Texas Farmers Union Call For Continued Full Parity

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS -- Texas delegates at the National Farmers Union Convention in San Antonio are in full support of continuing the general farm organization's goal of a farm program centered around 100% of parity.

The committee which drafted the preliminary policy outline for delegate adoption surprised many by calling for a policy which would seek an immediate loan rate at 75% of parity for all commodities. That move would deviate from the traditional stand of Farmers Union which calls for full parity prices.

The provision for a lower support level is intended to urge the administration to move immediately with some kind of program which would offset current market prices which are, in respect to production costs, the lowest since the Depression. Proponents of

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Grains Agreement Should Involve More Than U. S. & Canada

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, March 7, 1977--An international grains agreement should involve more countries than the United States and Canada, the secretary of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool said at the 75th Diamond Jubilee convention of the National Farmers Union Monday.

J.O. Wright, whose farmer-owned cooperative serves 70,000 farmers and handles two-thirds of the grain and 50 percent of the livestock marketed in that Canadian province, said at a news conference here that it is over-simplification to think of a minimum grain price agreement involving only Canada and the U.S.

Wright said that while his wheat pool is "quite pleased" with the recent grain pricing talks between U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland and Canadian agriculture officials, "We're not very confident that the U.S. and Canada alone can successfully set up a 'cartel' over a long period of time."

He said such negotiations should involve all major importing and exporting countries to be effective. "Our concept of an international agreement is an agreement-not a cartel-between exporting and importing countries to establish minimum and maximum prices-prices that would be quite far apart-and where negotiations would determine the triggering point guiding release of stocks into the market in cases of shortages or surpluses," said Wright.

"We should be competing to the extent that it is not harmful to us," he added. Wright said importing countries such as Japan should not resist such an agreement because stable prices and supplies are in the interest of these countries. He also said American consumers should not be worried that such an agreement would have a major effect on food prices. "Consumers benefit from stable supplies, too," he said, "and the cost of wheat is only a very small part of the bread prices."

Wright said the recent U.S.-Canadian pricing talks "were good in that, one, it recognizes there is a problem, and two, because we got together and talked about it."

He said there are positive things the two countries can accomplish together, such as establishing a reserves policy and cementing a willingness to hold grain off the market to avoid depressed markets.

But successful grain pricing must involve more countries, he said. "An agreement between the U.S. and Canada isn't the whole answer." Wright predicted that Australia and the European economic community would cooperate in an international grains agreement, which he said basically involves "managing supplies in such a way as to avoid damaging ups and downs in prices."

Wright said over 70 percent of grain in world trade is controlled by the U.S. and Canada. Wright said views vary in Canada, as they do in the U.S., on what constitutes cost of production, but he said "I'm sure that for wheat it is between \$3.50 and \$3.75."

"The Mental Health Association is the largest citizens' voluntary advocacy organization in the United States fighting mental illness and promoting mental health," said Camfield.

Since the organization is non-governmental, its entire support must come from contributions, such as those collected in May.

The original and continuing purposes of the association are to: improve attitudes toward mental illness and the mentally ill; improve services for the mentally ill; and work for the prevention of mental and emotional illness and promotion of mental health.

Through social action the association sees that governmental agencies are seen in the results of an impoundment suit brought by the Mental Health Association which forced the release of over \$1,600,000 federal funds in Texas for research, alcoholism and manpower.
