The people of the area began rejoicing Sunday when reports of moisture falling began over the adjoining territory.

It was a different story Tuesday night when a neighboring town was hit by a tornado that spawned in a turbulent cloud that also produced much lightning, hail and rain.

Deputy Sheriff Oliver Clark reported to the Tribune editor Wednesday morning that the tornado hit Matador at about 8:00 p.m. and did extensive damage. The new school building was totally destroyed and the other school received extensive damage. Many homes were damaged and some destroyed. Mr. Clark reports it is unbelievable that so much damage could be done without loss of life and injury. As he and Mrs. Clark left about 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, only one person had been reported injured slightly.

Dude Speed, resident trooper for the Texas Department of Public Safety in Matador, called all area patrolmen, according to Deputy Clark, and he, Sheriff Dick Roehr and Deputy Don Mills of Turkey were among the first on the scene. Very soon, other DPS units began arriving from Childress, Tulia and other neighboring towns. The electricity and telephones were out and the sightseers were hindering traffic. Deputy Clark reports pilferers were already under foot. In a short time, the DPS brought some order to the situation.

Mr. Clark reports the Salvation Army was in Matador by 2:00 a.m. and was fantastic in the organization and help it produced.

According to report, there is a two to four block area knocked out in Matador. There were watchers out and this warning was credited with no loss of life and little injury. Mr. Clark reports there were approximately 15 persons in the basement of the school that was destroyed. The Clarks and all the area DPS spent the night in Matador helping. They talked by telephone to the Jesse Turners. Their home received some damage, but they were uninjured.

More weather is expected for the next few days as we go to press.

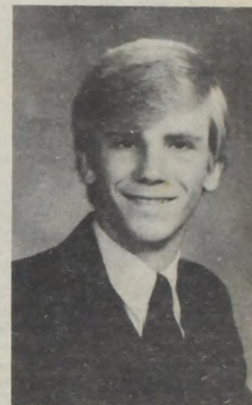
Sherri plans to attend Clarendon College to major in accounting. She also plans to try out for the basketball team there.

The Superintendent's Corner

by Wilburn Leeper

According to House Bill 246, every school district in Texas has the responsibility to provide a well-balanced curriculum to all the students enrolled. The subject matter to be taught is delineated as minimum essential elements and will be implemented next school year.

Students enrolled in grades one, two and three will have similar blocks of time devoted to each of the subjects which are taught. In language arts, for instance, there will be no less than 120 minutes daily devoted to the teaching of this subject. The essential elements, according to the curriculum plan, for language arts will include activities in listening, speaking, reading and writing. The difficulty of the activity for each grade will depend upon the child's grade level and his learning experience.

Mathematics is another important subject area targeted by the new curriculum plan. No less than 60 minutes daily will be used in the classroom for the teaching of math. The instruction in math will not be changed much from the current practice but students will be assured that all the necessary elements which they should receive will be taught commensurate with grade and ability. For example, each student in grades one, two and three will be taught how to use geometry. Students should learn the necessary elements before they pass to the next grade.

The daily schedule for these lower elementary grades will include instruction in physical education; not just recess. The essential elements for physical education will include fitness development, motor skills, skills related to sports, rhythmic activities, and tumbling and gymnastic skills.

The weekly schedule will include instruction in fine arts and health. Although a specific block of time is not required for instruction in this area, sufficient time must be given to meet the student's needs. Fine arts are described as theatre arts, art and music. Elements of each should be taught throughout the year.

Within each semester, the equivalent of at least 100 minutes per week will be devoted to teaching of science and social studies. These are two subjects which schools have paid little attention to lately, largely because state-adopted textbooks have not been available and state requirements were lacking.

Lori Clay and Darren Edwards have returned home after competing in the state contest for Ready Writing. Their papers were not selected among the winners, but they felt good about their effort. When one gets that far in excellent competition, they are all winners. Mrs. Tiffin, who accompanied the students, said the judges had a difficult time determining the winners. "In fact," Mrs. Tiffin said, "the judges stated that the competition was so close that all those participants not selected as winners could consider themselves fourth-place winners." Lori and Darren had an outstanding year in UIL contests and we are proud

of them.

Christi Gragson competed in the Regional Globe-News Spelling Bee in Amarillo last Saturday. Christi made it through 11 rounds of the match before succumbing and placing 11th out of 48 spellers. That was an excellent effort by this fine student and Valley School is proud of her.

The last day of classes this year will be May 23. Senior graduation will be held on Sunday, May 20, and the Eighth Grade graduation is May 22.

The Valley girls state track qualifiers will be competing in

Austin at the State Track Meet on Saturday, May 5. These girls will represent Valley School and this region in the 400 meter relay, the 800 meter relay and the 100 meter sprint. Valley is the defending champion in the 400 relay. Good luck to Karen Ramsey, Mary Dowd, Karen Clinton, Cynthia Fulbright and Coach Phelps.

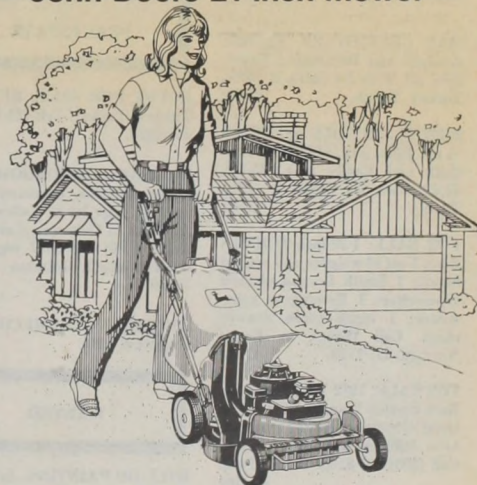
