## Valley Rolls Over Bovina

Valley raced to a 51-0 halftime lead and earned a 58-14 Homecoming Victory.

The Valley offense amassed 428 total yards while the defense limited its opponent to 155 yards total.

Kirk Saul completed seven of twelve passes for 161 yards, playing only the first half. Brandon Smith was 4-9 for 37 yards passing and had 60 yards rushing on 15 carries. Other rushing leaders were Will Williams, 4-43, Eric Scoggins, 2-34, Freddie Ruiz, 2-29, Brandon Stark, 10-20, Jackie McNary, 7-21.

Lane Myers had four catches for 58 yards and one touchdown; Matt Barrett had two catches for 35 yards; Jamie Cox scored on a blocked punt and Chuck Martin scored on an intercepted pass. Eric Scoggins scored on a 28-yard run and a 49-yard TD pass from Saul.

Good defensive efforts were turned in by Rosendo Silva, Craig Setliff, Thomas Rodriguez and Joe Silva.

**The Turkey Enterprise**

**October 11, 1945**—Chief Yoe-man and Mrs. Alton Arnold spent the weekend with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Arnold. Arnold only recently arrived home from the South Pacific. He brought his dad some cotton grown on one of the islands where he visited. The cotton grows on trees and the bolls have only three locks. The cottonseed are all in a cluster in the center of each lock. The texture of the lint is finer than Texas cotton and more silky. Alton says the natives didn't know what it was . . .

**August 16, 1945**—With the 27th (Tokyo Express) Infantry Division in the Western Pacific—Technical Fifth Grade James Guest of Turkey is now serving with the Lions Combat engineers under command of Lt. Col. Harald F. Gormsen. On the southern front his unit constructed four bridges across the Machinato Inlet, Okinawa, speeding Major Gen. George W. Griner's 27th Infantry Division in its drive toward Naha, and although heavy enemy shell fire knocked out sections of the bridges five times, these engineers kept the vital supply route open. Prior to the Okinawa operation he participated in the assaults on Majuro and Saipan Islands. He wears the Asiatic-Pa-



Dig we did, and after going down three feet, we dug up a solid silver spoon, the most beautiful spoon I had ever seen. We flipped a coin to see who would get the spoon, and I lost.
