Good Crowd Affends Turkey Town Meeting

The Panhandle Plains Town Meeting Day held in Turkey September 10 got off to a good start with approximately 150 interested citizens in attendance. Jay Eudy, Mayor of Turkey, was in charge of the welcome and introductions.

As the citizens registered, they received name cards decorated with wheels of red, green and black spokes, which designated the workshop group they were to attend. The black wheel group were divided to go half into the red group and half into the green group for the first hour session.

The groups returned to an assembly for the second hour for a festive supper and visiting interlude followed by workshop reports.

The citizens then separated into three groups for a follow-up discussion of their proposed challenges.

The final session was concluded with the story of Turkey composed into one paragraph by members from the black wheel group which was read by Byron Young: **THE STORY OF TURKEY, TEX.**

"Turkey started from ranching heritage and grew into a farm economy with four gins, a compress, and approximately 50 businesses with a large consolidated school-trading center for Southwest Hall County. We are struggling economically to bring in new industry and hold the interest of our young people so that they won't move away. A new organization, the Alpha Rho Chi, is sponsoring the City Park. We are hoping for a new eight-unit housing project and to stabilize our economy. Our dreams are that the community will work together to build a better future."

A symbol of the community, which was designed by a group, contained a bale of cotton, a violin, a turkey, etc., and was presented at the assembly, followed by a song composed about Turkey by the group.

Patriots Swat Claude 33-0 To Remain Undefeated

The fired-up Valley Patriots recovered a Claude fumble on the first play from scrimmage at the Claude six-yard line, then on Valley's first offensive play Kenneth Helms put the Patriots on the scoreboard with just 14 seconds gone in the game. The try for the extra point was missed and Valley led 6-0.

The Patriots kicked to the Mustangs on the 24-yard line. Claude was unable to move to a first down and had to punt, a short one that went only to their own 41-yard line.

The Patriots used just eight plays from that point to post their second touchdown with quarterback Kirk Proctor hitting halfback Randy Woods for a 12-yard scoring pass.

This time Larry Curry was given a shot at the try for conversion and Larry booted the pigskin squarely between the uprights. With 4:35 still left in the first quarter Valley led 13-0.

Claude returned the kickoff to their own 48 yard line, then picked up a couple of first downs, moving inside the Valley 20. The Patriots' defense held the Mustangs at that point. Dowd picked up four yards, then a first down on the next try with a 7-yard burst up the middle. On the next play Helms almost broke loose, picking up 15 yards. On the next play, from the Claude 39-yard line, Dowd did break it and picked up the third TD on a nifty scoring run. Curry again booted the extra point and Valley led 20-0 with 0:53 still left in the first quarter.

Claude returned the ensuing kick off out to the 35 yard line. The Mustangs picked up a first down at the 50-yard line but on the next play big Kenny Chandler, defensive end, chased the Mustang quarterback down for a 15 yard loss. Jesse Ferguson, playing at the other defensive end for the Patriots, intercepted a Claude pass on the next play and was tackled on the 29 yard line, as the first period ended.

Valley fumbled the ball away on their first play to start the second quarter but once again the Mustangs could not move the ball and had to kick it away.

The Patriots scored their third TD on this possession with Helms driving in from five yards out. The try for extra point was missed this time and Valley led 26-0 at half-time.

The Mustangs took the second-half kickoff, stalled and had to kick. The Mustangs' kicker got off a good kick that rolled to the Valley one-yard line. Valley moved for a first down, then were penalized a couple of times, and then had to punt from their own 6-yard line. Claude took over on the 26 yard line and the Mustangs had their best chance to get on the scoreboard. The Mustangs moved for a first down at the Valley 15 yard line, then picked up a yard on the next try, and then threw three incomplete passes. From there the Patriots moved downfield into scoring position but could not get in for the score. Valley's Kenneth Helms got away from a nifty 60 yard gallop in the third period and came within a whisker of going all the way but once again the Patriots stalled and the third period was scoreless.

The fourth period was much the same as the third with the exception that the Patriots picked up another score with Helms getting his third score of the game, this one from the five yard line. Curry kicked the point after to make the score 33-0.

Friday night's win left the Patriots undefeated for two games and also unscored upon. The Patriots like to score and they also like to stop the other team and have done both very effectively. All four of the backs have played very well on offense. Of course Helms and Dowd have been very impressive on offense and in two games their statistics are very nearly equal. Their teammates are giving the ball carriers good blocking to help them move the ball. On defense the Patriots have the name and tradition of being tough and stingy. Thus far it appears that the current edition of the Patriots is cut from the mold and just might be one of the better ones. Friday night you could almost go down the lineup and list all players picking out those playing outstanding games. The names heard most often during the course of the game were Jeff Drump, Don Douglas, Dave Patrick, Chandler and Clinton in the line and Helms and Dowd. However it takes every man in the lineup and every man on the team has been playing bang-up football.

