## HALL COUNTY FARMER APPOINTED TO BOARD

Mack D. Richards, Hall County farmer, has been appointed to the Board of Directors of the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District, according to an announcement received from Lee Scrivner, chairman.

The appointment was made by the directors at a special called meeting at Childress January 6, 1971. Richards will be serving as director of Zone 1, which includes all of Hall County north of the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River. The appointment was made to fill the vacancy of the late Joyce Webster.

Richards has been an advocate of conservation for a number of years and is doing an outstanding job on the land he owns and operates. He has been a cooperor of the district since 1961. Richards is farming some two thousand acres, mostly row crops, in Hall and Childress counties. He is carrying out a Great Plains Conservation Program Contract with the Soil Conservation Service at Memphis and has installed 142,551 feet of parallel terraces, which are a part of his overall conservation plan.

The Hall-Childress Soil Conservation district holds its regular meetings the second Wednesday of each month at 2:00 p.m. in their district office at Childress and they invite anyone interested in conservation to meet with them.

## GPCP CONTINUES TO BENEFIT CONSERVATION FARMING

The Great Plains Conservation Program is continuing to be beneficial to conservation work in Hall County. According to Henry Gregory, parallel terrace systems have recently been completed on the Rayford Hutcherson, Sam Cowan and John W. Miller farms.

A total of 146,000 feet of parallel terraces have been completed since July 1. Diversion terraces were constructed on the Sam Cowan and Rayford Hutcherson farms. A dam is under construction on the Buchanan and Fuston place near the Turkey community.

The SCS is still continuing to accept GPCP applications although Hall County has allocated all of its GP funds at the present time. Frank Hedrick and W. W. George have proposed GPCP contracts and are awaiting funds.

## SCS CAN GIVE TECHNICAL NON-FARM ASSISTANCE

The SCS, through your conservation district, is helping more and more municipal and county officials, planning bodies and developers cope with problems of erosion, water supply and disposal, improper land use, flooding, and sedimentation.

The SCS advises and gives the guidelines for controlling erosion on highways, subdivisions, shopping centers, and airports—erosion that clogs streams and reservoirs and increases the costs of water purification and road maintenance.

SCS provides information about soils and their limitations or advantages for housing, recreation, waste disposal, road construction and many other uses.

It provides standards for temporary erosion-control devices in construction areas and advises on water-supply potentials, recreation sites, and resource - development trends.

The help available from SCS ranges from advice and consultation to onsite technical assistance.

## CONSERVATION COST-SHARING PROGRAM EXPECTED TO IMPROVE ENVIRONMENT

Briscoe County farmers will soon be participating in the new Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) with major emphasis on solving those environmental problems which have been intensified by agricultural operations.

Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, said the program announcement of REAP had been made in Washington by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin.

Farmers have known REAP as ACP—the Agricultural Conservation Program. The cost-sharing principle will be the same—that is, farmers and the federal government will share in paying for beneficial conservation practices. The restructured program will be in line with modern-day needs for a better environment, both on and off the farm.

The Washington announcement by Secretary Hardin stated that major considerations in authorizing cost-sharing of any conservation practice will be the resulting public benefits such as pollution abatement, enduring soil and water conservation, recreation, wildlife and open space as well as the degree of permanency achieved.

A major thrust will be to reduce water pollution. Water retaining and retarding measures on farms—such as dams and ponds, permanent grass cover, waterways, buffer strips and tree plantings—will be encouraged. These will be directed toward reducing silt in streams, rivers, lakes and other bodies of water and toward reducing pollution from animal wastes, fertilizers and pesticides.

"Briscoe County farmers should be made aware that this announcement means we will be able to continue cost-sharing on anti-pollution measures which were approved last year under ACP and also such long-standing conservation practices as those just named," the ASCS Committee chairman said.

