right to protect his crops by chemical means if he is at the same time endangering his neighbor?

There is another aspect to be considered concerning the seeding of clouds. In a letter to the Texas Water Development Board, Dr. W. B. Conway of the Arizona Environmental Protection Agency, says in part: "There is an additional reason to take extreme care in allowing cloud seeding. I quote again from the book, 'Weather and Climate Modification,' page 85, 'Significant quantities of seeding material were present in the target area precipitation, in timing and location agreement with calculated occurrence of seeding effect.' The point is the cloud seeding materials (silver and lead) will be eaten by cattle, then by humans, which could cause a long term effect. This has recently become an important concern in the Soviet Union's program; shouldn't it also be yours? You are of course aware of the new law under consideration by the Federal government making chemicals to be proven safe before they are introduced to the public. The same should be required of cloud seeders when silver and lead are known to be harmful on consumption by humans."

"I believe you should give long consideration before letting money be the prime concern on whether the weather modification is allowed or whether long term effects on the population is more important. 'Hail destroys crops. Poisoning destroys people.'

In order to protect the Briscoe County Clinic Association and the Board of Directors of that organization, the Board of Directors of the Clinic Association find it will be necessary for all persons using clinic to be members of the Clinic Association.

The Articles of the Association's By-Laws that makes this policy necessary are as follows:

Section 1. Qualification for Membership. All adult persons of good moral character and residing within the trade territory of the City of Silverton and in Briscoe and its adjoining counties in Texas shall be eligible for membership in this corporation upon payment of the membership fee of \$1.00. Incorporators of this corporation shall be deemed members thereof immediately upon completion of incorporation and payment of the membership fee.

Section 6. The members shall not be liable for the debts of this corporation.

Section 7. The corporation, its officers and directors and employees, shall not be liable to any member of this corporation for any act, omission, negligence or so-called malpractice on the part of those who may be selected by the directors to operate the property of this corporation in furtherance of its benevolent and charitable purposes.

Section 8. No person whose membership is terminated in this corporation for any reason shall be entitled to a refund or any moneys which he has paid into the corporation.

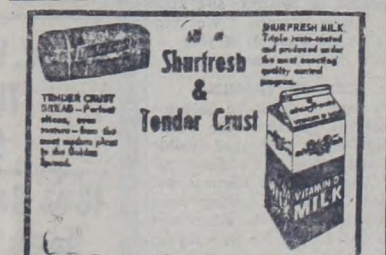
