Grant Hearing Postponed By Commissioners Court

The Commissioners Court of Briscoe County, Texas, convened in regular session Monday, April 11, meeting in the courthouse in Silverton.

Upon a motion duly made by Commissioner Chandler,

and seconded by Commissioner Long, the hearing on the grant application for Archer and Archer, (the peanut processing plant proposed for Briscoe Co.) was post-poned until April 26,

1988. Voting for postponement were Chandler, Long, and Eddleman. Commissioner Weaver abstained from voting. Voting against the postponement was Judge Jimmy Ross. However, the motion carried.

In other action, the Val-Line telephone service proposal was postponed until Judge Ross can confer with Donley and Hall county judges about the system.

Also, a motion made by Long, and seconded by Chandler, passed unanimously for the appraisal district to sell tax lots, and to pay the city \$110 for work done on lots.

A motion by Long, seconded by Eddleman, was unanimously passed for extension agent Lynda Fogerson to purchase a print shop program for computer at a cost of \$50.96, plus \$3 handling and mailing.

The court voted to pay bills, among other business considered.

Tourney This Weekend In Flomot

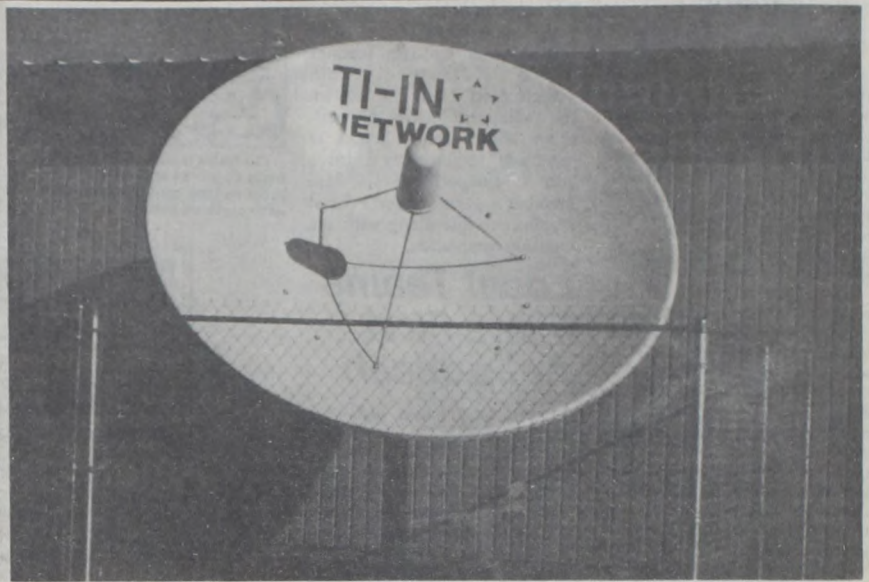

Satellite Classes Come To Valley School System

A new and exciting technique of providing high tech learning in the classroom will be used at Valley School starting next fall. The new system of long distance learning will provide Valley students a unique opportunity to acquire courses of study by the utilization of TV satellite. Without this advanced technology, rural schools like Valley would be unable to offer their students desirable, but unattainable areas of learning.

The satellite learning program offers satellite transmitted academic courses via TI-IN Network, Inc. from San Antonio, Texas. More than twenty advanced and honors courses will be available to Valley students, live with interactive capabilities eight hours each day. Studies in math, science, foreign language, fine arts, and social studies, will be offered above current offerings at Valley. The courses are taught in San Antonio and received live in the various schools across Texas and other states via television monitors.

The regularly scheduled classes allow for student interaction with the teacher by the use of talkback equipment. This allows for two-way communication between the stud-

ent and teacher, or will allow for a degree of communication between students at the various locations across the nation. The system has been in use for three years, and is proving to be educationally and economically sound.