On offense Dowd and Helms have each scored five TDs in two games. Dowd has carried 39 times in two games for a total of 311 yards for a 7.97 yard per carry average. Helms has carried 36 times for 291 yards for an 8.08 yard per carry average. Between the two of them they have gained a total of 602 yards and an average of 8.02 per carry, statistics that are quite gaudy.

The Patriots are due to get their sternest test this Friday night as they drive to Anton for their third game. Last Friday night Anton played defending Zone 2-B North champion Sudan to a 7-7 tie. The game figures to be the toughest to date for the Patriots and should give fans an indication of how the local team will stack up against other team members.

It is hoped that a large group of fans will go along to root the Patriots to another win.

Cooperatives To Sponsor Health Screening Program

The Farmers Cooperative Gin of Quitaque, Briscoe Cooperatives, of Silverton, and the Turkey Farmers Co-op Gin, are sponsoring a health screening program for members and patrons of their cooperatives. The program is designed to provide an in-depth series of medical tests on a convenient and economical basis.

The testing is performed in a clinic on wheels. That mobile facility will be parked at the Quitaque Community Center and will begin operations on September 26.

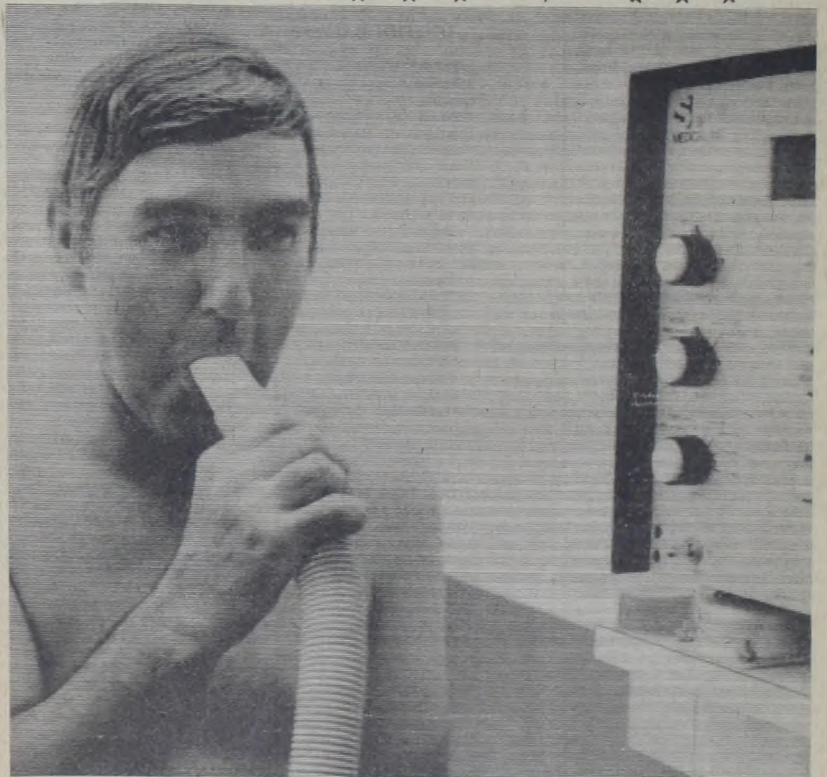
Dan Maguire, Program Coordinator for the Health Program was in town today in advance of the mobile unit's arrival. He pointed out that the test series included two x-rays (chest and facial), an EKG, pulmonary lung function test and considerable blood and urine testing. He indicated that most of the people who participate will do so because of the convenience. He pointed out that the entire test battery requires only 45 minutes to complete.

Farmland Industry of Kansas City began providing this service in November 1974 to Double Circle Coops throughout the Midwest. To date the program has operated in 300 communities in 10 states and has been utilized

by over 60,000 Coop members. Roughly one-third of the Coop members screened to date were detected to have some previously unknown abnormalities.

The test data that is generated on the van is reviewed by a Texas internist-cardiologist and a Texas radiologist. Their report, along with all the raw data (including actual x-rays, EKG, and lab reports) is sent to the participant's personal physician. Each participant will also receive a copy of the reports. It should be pointed out that the Coop Health Screening Program is not intended to replace or interfere with regular visits to your personal physician. Rather it is designed to allow for a more convenient and economical system of data gathering to be used by the physician in the patient's behalf. It is strongly recommended that each participant contact their physician as soon as the test results have been received.

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.
