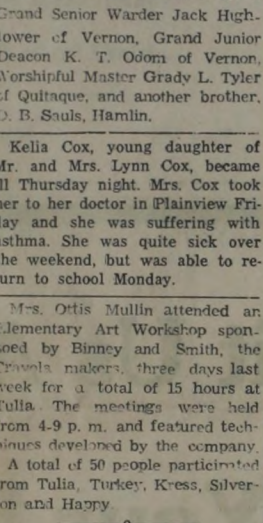
## QUITAQUE LIONS TO TREAT KIDS AGAIN

WO Guy Andrews, Jr., 21, brother-in-law of Mrs. Ken Cary, was killed in a U. S. Army helicopter accident near Fort Hood on Monday, November 30. Funeral services for Mr. Andrews were held Thursday, December 3 at Lubbock.

Mr. Andrews was pilot of the craft in which he and two others were killed. The trio was involved in a Project MASTER training exercise when the aircraft crashed.

Andrews, who had received the silver wings of an army aviator, was appointed warrant officer in June, 1969 upon graduation from the Army Aviation School at Hunter Army Airfield at Savannah, Ga. He had served in the U. S. Army two and a half years, including a tour of duty in Vietnam. He returned to the States last July.

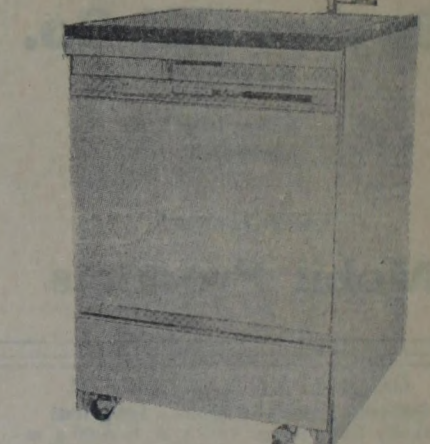
