Heritage Foundation Holds Thirtieth Annual Meeting

Marjorie Bain, a director of the foundation, attended the 30th Annual Meeting of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation. They met at the Amarillo Quarter Horse Heritage Center in Amarillo, with a luncheon catered by Sutphen Barbecue from Amarillo. Virginia Degan also attended as a guest of Mrs. Bain.

The Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, Inc., is the non-profit producer of the musical drama "TEXAS" that opens its 27th season this summer beneath 600 foot cliffs in Palo Duro Canyon. During the 1991 season, visitors came from every state and over 100 different foreign countries.

President Lois Rice's welcoming speech paid tribute to the founder, Margaret Harper, who died on November 16, 1991, due to heart failure.

She announced the \$500,000 Electrical Renovation two-year project had been completed.

Patty Bryant gave a publicity report, stating we had a 93% capacity of amphitheatre attendance in 1991 and that "TEXAS" is the largest outdoor drama.

New plans revealed a front-of-house spruce up in progress that will include a new, second paved parking lot, resurfacing of the lower patio area and new lighting.

"TEXAS" opens this season on June 10, 1992, and plays nightly except Sundays at 8:30 p.m. through August 22nd.

New "Wireless City" Readies To Go On-Line In Near Future

Quitaque, population 700, lies in the southern Texas panhandle, and isn't really near anywhere. But it's just what GTE Central Area was looking for.

In the spring, GTE Central plans to introduce Quitaque (Kit'-a-kway) to Basic Exchange Telecommunications Radio Service (BETRS)--and make it the first city in the 13-state area to operate strictly on wireless telephone technology.

The wireless customers won't notice anything different about the quality of their service, said Gary Ward, manager-exchange planning-Southwest Region.

The only things people will notice are the phone radio cluster units on concrete pads in various locations in Quitaque, and some people might see an antenna on the telephone pole outside their home.

In sparsely populated, high cost rural areas, GTE Central is looking at alternatives to conventional cable or digital loop carrier systems. BETRS offers a cheaper way to provide quality telephone service to some of these areas.

The greatest advantage of BETRS in sparsely populated exchanges is the initial cost savings compared with the extensive capital outlays required for conventional, terrestrial technologies. Another advantage is realized in the ongoing maintenance savings associated with long rural subscriber loops. Other advantages are the quality of service compared to open wire loops and the ease that new customers may be added to the network.

"GTE stands as the pioneer of wireless technology, beginning its research in 1982, in Sonora,

Texas, to help provide basic telephone service to that sparsely populated, high-cost location," he said.

Area Counties Have Access To 9-1-1

Swisher and Briscoe Counties Telephone subscribers in the Tulia (995), Happy (558), Kress (684), Silverton (823), Quitaque (455), Gurley (764), Vigo Park (633), Redmon (627), Elkins (668) and Bean (847) exchanges will be able to access 9-1-1 services beginning April 15, 1992. The City of Tulia 9-1-1 system is one of 23 planned systems to be implemented across the Panhandle.

The availability of 9-1-1 service in Swisher and Briscoe Counties was made possible through a cooperative effort with the Cities of Tulia, Happy, Kress, Silverton, Quitaque and Swisher and Briscoe Counties, the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Local elected officials, law enforcement, emergency medical services, and fire department personnel, local businesses and the citizens of the county have volunteered their services to ensure that the 9-1-1 system will be successful.

But the main focus is now on Quitaque as GTE Central prepares to analyze the overall impact of BETRS on the large scale trial in what's already being called "Wireless City."

The Quitaque trial will involve 422 customers and aims to help GTE Central gain a better understanding of the operational administrative, maintenance and provisioning differences between wireless and conventional wireline technologies.

GTE Central will consider using wireless technology as a viable option when evaluating relief alternatives in some rural area. What happens in Quitaque will help GTE Central determine whether to expand the wireless technology and if so, where.

Quitaque, though just a small town, looms big in the high tech future of GTE Central.