As in prior years, applications for conservation cost-sharing will be made at the county ASCS office and must be approved by the county ASC committee before work begins. The farmer-elected committeemen will continue to select practices best suited for meeting local needs, will determine which farm lands need treatment and will fix the amount of cost-sharing to be provided each approved applicant.

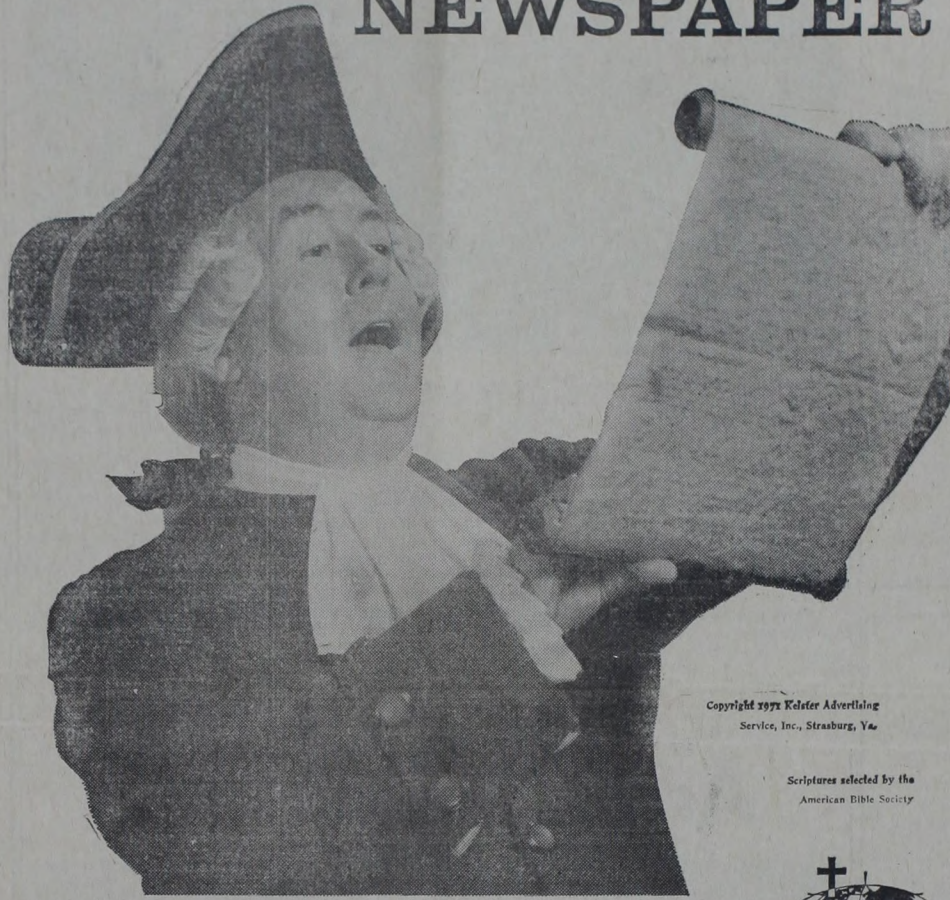

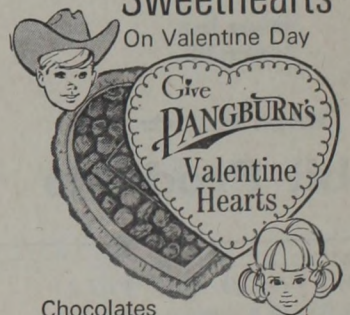

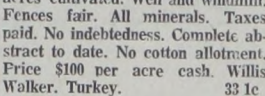

  - 1 1/2 cups boiling water
  - 1/4 cup corn starch
  - 1 teaspoon horseradish
  - 1 recipe pastry, 2 crusts

Saute beef in heated corn oil until lightly browned. Add onion and mushrooms. Dissolve bouillon cubes in water; stir into corn starch and add to meat mixture. Add horseradish. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, 2 minutes or until thickened. Turn into pastry-lined 9-inch pie pan.