Although the course offerings on TI-IN Network are basically high school, other areas of the school and community will benefit from the program. At least once each week, student enrichment viewing will be available to elementary children. Enrichment programs are designed to expand the horizons and enrich the experiences of the children. Annually, over four hundred hours of inservice and staff development will be

available to the school staff. Staff development will be offered on Saturdays, evenings, and during the summer months.

Like most new ideas and learning programs in education, TI-IN is not a panacea. It may prove to be inconvenient to some students and parents, difficult to put into operation by the school, and expensive to operate. But the advantages far outweigh the disadvantages by offering unseen possibilities and providing Valley students an opportunity to reach their potential.

Kwahadi Indians To Perform In Silverton

The PTA Cultural Arts Festival will host the Kwahadi Indians April 23, at 7:30 p.m. in Silverton gymnasium.

The Kwahadi Indians are an elite Scout troop which began in Amarillo in 1944. Their membership now totals more than 12,000, with ages ranging from 11-18 years. They hand make their elaborate costumes and portray the folk art of Americans from many Indian tribes.

The troop will perform Plains and Pueblo Indian dances in their Silverton appearance. They have previously performed across the heart of America, traveling 10,000 miles a year --from New England to include 2000 performances overseas.

Palo Duro State Park will feature the Kwahadi Indians in a production of "Indian Summer" in the fall.

A large crowd is expected from the surrounding area for the Silverton performance, so

come early and see the Indians assemble their teepees and various equipment.

All students and pre-schoolers will receive a free coupon. Adults will be charged \$1.00. Do mark your calendar for this colorful and historical event.

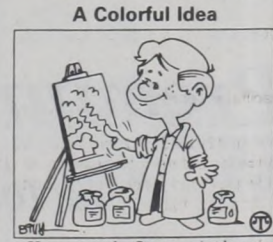

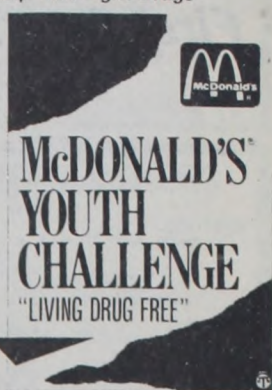

4th Cavalry Regiment Could Be Formed Here

One of the most unique historical units on the South Plains has accepted an invitation to participate in the Paducah Rodeo Parade on April 15, according to parade officials.

The 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment (Memorial), with cavalry uniforms, glimmering brass equipment, a polished army wagon and howitzer, will ride down the parade route, recreating the life and atmosphere of the frontier soldier.

The 4th Cavalry, a non-profit unit, was organized in 1985 for the purpose of contributing to the education of the people of this area on the Indian Wars period of our history (1869-1876).

"We are a re-enactment group that is dedicated specifically to the period of time when Colonel Ranald S. Mackenzie and his 4th Cavalry actually operated in this area," said Major Larry Goldston, adjutant/executive officer of the regiment. "All of our uniforms, equipment, weapons and saddle gear are period replicas or authentic originals. We pride ourselves in re-creating the trooper as he actually was and not as he has been portrayed by artists and by the movies."

Because the group is registered as non-profit, it relies on membership dues and donations for funding.

"Make a Difference to a Child"

Briscoe County, but am not so naive as to believe that we do not have such cases of family violence in our communities.

If you know of situations of child abuse and do not report it to the authorities, you are guilty of neglecting to help a child. The Texas Family Code requires citizens to report suspected cases of child abuse to the proper authorities. Many people say, "I did not report it (child abuse/neglect) because I could not prove it." Proving that child abuse or neglect has occurred is the responsibility of governmental agencies and law enforcement, not that of the citizen making the report.

We all have a responsibility to "GET INVOLVED" in helping families in our communities to make changes to improve life for our children who are too young to protect themselves.

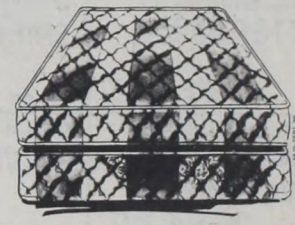
