### The Turkey Heritage Foundation Presents In Concert ~ Terry Smith "A Songwriter With A Different Touch"

From Nashville, Tennessee Terry was voted by the Traditional Music Association as its songwriter of the Year in both 1995 and 1996. He wrote the song "Far Side Banks of Jordan" which is featured twice in Robert Duvall's movie, *The Apostle*. It has been recorded by more than fifty artists including Johnny and June Carter Cash, and Allison Krauss and has won three Grammys. Terry has written about 2000 songs and some of them have been recorded by such greats as Kitty Wells, The Oak Ridge Boys, Chris LeDoux, Roy Acuff and others.

A traditional singer in his own right Terry has released five albums of original material to date. He writes gospel, ballads, novelty, story songs, honky-tonk, and western swing. You need to listen closely to every word because he has such a unique way with words. He is indeed a "Songwriter With A Different Touch". His novelty songs will certainly make you laugh and his ballads, story songs and love songs touch not just your heart, but your soul as well. Terry was raised in Denton, Texas and says his roots are still in Texas. He taught English and coached baseball in schools in Texas and Tennessee before he gave it up to become a full time singer and songwriter. He has steadily built a following over the years in Europe, Australia, New Zealand, and the U.S. Terry will be backed by some of the Turkey Gems with special guest drummer, Jack Greubel. Jack played drums for Floyd Cramer for 14 years as well as for Chet Atkins, Boots Randolph, and other greats.

The Valley Academics Program would like to recognize World War II veterans. If you have a loved one, friend, or someone special, please bring their pictures and some information about their service in the armed forces to RuthAnn Scrivner, Stuart Smith, or JoAnn Reagan at Valley School.



U. F. Coker, Jr.

U. F. Coker, Jr. entered the Armed Forces on November 4, 1942. He served in the U. S. Army Infantry. He trained at Oklahoma, California and Washington. U.F. went overseas on April 26, 1943. He was in the Theatre of Operations in Alaska. He received the following decorations: Good Conduct Medal, World War II Victory Medal and Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon.

He returned to the U. S. in 1944 and was discharged on February 1, 1946 at North Carolina. He achieved the rank of Technical Sergeant and served a total of thirty-nine months.



William Abner Rucker

William Abner Rucker entered the Armed Forces on September 13, 1942. He served in the U.S. N. R. V6 6175936 and was assigned to Motor Torpedo Squadron 16; Companies in Gulf Antisubmarine Patrol. He was in the Theatre of Operations in the Pacific at Attu & Kiska-1943 (Alaska), New Guinea-1944, Palawian & Battle of Lenguian Gulf-1944, Mendaua, Leyte, Mendera & Luzon-1944 & 1945, and in Borneo-1945. He was discharged on December 15, 1945 at the Fargo Building in Boston Massachusetts.

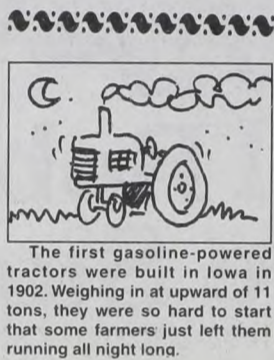
Evelyn Grace Mayfield

Robert Haskett of Millington, TN was in town for last week's celebration and requested a recipe for HOT, SPICY CHICKEN. Do you have one that will make his eyes water? Please send it in.

C. M. V. who didn't give a hometown has lost the recipe for CHOCOLATE MAYONNAISE CAKE. Can you help?

A reader from Matador asks: What in balsamic vinegar? Can I substitute regular vinegar in recipes?

Balsamic vinegar is made from sweet white grapes and aged in wooden barrels for at least 10 years (that explains the hefty price). You can substitute cider vinegar or a mild red wine vinegar. White wine vinegar is much stronger and sharper and should be used only sparingly if it is your only substitute.

June from Richland Hills used to make Oatmeal Cookies from the SPRY SHORTENING COOKBOOK. Book is missing now and they were the best. Might you have a Spry Cookbook from the 50's?

J.A. of Roaring Springs asks: I have recipes that use saffron. What is it?

Saffron is a very rare and expensive herb with a unique flavor made from the stigmata of the saffron flower. It must be hand-harvested, and it takes at least 4,000 stigmata to produce 1 ounce of saffron. It's too expensive for most people, and many use ground turmeric instead to add a similar flavor and the same bright yellow color.
