cholesterol, call my office at 823-2131, ext. 12.

Our Extension home Economics Committee plans to schedule a low-cost cholesterol screening in the spring.

traveling to Houston review their immunization records. If they need to be immunized or re-immunized, they should

Any adult born after 1956 who is unsure of whether they have had measles or the vaccine should be immunized. Anyone born after 1956 and immunized prior to 1968 should be re-immunized. be vaccinated before coming to Houston.

Every child 6-months or older who has not had the measles vaccine must be immunized immediately. This is especially important since 70 percent of the reported cases are infants 6 months of age to 5-year-old children.

Measles is a serious disease which can lead to hospitalization if not treated. Any parent who suspects their child of having measles should contact a doctor immediately. All doctors must report measles cases to city and county health officials. The Houston Livestock Show attracts more than one million spectators annually.

Students, age 15-17, will arrive in the United States in August, 1989, attend a local high school, and return to their home countries in June 1990. The students, all fluent in English, have been screened by their school representatives in their home countries and have spending money and medical insurance.

Host families may deduct \$50 per month for income tax purposes.

AISE is also seeking AMERICAN High School Students age 15-17, who would like to spend a high school year in the above mentioned countries or participate in a five-week Summer Host Family Stay throughout Western Europe including Ireland.


