Valley Residents Warned Of Con Artists In Area

"Valley residents are encouraged to be on the look out for a con artist working in our region." This is the warning that Hall County Chief Deputy, Steve Farley issued this week to area residents. He went on to say, "We have had numerous complaints that this person is in the Turkey and Quitaque area and has been running various con-games on local residents."

Farley went on to say, "This con artist may tell you he can treat your trees for bugs. He will then return wanting more money, for work that he supposedly did while you were gone."

If anyone comes to your home wanting to do work in your yard or house make them give you their company name and phone number. If they tell you they are related to someone you know, call that person and ask them to be sure. Check it out thoroughly before you commit to letting the person do the work for you.

There have also been other reports that this con artist has been telling his victims that he has a truck load of VCR's, TV's or other merchandise but that his truck ran out of gas just outside of town. He will then ask you for money to buy gas and promise he will come back and give you a new VCR or TV for your help. Don't be taken in, once this con artist gets your money he will never be back. Tell him the local Sheriff's Department will be glad to help him and offer to make the call.

Remember, if anyone you do not know comes to your door trying to sell you something or wants money from you, for any reason, tell them no and call the Sheriff's office immediately at 806-259-2151. Remember if it sounds good to be true, it probably is.

Chrystal Robison, 24, of Turkey, died at the scene after a two vehicle wreck Friday evening, June 21, 1.6 miles southeast of Turkey, a Department of Public Safety spokeswoman said.

She said Robison was driving a 1995 Chevrolet pickup on FM 656 that collided with a 1999 Ford F-150 pickup driven by Kerry Borcahardt, 27, of Clarendon.

Borcahardt and two others in the Ford pickup were in serious condition after being airlifted to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, the spokeswoman said.

Ray Bradley, 22, of Turkey and Shawn Collier, 28, of Turkey were the other injured passengers, DPS said.

The DPS spokeswoman said Robison, Borcahardt and the injured passengers were not wearing seat belts.

Crystal River To Perform At Turkey's First Baptist Church

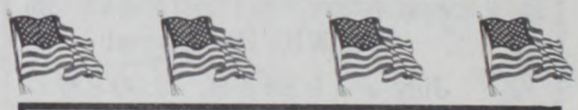
"Crystal River" will perform at the First Baptist Church in Turkey on Sunday, June 30, 2002 at 10:30 a.m.

Honoring Those Who Served A Salute To Local WWII Veterans



Charles H. Hamner

Charles H. Hamner entered the U.S. Armed Forces on May 4, 1943 at Lubbock, Texas. He served with the 1250th Detachment, Military Police Company (AVN) as an Antiaircraft Gunner.

Charles took an Air Crew Training Course and was also qualified as an Expert Rifleman in January 1944.

He served in the overseas Theatres of Operation in Normandy, Northern France, and Central Europe.

Charles received the EAME Campaign Medal with 3 Bronze Stars; a Good Conduct Medal, a Victory Ribbon, and 3 Overseas Service Bars.

He was discharged from the Armed Forces on January 13, 1946 at Fort Sam Houston, Texas



Major Willis B. Garner

Willis B. Garner entered the Armed Forces on November 5, 1942, at Ft. Polk, Louisiana. He was commissioned a 1st Lieutenant and was deployed from Ft. Polk on December 18, 1942, to the China, Burma, and India Theatres of Operation. He served under the direct command of General Joseph Stilwell.

Willis served in the Corps of Engineers supervising the building and maintenance of supply lines including the Stilwell Road, formerly known as the Ledo and Burma Roads. He rose to the rank of Major and was awarded numerous citations including the Bronze Star and the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon.

He was discharged from the Armed Forces on February 24, 1945, at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

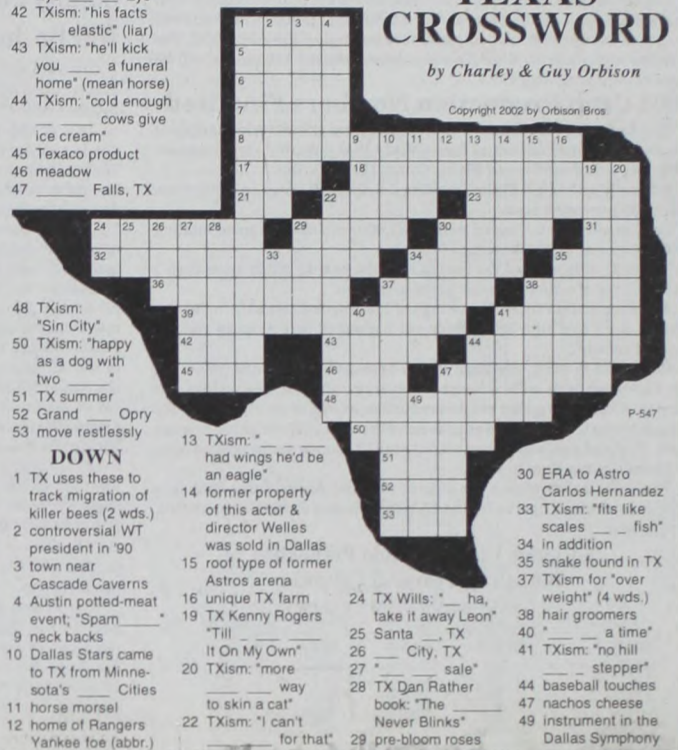

"Participating in Walk Across Texas is not only a great way to get involved with our community it's a healthy habit," Cory added.

To participate in Walk Across Texas, first get a team together and then choose a team name. The competition will kick off July 8th. Interested participants should come to the Briscoe County Courthouse basement on July 8 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. for a come-and-go registration party. 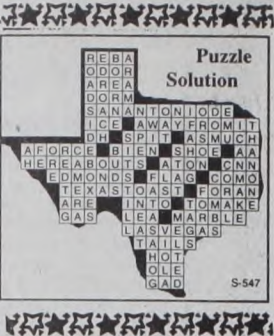
