Tom Christian Seeking Third Term

Today Rep. Tom Christian, Claude farmer-stockman, is announcing his candidacy for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives.

He will be seeking his third term in the newly-created Sixty-Sixth District which includes Gray, Wheeler, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Floyd and Motley counties.

Christian, long an advocate of reform in Texas government, said, "I will continue to push for changes in House rules and procedures, including limitation of the powers of the Speaker of the House."

Christian added, "I believe that we must also work with the Texas Board of Education and our local school boards to develop a plan for maintaining local control of our children's education."

"We must strive to increase vocational education opportunities and work for welfare reform that will alleviate the great burden that is being placed on our tax-paying citizens."

"In my campaign I will continue to stress the needs of agriculture with emphasis on research that will help us to prevent the problems with quarantines that we now face."

Christian added, "It is imperative that we get our water plan off the drawing board and in operation . . . combined with research in the area of brush control that will conserve that water supply that is now available to us."

As a member of the Legislature, Christian has served as a member of the Committees on Juvenile Crime and Delinquency, Criminal Jurisprudence, Public Education, Livestock, and Public Lands and Buildings.

He is currently a member of the Committees on Revenue and Taxation, Parks and Wildlife, Elections, Penitentiaries, and Business and Marketing Affairs.

A graduate of West Texas State University, Christian is a former teacher and coach. He served in the United States Navy and as a member of the Ceremonial Guard in Washington, D. C.

He is a director of the Armstrong County Medical Center, a director of the Panhandle Livestock Association, a director of the Panhandle - Plains Historical Society, and a past chairman of the Board of Stewards of the First United Methodist Church of Claude.

Christian is married to the former Anne Thomas of Ralls. Mrs. Christian is a graduate of Texas Tech University in Lubbock and is also a former teacher in Panhandle schools. The Christians have four children: Frances Anne, age 10; Joe Tom, age 8; Richard William, age 5; and Mary King, age 1.

Quitaque Teams Close Home Schedule With Wins

Quitaque's high school basketball teams probably played the last interscholastic League games in the QHS gym Tuesday night, in games with Lakeview and fans saw Quitaque win its last games in the venerable old "cracker box" whose history began in 1928.

Last Friday night the local teams hosted the Estelline High teams and Quitaque won all four games, the Pantherettes taking a 55-43 victory and the Panthers coming off with a 57-48 win over the Bears.

Wanda Ramsey hit for 18 points, Cherri Brown and Cookie Dowd canned nine points, Eva Cheatham, 8, Mary Brunson, 7, Janie Hendrix and Mary Brunson hitting for two points each in the district win.

For the Panthers, Hoss Hamilton notched 15 points, Alvin Ivory, 14, David Johnston, 11, Billy Cagle, 9, Dee Whittington, 4, Danny Payne and Mickey Smith, 2 each.

Tuesday night saw the Pantherettes shoot themselves into first place in the district race with a 46-37 win over the Lakeview Eaglettes and leaves them within one game of owning the round robin title. That one game remaining, however, is against the tough Hedley Owlettes and will be played at Hedley.

The Panthers won over the Eaglettes by a 10-point margin, 76-66, in a game in which the officials called 46 fouls, 32 of them against Quitaque. Actually, the game was not as close as the score indicated since Coach Dean Johnson played his reserves much of the game.

The girls game had a lot of whistle tooting, also, with a total of 45 fouls called, 25 against Quitaque and 20 against the visitors. Free shooting was the only thing that kept the visitors in the game as they hit 21 of 28 chances at the charity line while Quitaque sank 12 and missed 8. The Pantherettes canned 17 field goals to the visitors' 8.

The girls got off to a slow start, the visitors sinking a field goal in the early minutes to draw first blood, but that turned out to be all the scoring for the Eaglettes in the first period, and the Pantherettes went five minutes and 26 seconds before they could drop in a fielder, although they did have five points on the board when they hit a two pointer. The count was 9-2 at the end of the first period. Quitaque owned a 24-18 lead at halftime. The Eaglettes drew within six points late in the game but they never seriously threatened to pull the game out.

A pair of freshmen, Cherri Brown and Eva Cheatham, shared scoring honors for the evening with 15 points each. Wanda Ramsey got in foul trouble early and watched much of the game from the bench. She did not foul out, but still hit for only seven points. Bonnie Clary, who doubles between guard and forward, tossed in four points, Cookie Dowd, 3, and Mary Brunson, 2.

Gail Tyler, Anna Jean Taylor and Bonnie Clary started at guard and did a very good job of stopping the Eaglette scoring. Susie Hendrix saw quite a bit of action at guard, also, and she turned in a good performance.

Although the Panthers never built a real big lead over the Eaglettes, there was never any doubt about the outcome. Most of the starting five were hitting well, especially Alvin Ivory and Hoss Hamilton in the early minutes, with David Johnston catching fire later. Ivory found himself in foul trouble early, picking up three personals in the first period, then the fourth in the second period. However, he had dumped in 15 points by that time and wound up

Voter Registration Continuing Here

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said today that despite some newspaper articles and radio bulletins to the contrary, voter registration did not end on January 31.

Secretary Bullock said, "I am aware of at least two newspaper articles and several radio announcements which stated that January 31 was the last day for voter registration. Apparently there is some confusion about the new voter registration law passed by the last legislature. Under the new law, voters can register any time during the year. However, persons must register at least 30 days prior to an election to be able to vote in that election."

Every person who registers as of April 5, 1972, will be eligible to vote in the May 6 primary; likewise, every person who registers by October 7, 1972, will be permitted to vote in the November 7 General Election.

Bullock stated that his office is mailing a reminder of the new voter registration law to all County Tax Assessor-Collectors who are responsible for issuing voter registration certificates.

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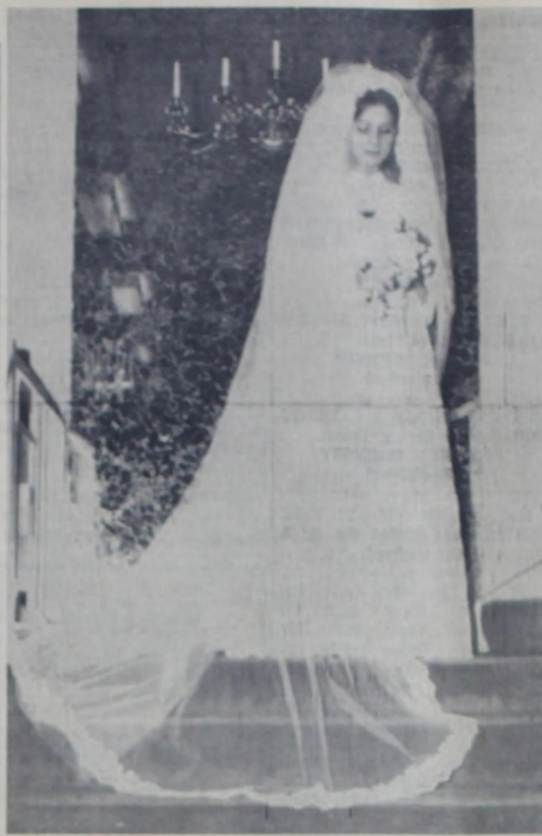

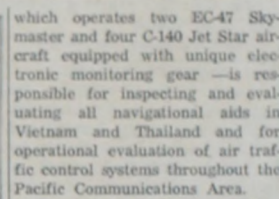
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MAJOR JASPER A. SETLIFF
